



Award-Winning Northbrook Artist

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Village Name Changed to Improve the Image and the Rest is History

As we near the date for the transition from Shermerville to Northbrook, one can't help but wonder why the name was changed. Other than anecdotal remarks about the name change the only evidence uncovered to date is a contemporary newspaper article reporting on the change, and two later articles quoting people who were instrumental in making the change.

The following is an excerpt from the January 1923 Libertyville Independent Journal.

"Although Shermerville never was regarded as a lawless community, the residents somehow felt they were unable to live down the fact that in the pre-Volstead days it had five saloons at the time the population being less than 500."

"But Shermerville is pepping up. Its people feel that "Ville" is no longer appropriate. The population has jumped to more than 900. And while other communities deplore decreasing interest in church activities, Shermerville has made remarkable strides in religious works."

The following quote in the Chicago Tribune March 11, 1945, is attributed to Arthur Therrien who served as village president when the village's name was changed.

"The village name was changed to

Northbrook in 1922 because a woman who liked to shop in the loop couldn't stand being teased about having packages sent to a place named Shermerville. She enlisted the aid of a civic group and a petition to change the name was circulated. A contest was held to choose a name and after 6 months the change was made legal," Therrien said.

An article in the The Announcements dated August 17, 1950 has this to say about the name change:

"To remove the lingering flavor of its proud but lusty past, the village in the early 20s determined to change its name. The picnic grounds were closed several years but the Shermerville name still conjured visions of noisy weekends and gay crowds. The more staid Chicago and North Shore residents shunned the town as an undesirable place to live.

The town civic association in 1922, initiated a contest to find a new name which would be both dignified and pleasant. Three of the names submitted were put to a popular vote with the winner named Northbrook being submitted by George Schick who received a \$100 prize. The new name stands for the town's location on the North Branch, or brook, of the Chicago River."

Following that article, Edward Landwehr wrote to The Announcements and disclosed additional information. He said:

"The Citizens Club of Shermerville, antedating the Civic Association of Northbrook started the movement to change the name of Shermerville by inviting public comment for or against. Then new names were asked to be submitted. Mr. George Schick submitted the name Oakton. Northbrook was submitted by the undersigned writer of this item. Altogether five names were designated on the postal card in the form of a ballot and the cards mailed to our residents to vote for one they preferred for a new name. Northbrook received the decisive majority."

127 Village residents signed a petition to change the name of our town from Shermerville to Northbrook. Following submission of the petition, the village board placed required notices of the intent to change the name. A special meeting was held on January 8, 1923. The minutes of the meeting show that only two citizens rose to speak against the change. By a 6 to 1 vote the name change became official, and went into effect on February 1, 1923.

New Year Resolution: Mental health for all

It's that time of year again; time to make a New Year's resolution. The most common resolutions include losing weight, getting fit, or saving money/making more money.

According to the Journal of Clinical Psychology, only 46% of us successfully achieve our New Year's Resolution. Josselyn would like to suggest a resolution that is achievable and will affect your outlook on everything else in your life: **Take care of your mental health.**

It sounds so simple and obvious, yet we struggle mightily. Research tells us that nearly one in five teens and adults struggle with their mental health, yet less than half receive treatment. Among young adults, the prevalence of a mental health condition is nearly 30%, and the Surgeon General recently warned of a mental health crisis among teens as the pandemic has intensified mental health issues. We all have experienced collective trauma as a result of the pandemic, to varying degrees.

Josselyn is committed to breaking down barriers to accessing mental health care. Just pick up the phone and call 847-441-5600 x 1.

Other ways to improve your mental health include:

1. Find gratitude: it may be difficult to find a reason to give thanks when you are overwhelmed by anxious or depressed feelings, but gratitude is strongly correlated to mental well-being. Start small. You can be grateful for your pet who loves you no matter what, your friend who checks in regularly, or for a clear, sunny day, among other things.

2. Keep a routine: it sounds silly, but a routine really helps give us a sense of purpose. A routine should include going to bed and waking at the same time each day, making time for work and for rest, eating healthy and at regular intervals. Start small and add to this list as you can.

