Voting Information

Voter Registration

If you have recently moved, changed your name, or are a new voter, you'll need to register to vote. For the November 8 election, voters can register at an Early Voting site through November 7 during the Grace Period or on Election Day (November 8) at their assigned precinct. During the Grace Period and on Election Day, voters must vote at the time of registration.

Early Voting

Early Voting is still available at any of Cook County's early voting centers, including Northbrook Village Hall. Early Voting runs through November 7. Early Voting sites will have a secure drop box available for mail-in ballots from 9am-4pm.

Voting by Mail

Any registered Cook County voter may request a mail ballot from the Cook County Clerk's Office. The deadline to apply is five days before an election, (November 3). Ballots must be postmarked by Election Day.

Election Day

Election Day is November 8. On Election Day, voters must vote at their precinct's voting location. Note that some Election Day voting precincts have changed. Northbrook Village Hall is not a polling place this Election Day.


Family, Festivities, and Friday Night Lights

Navigating Emotions this Holiday Season

The holidays can be both a joyful and stressful time of year. So many images of those perfect holiday moments can set unrealistic expectations. Family together time can create moments of laughter as well as tension or disagreement. It also is a time when a loss can feel more overwhelming. FSC therapists offer the following to help with those potentially difficult moments.

Holiday gatherings can transport us in time. Many can feel like their everyday self when walking up the path to a gathering, only to cross that threshold and slide back into past roles, memories, and feelings. This is called regression and it's an expected, predictable phenomenon brought on by environmental cues, memories, and our beliefs about what others are thinking. It can make gatherings both emotionally uplifting and challenging. To navigate these times, consider how you might use

some, or all, of the following strategies to make this season brighter.

- **Choose Your Goals.** As humans, we often start with holiday ideals—everyone will have a wonderful time, enjoy the food and the company, no arguments will arise, the kids will behave delightfully, etc. But that probably will not happen. There are too many factors outside of our control. Choosing goals that are more realistic, compassionate, and achievable can help you enjoy the event.

- **Stay You.** On the day of and during the event, when you notice the pull towards old roles or arguments - *pause*. Show up as your authentic, age-appropriate self, as an evolving work-in-progress with multiple roles and responsibilities. In those moments, stating our intentions to others can help defuse conflict—"I want to help," or "I appreciate your efforts."

- **Be Present in the Moment.** Focus on the here and now experience, without trying to change, avoid, or fix it. Focus on sensation, eye contact, listen carefully to words and tone used, see facial expressions, and remind yourself that you are "right here."

- **Be compassionate with yourself.** Treat yourself the way you would a dear friend. We often are much harder on ourselves. We don't ask them to be perfect. We help them when they struggle, see their strengths and limitations, and love them regardless!

Experiment with these different strategies and revise as you go. Should holiday stresses still feel overwhelming, you don't need to go it alone - the caring therapists at FSC can be a resource for anyone needing some extra support. Learn more at www.FamilyServiceCenter.org.

Chanukah Message from Rabbi Jason Fenster

Many of the traditions we share in our Northbrook community center on light during this time of year. When darkness abounds, we have the opportunity to be bearers of light.

In the Jewish tradition, our festival of lights is called Chanukah (no matter how you spell it!). It commemorates the victory of the small band of Maccabees over an army that sought to deny and persecute the tradition and culture of the Jewish people. And, as the story goes, once the Maccabees reclaimed their ransacked temple and prepared to sanctify their space with light, there was no oil left. And then they found one small container, enough for just one day, and, miracle of miracles, the oil lasted eight nights. Miraculous light for a people who had experienced great darkness.

To commemorate this moment, we light a chanukkah. Some call it a menorah, which loosely translates to "candelabrum." Think of it like tissues and Kleenex®. Menorah is the generic and chanukkah the name-brand for the holiday. Thousands of years ago, the great Jewish sages argued about how one ought to light the chanukkah. One suggested: A countdown! From eight candles on the first night down to one candle on the eighth. The candles would let us know how much longer the holiday would last and would mimic the waning light from the miraculous oil. Another offered: Add light! One candle on the first day, two on the second, and so forth. After lengthy debate and some compromise on procedure, the latter opinion became our custom and a new principle introduced into tradition: We always add light and add to the sacred.

