# Celebrating the 75th Anniversary of Glenbrook High School District 225

Northfield Township was a non-high school district for many years. That meant that the taxes collected were used as tuition payments for students to attend other high schools. In the early days, students who wanted to attend high school got on the train and went into Chicago to Jefferson Township High School. As high schools opened in the nearby suburbs, most Northbrook students began attending Deerfield Shields (now Highland Park) and New Trier High Schools.

As the communities grew, tuition kept rising. Residents of Northfield Township thought it was time to have their own high school. In 1928, the School District 28 School Board decided to begin a two-year high school at the Northbrook School (now Crestwood Place) on Waukegan Road. On the first day of school, seven Junior class members showed up wanting to attend school. From 1930 to 1938 Northbrook High School was a three-year high school. The first four-year high school class consisting of 29 students from Glenview and Northbrook graduated in 1939. Attesting to the rapid growth of the area, a Chicago Tribune article on June 20, 1948, stated that in the past 19 years

District 28's elementary school population had grown from 150 students to 1,655 and up to 800 high school students.

On April 12, 1947, residents went to the polls and voted to form their own high school district. Dr. Norman Watson, currently Superintendent of Northbrook High School, was chosen as the new Superintendent. Then the hunt for a location began. In June 1949, voters chose a site at East Lake Avenue and Sunset Ridge Road in Glenview. However, two successive bond issues to purchase the site failed. The issue again went before the voters with five sites on the ballot. This time, the bond issue passed. A runoff election between the two top choices was needed because neither site garnered a majority of the votes as required. Voters again went to the polls on November 19, 1949. This time the 71-acre Oldfield Farm site in the center of the township received the most votes by a margin of 366 votes over the 40-acre Sunset Ridge site. Once the Northbrook site was purchased, building plans commenced. Some Glenview residents were not happy, and a suit filed on their behalf asked the court to rule that the District 225 School Board was bound by the selection of the first site.



Adding to the urgency of choosing a site was the December 1951 District 28 School Board vote that after June 1952, they would no longer house high school students due to their own need for space. Following a second court battle, a fifth vote took place on March 29, 1952, and the Oldfield Farm site won with a clear majority of almost 1,000 votes.

Groundbreaking for Glenbrook High School finally happened on June 1, 1952. Since District 28 could not house high school students for the coming year, the District 225 students divided up and attended different high schools including New Trier and Palatine High School for one year. After five and a half years, five trips to the polls, and two lawsuits, Glenbrook High School opened its doors on September 8, 1953.

**CRS Classification Reduces Your Flood Insurance Premium**  
The Village presently has a Class 6 status within the Community Rating System (CRS) that provides property owners in the Village a 20% reduction in flood insurance premiums for properties located in a Special Flood Hazard Area and a 10% reduction for properties located outside a Special Flood Hazard Area.

The CRS program allows communities to achieve certain credits (i.e. reduction in flood insurance policy premiums) by implementing specified floodplain outreach activities and development regulations.

# Responding to Emotional Trauma & Back-to-School Stress

Trauma is an emotional response to a distressing experience. It has no boundaries regarding age, gender, socioeconomic status, race, ethnicity, or sexual orientation. Trauma is a common experience for adults and children, and its effects place a heavy burden on individuals, families, and communities.

Now that the school year has started, the return to the classroom may be difficult for some families who are experiencing trauma. The emotions associated with trauma are complex.

CATCH:Community Action Together for Children's Health, teamed up

with Michelle Magida, LCPC, trauma-informed therapist and founder of TherapyEtc, for a community presentation in August. Magida advised parents that it is important to be honest with their children, in age appropriate ways, about their own feelings. Sharing truthfully with one's family develops trust and connection and is vital to helping kids process trauma.

Magida also encouraged parents to watch their child's behavior closely in three areas: emotional, social, and academic functioning. If you notice that your child's normal behavior has changed in one or more of these areas,

she advised getting your child mental health support to help process the trauma that could be behind these changes.