3. Minimize news feeds, especially those that swing strongly to one edge or another politically. Stay informed but limit

the amount of time to once a day. While the age-old media adage says, "bad news leads," it does nothing to lead us to better mental well-being.

4. Volunteer: help yourself by helping others. The Volunteer Center has a robust listing of volunteer needs; or check in on that aging neighbor or the friend who has recently experienced a loss. Doing something for someone else improves our outlook.

5. Stay socially connected: many of us have chosen to forgo in-person gatherings over the last couple of years, but there are other ways to connect socially. Call a friend or family member whom you may have missed this holiday season, or go for a walk with a co-worker outside.

It's so easy to get busy and forget our mental health, yet it's just as important as physical health and is essential to our overall well-being. Here's to a mentally healthy 2023 and to **Mental health for all!**

Many Asian countries celebrate Lunar New Year, such as China, Korea, Vietnam, Indonesia, the Philippines, etc. While the traditions and customs of each country are different, the underlying theme for the festival is the same. It is a time for families and friends to reunite and have good laughs, enjoy food together, and exchange wishes for the New Year. Lunar New Year has a history expanding nearly 3,500 years and it is the most important Asian festival widely celebrated in the world.

In 2023, the Lunar New Year will fall on Sunday, January 22, starting a year of the Rabbit. At the turn of the lunisolar calendar, celebrations traditionally run from New Year's Eve to the Lantern Festival on the 15th day of the first month.

The Village of Northbrook has a sizable Asian population with

nearby school districts amounting to around 40 percent of Asian students. Lunar New Year has been passionately celebrated in Northbrook. Traditionally, people dress in red, hang red lanterns, and paste couplets on red paper at the entryway to protect against misfortune during the celebration of Lunar New Year. Many cultures also have the tradition of celebrating with gifts of money handed out in red envelopes. Those who receive a red envelope are wished a safe and lucky new year.

I immigrated from China around 20 years ago, and now Northbrook is home for me, my husband, and our two kids. I'm incredibly grateful for the culturally rich experiences found in our community. Whether it's Ramadan, Diwali, Yom Kippur, or Dia De Los Muertos, we exchange thoughts and greetings with our friends, neighbors, and

community members. It puts smiles on our faces to both send and receive messages during these special days. Where people are heard, valued, and supported is where people feel they belong. That's my ultimate American experience.



A Local Legend: Ken Call

Award-Winning Watercolorist



For some, Northbrook is a small village on the outskirts of Chicago, but for legendary artist Ken Call, the Northbrook community is where he draws his inspiration. Ken is an award-winning watercolor artist, and has created many pieces that hang in homes and galleries across the country. He is experienced in many mediums of painting, but especially enjoys developing fine art and portraiture pieces.

Ken began his professional career as a studio artist and then branched off to explore freelancing, which resulted in over 500 illustrations for books, magazines, art publishers, advertising agencies, and corporations.

He explains the purpose of his career is to “capture someone else’s expression on paper, and highlight the life of a subject.”

Ken started his artistry at a young age, and found that his talent came naturally. When he was a sophomore in high school he realized he wanted to be a full time professional artist. Originally

from Rochelle, Illinois, Ken went to art school at American Academy of Art, a private college in Chicago. Ken graduated with an Associate Degree in Illustration and Watercolor. Upon having their first child, Ken and his wife moved to Northbrook to raise their family. While in Northbrook, Ken met many members of the community that inspired him to create eye-catching portraits of his neighbors and family members. It's important to Ken that he takes time to familiarize himself with the community, and tries to get involved in any way he can.



Winter Weather Do

Each winter, the Village's Public Works Department works around the clock to clear 539 plow lane miles of Village owned and maintained streets, 10 municipal parking lots, 5 commuter lots, and 45 miles of designated sidewalks. Here are some ways you can help operations run smoothly and safely!



Do:

Be a good neighbor and shovel the sidewalk in front of your home.

While there is no municipal ordinance requiring that an individual shovel their sidewalk, we encourage residents to pitch in and help their neighbors, especially the elderly and those with disabilities. While shoveling or snow blowing, Public Works asks that you be mindful of your surroundings and proximity to the street when plowing is taking place. Similarly, keep an eye on children when plows are out.