As we approach this holiday, we are called to be like the chanukkah. We are called to add more light to the world. There is also a custom to place our light by the window so passersby will see the light and be reminded that miracles can happen. They will remember that even when it is darkest, light, wholeness, justice, and peace will always prevail.

Wishing you and the people you love a season of light, warmth, and goodness.

The Historical Walls of Northbrook

Crestwood Place Senior Apartments



If you've driven on Waukegan Road you've most likely passed by Crestwood Place Senior Apartments, a three-story brick building hidden behind the tree line. Thousands of seniors have walked the grounds of Crestwood, each creating memories that will last forever.

The best part of living at Crestwood Place, according to resident John Kollar, is spending time with his friends. John moved in fifteen years ago and the intimate community at Crestwood has become a large part of his life. John's apartment in the 'C-Building' is decorated with historical memorabilia, artwork, and photos of his family. During his time at Crestwood he has met some of his closest companions, and John enjoys getting involved with events at the facility.

"One of my favorite things about living at Crestwood are the monthly birthday parties that we have for all the residents," John explains. "We have a lot of fun celebrating."

The Village of Northbrook owns and oversees Crestwood Place, which is one of the only independent facilities of its kind in Cook County. The Board of Trustees has the task of appointing members to the Senior Services Commission. The Commission manages the financial and operational housing matters related to Crestwood, and they hold meetings for residents six times a year. This independent living facility differs from a nursing home because there is no medical staff on-site, and residents are required to handle their own affairs.

The chair of the Senior Services Commission, Fred Rosenberg, describes Crestwood as "a cost-effective, well-maintained, independent senior living facility." Fred has been a part of the commission for ten years and he enjoys working with the residents and fulfilling their needs.

In order to live at Crestwood, applicants must be at least 62-years-old and have been a resident or retired employee of the Village of Northbrook. There are a total of 118 one- and two-bedroom apartments at Crestwood, and the facility is divided into three sectors called the A, B, and C buildings. Each apartment is around 630 square feet and comes with a full kitchen. Each of the apartments in the C building are different, while units in the A and B buildings are similarly designed.

Due to high demand, Northbrook residents that are interested in living at Crestwood must add their name to a waiting list before they're able to move in. Amy Malloy says she waited three years before she was approved, but in her eyes the process was 'worth the wait.' Now Amy lives closer to her family, and she's developed a special bond with Crestwood residents. She says she loves the facility and feels heard by the Commission. **Interested applicants can contact Crestwood at 847-272-0170.**

Illuminate Northbrook Returns November 18



- Music!



SNOW & ICE CONTROL

Each winter, the Village's Public Works Department works around the clock to clear 539 plow lane miles of Village owned and maintained streets, municipal parking lots, and designated sidewalks.



NEW EQUIPMENT

This year, the Northbrook Public Works Department will be utilizing a wing-plow to increase service response during snow removal operations. With a front-mounted and side-mounted plow, this piece of equipment can clear almost two lanes of snow in one pass. It will be responsible for clearing snow on Skokie Blvd., Founders Dr., Kamp Dr., and Techny Rd. and assisting other routes as needed. For motorists' safety, all vehicles should remain 50 feet behind this Village plow and not attempt to pass, as plows will take up multiple lanes.




SNOW PARKING ORDINANCE

Remember to move your vehicle from the street when plows are out. Per Village ordinance, it is illegal to park on Northbrook streets when two or more inches of snow fall, until plowing is complete. It is imperative to remove snow completely to the gutter to allow safe passage of vehicles and to allow any snow melt to reach inlets in order to prevent flooding issues. Offending vehicles may be ticketed or towed. The Village will use its Northbrook Notify system to alert residents via text and email when the parking ban is in effect and when it has cleared. BE A GOOD NEIGHBOR

Be a good neighbor and shovel the sidewalk in front of your home. While there is no municipal ordinance requiring that an individual shovel their sidewalk, we encourage residents to pitch in and help their neighbors, especially the elderly and those with disabilities. While shoveling or snow blowing, Public Works asks that you be mindful of your surroundings and proximity to the street when plowing is taking place. Similarly, keep an eye on children when plows are out.



FIRE HYDRANTS

Clear the fire hydrants near your property of snow and ice. Help our first responders and protect yourself and your neighbors by shoveling a path from the street and three feet around the hydrant. In the event of an emergency, this can save lives.