**Be compassionate and patient with yourself and your family. These may be challenging times.**

Reach out for support if you or a loved one needs it. CATCH has compiled a list of trauma-informed therapists who are ready and prepared to help.

*Chuseok: A Korean "Thanksgiving" Celebration, by Claire Noh*

The Village of Northbrook has the highest Korean population in all of Illinois. With such a large demographic of Korean Americans, Korean holidays are enthusiastically celebrated, one of them being Chuseok. Chuseok is a three-day holiday celebrated annually in August or September, always on the 15th day of the 8th month of the lunar calendar. It is one of the biggest holidays in Korea.

Family members from far and wide travel to their hometowns to celebrate this day with their extended family. Often compared to the American Thanksgiving, Koreans give thanks to their ancestors for the bountiful fall harvest with a variety of traditions. Typically, the day begins with ancestral worship, followed by lively folk games and traditional food. The cooks in the family work hard to prepare a grand Chuseok feast. By far the most appreciated food of all the Chuseok

delicacies is songpyeon: half moon shaped rice cakes filled with sesame, honey, and nuts. It is loved by all, adults and children alike. Beyond its chewy texture and sweet taste, songpyeon symbolizes good wishes and dreams.

To celebrate this special day, children and adults wear the traditional Korean clothing, hanbok. Hanbok is a garment characterized by deep, colorful hues. It is only worn on special occasions, usually just a few times a year.

To my childhood self, Chuseok was just a day where the dining table was fuller than usual, with strange faces telling me how big I had gotten. As a young adult I now understand and celebrate the true reason for Chuseok's celebrations: to show appreciation for our ancestors. Of course, I still relish in the celebratory ambiance that my young self adored so much.



It is fascinating to note the parallels between the Korean Chuseok and American Thanksgiving – the culture of giving thanks unifies the two countries.

Most importantly, Chuseok is a day for everyone to enjoy the company of their extended family and create cherishable memories in the midst of their busy lives. This year, Chuseok takes place September 9 through 12. It will undoubtedly be a joyous weekend in many Korean households!

# Meet Kevin Frangiamore

## Fire Marshal, Northbrook Fire Department



If you were to ask Kevin Frangiamore, Fire Marshal at the Northbrook Fire Department, how he got into his role, he would say that he was born into it. As the son of a former firefighter and fire marshal for the Palatine Fire Department, the job is in his blood.

Kevin started in the field working for Fire Safety Consultants, Inc. as a plan reviewer. During his time there, he worked with many fire departments, including Northbrook's. When the fire inspector in Northbrook announced plans to leave, he recommended none other than Kevin Frangiamore for the job! Four years later, he had worked his way up to fire marshal.

A fire marshal has many responsibilities including managing fire inspectors, reviewing commercial document plans for fire and life safety, overseeing alarm and sprinkler installations, along with enforcing the fire code. Something Kevin wants the business community to know is that he is there to work with them so their facilities can be safe and stay open. Kevin's main goal is to reduce the loss of life and property in Northbrook through

fire education and safety tips. Kevin's work is one of the reasons we can safely enjoy the fun public events we all know and love, as he personally inspects every ride, booth, tent, and even fireworks!

Kevin graduated with a degree in Psychology from North Central College in Naperville, Illinois, where he also played soccer. From his time as an athlete Kevin learned the importance of operating as a team, a value he carries with him as Fire Marshal. In Kevin's eyes, the Village is a team, and his coworkers serve as his teammates. The energy of his colleagues combined with the upbeat atmosphere in Northbrook make it easy for Kevin to go into work each day with a positive attitude.