Clear the fire hydrants near your property of snow and ice.

Help our first responders and protect yourself and your neighbors by shoveling a path from the street and three feet around the hydrant. In the event of an emergency, this can save lives.

Shovel a snow pocket at the end of your driveway.

You can help keep your driveway clear by shoveling snow downstream of roadway traffic. Make a pocket on the opposite side of your driveway so snow that is plowed from the street will be pushed into the pocket.

Do's & Don'ts



Don't:

Don't park your vehicle on the street when the plows are out. When two or more inches of snow fall, it is illegal to park on Northbrook streets until plowing is complete. Offending vehicles may be ticketed and towed. The Village will use its Northbrook Notify system to alert residents when the parking ban is in effect and when it has cleared. Sign up for notifications at northbrook.il.us/northbrooknotify.

Don't put trash and recycling bins in the street. When clearing your driveway, also clear out an area in the parkway for your bins. These containers are difficult to plow around and could be struck by plows or other vehicles.

Don't put snow in the street when clearing your driveway and sidewalk. If you have a plowing service, please direct them to keep snow on your property instead of pushing it across the street. The Village's municipal code prohibits placing snow on the roadway, as this requires more time to clear and creates a dangerous hazard for motorists, cyclists, and pedestrians.

2023 SPRING PARKWAY TREE PLANTING PROGRAM



The Village works with the Suburban Tree Consortium to purchase landscape sized trees in various species that will be a great addition to your property. Some of the benefits you'll receive when planting a tree are:

- *Improved energy costs, trees provide shade and cool your home.*
- *Improved air quality, trees filter air pollution.*
- *Better sound quality, trees buffer noise.*
- *Increased property values by 12-20%.*
- *Increased psychological benefits, trees make us feel better!*

The Village will provide and install the tree on your parkway after you contact the Village Forester to discuss which tree you would like. The cost share is \$175, which is a fraction of the retail price for a full planted landscape tree.

Any new smoke alarms being installed within a single or multi-family home are required to be an alarm that features a 10-year sealed battery. Smoke alarms in single or multi-family homes prior to January 1, 2023 may remain in place until they exceed 10 years from the date of their being manufactured, or fail to respond to operability tests or otherwise malfunction. 
Safety Tips from The Northbrook Police Department

Northbrook's Emergency Alert System

Make sure the Village can reach you in the event of an emergency. Northbrook's emergency alert system, also known as Northbrook Notify, is an "opt-in" system to connect resident/business addresses with email, cell phone, and landline so that the Village's 911 dispatch center can notify those who have registered about critical situations, which at times may impact only a limited geographical area.

Emergency Alerts from the Village include:

- Severe Weather (such as a tornado warning)
- Weather impacting parking due to snowfall
- Public safety emergencies when there is an active threat with an urgent need to communicate (such as search for endangered person or an active search for vehicle)
- Annual system wide test each September for National Preparedness Month

The Northbrook Emergency Alert system is not used for:

- Marketing/promoting events and activities
- Sharing information on trends in crime

Effective November 28, 2022, anytime a Northbrook Emergency Alert is issued:

- All notification options will be selected for notification. These include email, phone call, and text message (excluding snow parking bans).
- The same emergency alert will be shared on Northbrook Police social media sites (Facebook and Twitter).
- Geofencing (address-targeted notifications) will be used for emergency notifications when the public safety situation warrants.

Property Tax Levy

On December 13, 2022, the Village Board of Trustees approved an ordinance reducing the property tax levy for the upcoming year, while increasing the total funding committed by the Village to public safety pensions. The Village's property tax levy funds general Village operations, debt service payments, and mandatory employer contributions to the police and firefighters' pension plan. Property tax accounts for approximately 16% of the General Fund revenues.

Holiday Tree Recycling

Recycle your fresh holiday tree by Tuesday, January 31, by placing it at the curb on your recycling day. Remember to remove all lights, garland, and decorations.

Northbrook's Capital Improvement Plan

The Capital Improvement Plan (CIP) is a long-range planning document designed to review the Village's anticipated capital needs, the various infrastructure improvements, and capital purchases that the Village will make during the plan's period.
