

Visionary That Helped Make Our Village What It Is Today

For 50 years the Historical Society has been telling Village stories. Without the Historical Society, the story of a visionary man would be unknown. It is a story a man who acted on his ideas and volunteered to make his community a better place to live. His name is Edward D. Landwehr. Here are the foundational things he did to make our Village what it is today.



Ed was among the 70 men who joined together to form the volunteer fire department in 1901 and served as its first secretary. Months later, he was also one of 35 men to sign the petition to Incorporate the Village.

He helped form the Shererville Improvement Club in 1907, and served

the organization through its starts and stops, including when it became the Northbrook Civic Association, now known as the Civic Foundation.

He was one of 125 residents that signed the petition to change the name of the Village. When Civic had a contest to choose a new name for the Village, he entered the contest, and his suggestion gathered the most votes. Northbrook would be the new town name replacing Shererville named for Frederick Shermer. It is interesting to note that Ed's wife Annie Holste was born in the home of her step grandfather Frederick Shermer. The Village Church is now located where that house stood. The Village Church began in the small 1892 Hope Union Church and in 1924 he helped in the creation of the Northbrook Presbyterian Church and served on the building committee for the new wing. This church is now the Hope Union Heritage Center where the Society's office and archives are located.

He served on the first Northbrook Park District Board in 1927 and became its first board secretary. The Northbrook Park District's Heritage Oaks golf course occupies the land where his grandfather Herman settled, and where his father was born.

He served on the District 28 School Board for 23 years beginning in 1908. The

Shererville School opened two years later. The monument on the grounds of the former school, which is now Crestwood Place, has a plaque affixed to the rear that used to hang in the 1929 gymnasium completed two years before he retired from the board.

Ed and Annie lived on a large piece of property on Center Street. Although changed, their house still stands today. All of you know their property well because of the two municipal buildings there now and two events that introduced the "Village of Friendly Living" to the world. The Library sits in his back cornfield. He also helped organize the first library in the Civic building for which his daughter-in-law served as a trustee.

Northbrook became the Speed Skating Capital of the World in 1972, in part because of the large ice-skating rink that filled the entire area in the 1950s where the Northbrook Speed Skating Club began. The 'Save Ferris' water tower from the film *Ferris Bueller's Day Off* sits on land he once owned.

Ed's is one of the stories that make Northbrook history come to life. Hopefully, it shows you there is history hidden in plain sight all around us, and each of us has the ability make a difference.

Northbrook is Open for Business!

As we start 2024, we look back on 2023 with excitement in many things, but particularly our private business developments. The new year is about possibilities for our future and the economic outlook of our Village has never been so strong. Just before the new year we saw a flurry of business openings, groundbreakings, and approval of a massive redevelopment project. Check out some of the highlights of projects that hit milestones in late 2023.



NOW OPEN

Starbucks: If you need a quick pick-me-up in the Northbrook area, you're in luck now that a brand-new Starbucks has opened at the corner of Waukegan and Shermer. This development was approved in January 2023 which also contains space for two additional tenants.

Napolita: I had the pleasure of attending the grand opening ceremony for Napolita - Pizzeria & Wine Bar at 1349 Shermer on November 18. It is an incredible space with amazing food and I completely recommend you stop by for lunch or dinner.



TESLA GROUNDBREAKING:

Northbrook will soon have an electrifying new addition to its collection of its automotive businesses, as developer Focus brings a Tesla Sales, Service, and Delivery (SSD) facility to Northbrook. In March 2023 the Village Board approved the construction of the facility at 1200 Skokie on the vacant land south of Lifetime Fitness. The developer will construct a high-quality, 48,000 square foot, Tesla facility as well as make significant improvements to the surrounding property. On October 10, 2023, I, other Board members and Village staff attended the Tesla Groundbreaking and we hope to be at the grand opening as soon as this summer.



APPROVED - Northbrook Court

Redevelopment: This past year, we were extremely excited to approve what I feel will be a historic milestone for our community. On Monday, October 30, the Village Board of Trustees approved a Redevelopment and Economic Incentive Agreement, and several

actions that replaced the 2019 TIF District, generally known as the "Macy's redevelopment" with a new TIF District that encompasses the entire Northbrook Court Mall property and establishes a Business District and 1% sales tax that is anticipated to become effective July 2025. The Northbrook Court site provides a unique opportunity to transform a large, internally-facing mall surrounded by parking fields into a vibrant, walkable, mixed-use neighborhood. The Village is excited to be a partner and support Brookfield Properties in this important project for our community.

Better Than a Resolution: Learn a New Skill to Lower Your Stress Response

2024 is officially here! The new year offers each of us the hope of new beginnings and is a great time to remind ourselves that, regardless of our age, we are always a "work in progress." Thinking of changes and resolutions can be fun but is also a reminder of just how **difficult** change can be. Close your eyes and think about something in your life you would like to "change" for a moment. How do you feel? Invigorated? Excited? Perhaps a bit anxious? Is your body responding in any way? Is your heart racing... your shoulders tensing... your breathing changing?