**Kevin explains, "When I think about what 'Northbrook Strong' means to me, I think about the people working together for a common good. I think about the phenomenal people that are doing everything they can to make Northbrook better."**

When he is not at the fire station or out on inspections, Kevin's favorite thing to do in Northbrook is to ride his bicycle at the Velodrome. Along with riding his bike in his free time, Kevin trains in preparation for the Half IronMan competition, where participants swim 1.2 miles, bike 56 miles, and run 13.1 miles. The diligence and dedication that he shows in his hobbies outside of the station are the same qualities that apply to his work. Kevin spends the rest of his time with his wife, four children, 13 chickens, and three French bulldogs. He met his wife of nearly twenty years, Kristen Frangiamore, at their high school in Cary, Illinois.

During the COVID-19 pandemic, Kevin helped organize drive-by visits from the Fire Department for children celebrating their birthdays at home. This idea was inspired by his daughter whose birthday plans were derailed by the lockdown, leading Kevin to arrange a drive-by parade for family and friends to celebrate safely. Planning the drive-by visits for the community is one of his fondest memories as Fire Marshal. He explained that the joy of watching a child's face light up when they saw the fire truck was priceless. In the three months that the Northbrook Fire Department held drive-by-birthday parades, they visited 360 homes.

Kevin's words of advice to the public on fire prevention are to keep an eye on electrical cords that could be fraying or pinching and to always pay attention when cooking (and never leave things on the stove unattended).

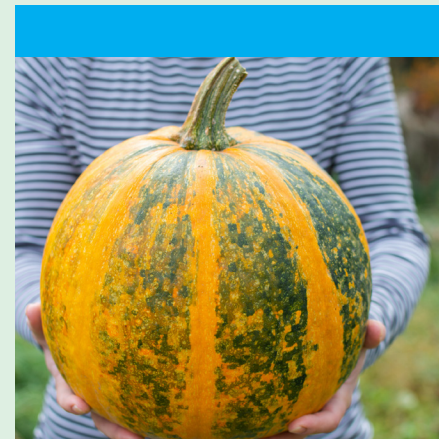

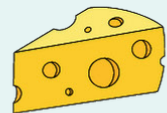

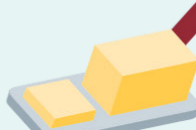

## FREQUENTLY ASKED QUESTIONS

# Refuse & Recycling



The Village of Northbrook contracts with Waste Management (WM) for refuse, recycling, landscape waste, and organics collection for all single-family and many multi-family properties within the Village's municipal boundaries.

### How can I contact Waste Management?

Residents can contact WM at 800-796-9696 for missed pickups, service requests, container swaps, billing issues, or any other WM related issue. Residents may also submit concerns or issues online at [wm.com/support](http://wm.com/support).

### When will WM collect my refuse?

Waste Management conducts pickups throughout your collection day anytime between 6:30am and 5:00pm. Containers should be outside and accessible for the driver. For curbside 1x week customers, refuse, recycling, and compost/yard waste collections happen on the same day.

### How can I find out my refuse collection day?

Residents can find their collection day through the Know Your Neighborhood tool under the "Living & Visiting" section of the Village website. Enter your address in the search bar and click the magnifying glass icon. Your pickup date will be under "local services."

### I am a senior. Do I get a discount?

Yes! WM offers a 10% discount to residents over the age of 65. The discount is available to qualifying residents who request it. Call 847-664-4010 for more information.

### I have mobility issues and cannot get my carts to the curb. What can I do?

Residents who are physically unable to bring containers to the curb can apply for the hardship service by contacting the Village at 847-664-4010. Hardship residents receive weekly backdoor service at the weekly curbside rate for both recycling and refuse. The Village will review each request on a case-by-case basis once a doctor's note has been provided.

### Does WM have a recycling program?

Yes! WM's single stream recycling system accepts common household

items like paper, metal, most plastics, and glass. Plastic types 1-5 are accepted; plastics type 6 and 7 or plastics with no label are not.

### How can I recycle my electronics?

Twice monthly electronics recycling is available at the Fleet Maintenance Garage behind Village Hall on the first Tuesday and Saturday of each month. Tuesday hours are 7am to 3pm. Saturday hours are 9am to noon.