SNOW POCKET METHOD

Shovel a snow pocket at the end of your driveway. You can help keep your driveway clear by shoveling snow downstream of roadway traffic. Make a pocket on the opposite side of your driveway so snow that is plowed from the street will be pushed into the pocket.



KEEP THE STREET CLEAR

Do not put snow in the street when clearing your driveway and sidewalk. If you have a plowing service, please direct them to keep snow on your property instead of pushing it across the street. The Village's municipal code prohibits placing snow on the roadway, as this requires more time to clear and creates a dangerous hazard for motorists, cyclists, and pedestrians.

Thanksgiving Fire Safety

Thanksgiving is the leading day of the year for home cooking fires. The Northbrook Fire Department wants residents to practice fire safety in the kitchen to ensure a happy and safe holiday! Here are a few tips:

1. Stay in the kitchen when you are cooking on the stove top and keep an eye on the food.
2. Stay in the home when cooking a turkey and check on it frequently.
3. Keep children away from the stove and away from hot food, hot liquids, and candles.
4. Make sure your smoke alarms are working. Test them by pushing the test button.
5. Avoid turkey fryers. Fire can spread very quickly when a turkey fryer is used improperly.


Northbrook Park District Registration

Pre-Treat with Anti-Icing Salt Brine

Road salt has adverse effects on the environment when it washes off roadways, seeps into the ground, and enters our waterways. The Village utilizes a beet juice/salt brine blend to pre-treat roads before a snowstorm, which reduces the amount of salt used on roadways. To help the environment, you can do the same at home! Instead of using salt to remove snow or ice from your driveway or sidewalk, consider making your own salt brine (water and rock salt) to pre-treat these surfaces. This can help you reduce your salt usage by up to 30%. Learn about how at northbrook.il.us/salt.

Gun Safety Initiatives in Northbrook

At the July 26, 2022 Committee of the Whole meeting, the Board of Trustees discussed a number of potential gun safety initiatives for the Northbrook community. Detailed below are three gun safety initiatives that are currently available to people in Northbrook.

1. Turn-In and Destruction of Unwanted Firearms

Anyone in Northbrook wishing to dispose of an unwanted firearm(s) can call the Police Department at any time. Northbrook Police will collect and destroy the firearm(s), free of charge. Northbrook Police securely store collected weapons until the annual destruction days conducted by the Northern Illinois Police Crime Lab.

The Police Department can be reached 24/7 at 847-564-2060 (non-emergency line) or 911 for emergencies.

2. Firearms Prohibited Stickers

Free stickers indicating "no firearms allowed" are available to Northbrook residents and businesses at Village Hall year-round. Any Northbrook business operating with a Village license for the sale of alcoholic liquor must post a sign at all entrances indicating firearms are prohibited on the property. New liquor license applicants will receive the required sign(s) with their liquor license.

3. Gun Locks

Free gun locks are available from the Northbrook Police Department. Gun locks are available at community events such as National Night Out and Northbrook Days. Northbrook Police will also offer free gun locks at the Police Station (1401 Landwehr Road) year-round.

News You Can Use

Northbrook's Subsidized Taxi Program

This program offers an affordable transportation option for senior residents of incorporated Northbrook 55 years or older and permanently disabled Village residents. Proof of residency in the Village of Northbrook is required to participate in the program.

Registered program participants are allowed up to 16 five dollar rides per month with American Taxi, 303 Taxi, RideX Taxi, and BriteLift (for ambulatory transportation). The program utilizes an electronic swipe card to offset the metered fare. Ride subsidies do not roll-over from month to month.

Waste Management Holiday Collection Schedule

During the week of Thanksgiving, Thursday and Friday pickups will be delayed by one day. In observance of Christmas Day and New Year's Day, collection will be delayed by one day for the week following (collection will occur on New Year's Eve, December 31).

Holiday Light Recycling

Starting in December, residents can recycle old or broken holiday lights at the Fleet Maintenance Garage (behind the Village Hall) weekdays from 7am to 3pm through Tuesday, January 31.

Holiday Tree Recycling

Recycle your fresh holiday tree by Tuesday, January 31, by placing it at the curb on your recycling day. Remove all lights, garland, and decorations. Make sure your tree is easily accessible at the curb.