Those bodily reactions are the work of our Stress Response System (SRS). Our nervous system detects and responds to perceived "threats." However, the threats most of us face are usually not about immediate physical danger, but are more often about our social, financial, and familial responsibilities

and status. Unfortunately, our nervous system does not know the difference. Worst of all, too much activation of the SRS contributes to all types of stress-related illnesses. However, if you can learn to recognize this response, you can also develop strategies to reduce the effects.

Focus on your Breath: One way to counteract the SRS is slow breathing. Breathing slowly and deeply helps signal that the threat is gone. You can experiment with this—maybe choose a few times per day to practice taking 5 or 6 deep breaths. Try breathing slowly before going to sleep, or perhaps when you start to notice yourself feeling stressed. This strategy helps the nervous system stop sending those distress signals.

Catch, Check, and Change:
Reminding yourself that you are not under attack is also helpful. You

can use a cognitive strategy, Catch, Check, and Change: Catch a painful thought (My boss hates me), check that thought against what you know to be true about yourself and your boss (My boss gives very little praise, I am a competent person), and then change the thought (It's unpleasant to feel unappreciated). This strategy helps us perceive the environment as less threatening, which decreases our nervous system response.

There are many more strategies to reduce your resting stress rate and the effort is worth it! The two strategies noted above will not change whatever is happening, but both are powerful in changing how we are reacting to it. A Commission Name Change...

"People of all abilities, Different abilities, Differently Abled, Special Needs, Challenged, Slow, and here is the big one... Retarded." Not only are these terms patronizing, condescending, and dehumanizing, they suggest that the term "disability" is shameful and that individuals with a disability need to be taken care of and treated differently from others.

Well, I can tell you as a mother of a 19-year-old daughter with a disability, what I want most for her is to be treated with respect and kindness. She is not "special." She simply has a disability...so let's move on. One way to do that is to ensure that our Northbrook community uses language that is inclusive and empowering.

As one of six women who have a loved one with a disability or a disability of their own, and who serve on the Village of Northbrook Special Needs Inclusion Commission- we advocated for a name change. We are now the Disability

Inclusion Commission. This shifts the focus to identity, experiences, and empowerment while aligning with goals of self-determination and inclusion.

The Commission is looking forward to continuing to ensure the equitable status, participation, and awareness of individuals with disabilities.

More about the Commission:
The Disability Inclusion Commission coordinates and carries out programs in order to bring about full and equal participation in all aspects of life in Northbrook for people with disabilities. Within parameters authorized by the Board of Trustees, it is charged with:

- Research, understand, evaluate, and advocate local issues, challenges, and opportunities encountered by people with disabilities.
- Coordinate with the activities of other local groups organized to meet the needs of people with disabilities.

- Review and make recommendations about policies, procedures, services, and activities of Village departments as they affect people with disabilities.

- Work in cooperation with Village departments and organizations to bring about maximum participation of people with disabilities.

- Initiate, monitor, and promote legislation at the Village level which advances the equal status of people with disabilities.

- Encourage public awareness and provide information and advice to individuals, businesses, organizations, and public agencies in all matters pertaining to disability.

Meet Terry & Gerry Luc

FATHER-SON DUO CREATE VIBRANT DOWNTOWN MURAL



In downtown Northbrook, residents and visitors are now treated to a stunning mural; a collaborative masterpiece created by a talented father-son duo, Terry and Gerry Luc. This public art project not only showcases their shared love for the arts, but also pays tribute to Northbrook's natural beauty and vibrant community.

Commissioned by the Northbrook Board of Trustees, the mural captures the essence of the four seasons; incorporating elements of Chicago street art to create a captivating and unique piece.

"There is so much beauty and joy in Northbrook that we wanted captured in a different way than ever done before," said Village President Kathryn Ciesla. "Having this landmark in the heart of Northbrook creates a sense of pride for us, especially since it was done by our very own residents."

Terry Luc, a lifelong artist and Northbrook resident, not only attended Glenbrook North High School but also saw all six of his children follow in his footsteps. Among them was Gerry Luc, who grew up watching his father's artistic process from a younger age.

Unbeknownst to both Terry and Gerry, their shared passion would

lead them to collaborate on a significant project right in the heart of their beloved hometown.

"Having this as a father and son project is almost like a dream come true," said Terry Luc.



Terry aimed to design a mural that would deeply connect with the community. To achieve this, he sought the assistance of his talented son Gerry, who had previously created a captivating mural at the University of Illinois Urbana Champaign. Gerry's goal was to introduce the vibrant street art culture of Chicago to the suburban area of Northbrook.

"Stylistically, I thought it was important to reference some different artists from Chicago Street Art. It's a very vibrant scene there, very kind of cartoony based." Gerry Luc said. "And I really kind of wanted

to capture a little bit of that while staying in the subject matter."

In addition to showcasing the four seasons, the Lucs also incorporated Northbrook's water tower into their design, cleverly writing 'Save Ferris' on it. This playful reference pays homage to the iconic 1986 American teen comedy film, *Ferris Bueller's Day Off*, written, co-produced, and directed by John Hughes, who also grew up in Northbrook.