### How can I dispose of plastic grocery bags?

The Village partners with Aargus Plastics, Inc to collect eligible plastic bags near Village Hall's back entrance. Only clean, dry, and lightweight plastics will be accepted. Cereal bags, bubble wrap, and plastic film are not eligible.

### Does the Village offer a textile recycling program?

Yes! The Village contracts with Simple Recycling to provide free year-round textile recycling to residents. Residents must schedule a pickup through the Simple Recycling website at [simplerecycling.com](http://simplerecycling.com) or by calling 866-835-5068.

### What can I recycle through Simple Recycling?

Residents can recycle clothing, bags, hats, toys, blankets, curtain, or pillows in any condition. Other eligible items include jewelry, shoes, silverware, dishes, pots, and pans!

### I have batteries, motor oil, or other hazardous waste. What can I do?

While WM cannot accept hazardous waste in the refuse or recycling carts, the Northfield Township Road District offers an extensive recycling program for township residents. More information can be found on the Township's website or by calling 847-724-7055. Hours are Monday through Friday, 7am-3pm, at 237 Melvin Drive in Northbrook.

### Does WM collect compost & yard waste?

Yes! Residents can participate with a year-round subscription or through the sticker program. With the subscription, WM will collect unlimited yard waste and compost weekly from April-November and bi-weekly from December-March. Residents not interested in the subscription service can dispose of compost and yard waste from April-November using proper bags clearly labeled with prepaid disposal stickers. Stickers are \$2.12 each and can be purchased at Village Hall and local hardware stores.

### What items are unacceptable for composting?

Liquids, pet waste/litter, packaging, fats, grease, and oil are some items not acceptable for composting. Please note even packaging that is "certified compostable" will not be accepted by Waste Management. Visit the Village's website for more information on acceptable composting items.

### How can I dispose of a bulk item?

Residents can dispose of two bulk items for free each week. Any additional bulk item will need a sticker that can be purchased at Village Hall. Bulk items cannot be over 4ft wide and 6ft tall. Visit the Village's website for more information on acceptable bulk items.

### Can I dispose of a mattress as a bulk item?

Yes! Mattresses are an acceptable bulk item. The mattress must be covered in plastic or with a mattress disposal kit.

### My HOA or condominium contracts with WM too. Do these programs apply to me?

It depends. All residents are able to utilize the electronics, textile, and plastic bag recycling programs. Other services, like compost/yard waste, would be through your property's separate waste hauler contract.

**Leave the Leaves**  
Leaf blowers aren't just noisy and pollutant-emitting, they also disrupt the local ecosystem and food chain for wildlife. When we blow leaves off our properties and bag them up for disposal, we are throwing away the source of shelter and overwintering habitat for important pollinators like dragonflies and bees. **Lights Out Northbrook**

The Village has launched a voluntary Lights Out Northbrook campaign where community members commit to leaving their lights off after 11pm each night. Participants will receive a free native seed packet by registering with the Village's Sustainability Coordinator. This movement is part of a larger effort to protect the rare migratory birds that pass through Northbrook during fall. Researchers believe that exterior lights on buildings confuse the navigation systems of birds leading them to circle buildings repeatedly and die of exhaustion or collision. 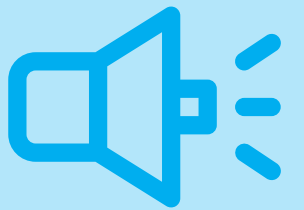
**OAKtober**

On Tuesday, September 27, at 10am, there will be a Village-wide test of the emergency alert system. When the test is activated, residents who are signed up for emergency alerts will receive a notification via email, text, and/or phone call with a message indicating "This is a test of the Northbrook Notify system. No further action is needed." This test is performed on an annual basis in September.

On Sunday, September 11, all are invited to join as we honor the heroes and remember the victims of the September 11, 2001, attack on America. At 7:45am, Police and Fire personnel will assemble at each of the Northbrook Fire Stations for a solemn remembrance of the victims.