"I love Northbrook, obviously I've been living here forever," said Terry Luc. "And to have a piece - a public art piece that will last for years. It means a lot to me. It definitely does."

Bring Your Own Bag

Northbrook's reusable bag, Reusable Ricky, is back and this time, the BYOBag mission is in full swing! The Village Board of Trustees passed a 10-cent tax on single-use bags to promote the use of reusable bags effective January 1, 2024. This means that each paper or plastic bag used during a purchase will incur a 10-cent charge, with half of the funds generated going to retailers and the other half submitted to the Village.

WHERE DO I NEED TO BRING MY REUSABLE BAG?

All retail stores within Northbrook whose square footage is 3,000 feet or greater must charge the tax. Examples of these types of stores include, but are not limited to: convenience stores, department stores, retail chain stores, hardware stores, and grocery stores. Below you'll see where Reusable Ricky will need his reusable bag, and when the stores will provide one free of charge!

10-CENT TAX ON PAPER OR PLASTIC:

Grocery Store

Retail Store

Hardware Store



NO 10-CENT TAX ON PAPER OR PLASTIC:



Pharmacy

If a bag is provided by a pharmacist that contains a prescription drug, there is no tax.



Farmers Market

If a bag is provided at a seasonal event, such as a farmers market, yard sale, etc, there is no tax.



Restaurants / Take Out

If a bag is used to package carryout food from a food service establishment, there is no tax.

Other exemptions include:

- *Customers that participate in a federal food assistance program (e.g. Supplemental Nutrition Assistance Program [SNAP] and Women, Infants, and Children [WIC]) or an Illinois food assistance program.*
- *If a retail stores is under 3,000 square feet.*





WHAT IS GOING ON AT 1657 SHERMER ROAD?

The Village purchased 1657 Shermer Road from W. W. Grainger, Inc., on May 9, 2018 for \$8 million pursuant to Ordinance No. 2018-5. Following the purchase, the Village evaluated whether the property would be suitable for relocation of the Metra train station in order to reduce the number of traffic closures caused by Metra trains on Shermer and provided public parking on the property. Ultimately, it was determined, by Metra that a relocation would result in additional closures at Techney for trains and as such, relocation of the Metra train station was not pursued further.

The Village Board started the process of placing the 1657 Shermer property (also called the Grainger site) for sale in the fall of 2021. The Village Board sought bids from brokers with extensive experience marketing properties in the greater Chicagoland area, especially on the North Shore. At the September 28, 2021, Village Board meeting, the Village Board approved a listing agreement with real estate brokers Cushman and Wakefield for the property. Cushman and Wakefield marketed the property to seek out interested purchasers who would either re-use the existing building, with its existing zoning use, as it stands today, as well as those interested in redeveloping the site for another use – with the understanding that the latter option required a purchaser to go through a public process to change the land use.

In May of 2022 Lennar Multifamily Communities (now known as Quarterra Multifamily) entered into an agreement with the Village to purchase the 10.3 acre property for \$10.5 million for an approximate five-story, mixed-use development on about 8.8 acres consisting of approximately 335 luxury apartment homes (five of which will be set aside as affordable housing in accordance with the Village's Inclusionary Housing Ordinance), amenities and a parking structure with approximately 500 stalls. The development also includes an approximately 6,500 square foot retail parcel along Shermer Road to be developed for retail uses, such as a restaurant and off-street parking for approximately 60 cars.

To comply with the Village's affordable housing requirements, Quarterra, upon purchase of the property, will donate approximately 1.5 acres to Housing Opportunities Development Corporation (HODC), a non-profit affordable housing developer and operator, for 45 supportive housing units to be constructed as affordable housing for persons with developmental or intellectual disabilities. This is in addition to the five affordable units within the main development.

Quarterra agreed to a series of conditions under the sales agreement including seeking necessary zoning approvals for their proposed redevelopment. The zoning approvals were granted by the Village in January 2023 and an amendment to the Purchase and Sales Agreement was approved which provided for a closing date set for no later than December 24, 2023. In November 2023, the Village received a request from Quarterra seeking a 120-day extension of closing/sale of property. Quarterra and HODC have stated their commitment to the project and that the extension is sought in response to current market conditions. At a Board of Trustee meeting on Tuesday, December 12, 2023, the Board approved a 120-day extension to Quarterra for the closing date on the property.

Popular Annual Financial Report

The Village Popular Annual Financial Report (PAFR for short) for the fiscal year ended April 30, 2023 is now publicly available. This report contains financial highlights and key information from the Village's more detailed annual financial audit and presents it in an easy-to-read format. This is an additional voluntary report prepared by Village staff to provide a high level of transparency to interested parties and individuals. Pre-Treat with Anti-Icing Liquid Salt

Road salt has adverse effects on the environment when it washes off roadways, seeps into the ground, and enters our waterways. The Village utilizes a beet juice/salt brine blend to pre-treat roads before a snowstorm, which reduces the amount of salt used on roadways. To help the environment, you can do the same at home!
