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What Does It Mean To Be Keeper Of The Stories – Part Two

For 50 years, the Historical Society has taken on the responsibility to tell your stories. There are stories around every corner. Stories that tell the beginning of our community, and stories that tell what's going on now. Every place you look, and every person you talk with has a story to tell. These stories are unique for each storyteller yet often have threads that tie us all together. Civic recently celebrated its 100th Northbrook Days event and on September 15, we will celebrate our annual Shermerfest from noon to 4 PM. These two outdoor festivals are the oldest in our community and are fond memories because of the joy of gathering with friends and neighbors to enjoy the fun while giving back to our community.

Each month there are milestone happenings recorded. Some of the September/October happenings are the:

- 1947 dedication of the youth center in the village Green Park
- 1953 first day of class at Glenbrook high school serving students from both Glenview and Northbrook.
- 1954 Grand opening of the Northbrook Shopping Plaza

- 1958 joint referendum passage for construction of Northbrook Junior High and Meadowhill Park.
- 1962 the first day of classes, the new Glenbrook South which changed the name of our high school to Glenbrook North
- 1963 the official opening for Northbrook direct pipeline to Lake Michigan water
- 1974 groundbreaking for the Islamic Cultural Center
- 1979 First Shermerfest and the dedication of the Sheeley Center for Performing Arts at Glenbrook North
- 1980 dedication of the North Suburban YMCA - Northbrook
- 1995 closing of the Glenview Naval Air Station
- 1999 opening of the Northbrook Library after spending a year operating in the vacant Jewel (now Sunset) store

Last month was the anniversary of the dedication of the Hope Union Church in 1893. In October 2017, the Northbrook Historical Society became the fifth owner and first to use the building for a use other than a House of Worship. The building began as a non-denominational church. In 1924, the Northbrook Presbyterian Church added a large wing added after the original church lifted and turned to face Chapel Ct. As our Village grew, so did the church membership. In 1949, after the Village Presbyterian Church's new building opened the church became the property to St. Giles Episcopal Church and then in 1958 the Christian Science Society bought the church and 2017 sold it to the Historical Society for \$10.

In days gone by, we could gather facts about our village in the newspapers. Now we are on social media sites to gather information about the Village, opening dates for new business and restaurant. We do this because some day in the future this information will be part of the beloved memories of growing up in Northbrook for this generation. As always, we rely on you to help us gather and tell the real stories relevant to today's history and your beloved memories.

Emergency Preparedness Month

In September, the Village of Northbrook joins communities nationwide in recognizing Emergency Preparedness Month. This annual observance, established by the Federal Emergency Management Agency, aims to raise awareness about the importance of preparing for emergencies and disasters.

Be Informed

In Northbrook, we face the potential for severe weather events such as thunderstorms, tornadoes, and winter storms. It's crucial to stay informed about these risks. The Village recommends signing up for Northbrook Notify, our emergency alert system, which sends

critical information directly to your phone or email. Scan this QR code to sign up for notifications.



On Tuesday, September 24, 2024, at 10am, there will be a Village-wide system test for all those signed up for notifications.

Make a Plan

Developing a family emergency plan is essential. Discuss with your family how you will contact one another and where you will meet if separated. Identify a friend or relative in another area who can act as a central point of contact.

Build a Kit

Building an emergency supply kit can be a lifesaver during a disaster. Essential items include water (one gallon per person per day for three days), non-perishable food (three-day supply), a battery-powered or hand-crank radio, flashlight and extra batteries, first aid kit, medications, important documents, cash, personal hygiene items, and pet supplies. Regularly review and update your kit, considering any special family needs.

The Village of Northbrook is committed to fostering a culture of preparedness. By taking these steps, residents can enhance their ability to respond to and recover from emergencies. Visit [ready.gov](https://www.ready.gov) for more information.

Tesla - Northbrook is now home to a Tesla Sales, Service, and Delivery (SSD) facility at 1200 Skokie Boulevard. Erika's Lighthouse Celebrates 20 Years of Youth Impact

How Erika's Lighthouse has Impacted Over 2 Million Lives with Support in Mental Health By Nell Osborne, Mental Health Therapist, Erika's Lighthouse

This year Erika's Lighthouse celebrated its 20th year anniversary of shedding light on depression and youth mental health. Erika's Lighthouse began in 2004 after a tragedy occurred and Erika, a 14 year old, died by suicide. For 20 years Erika's Lighthouse has grown to be an international non-profit that provides prevention and educational programs within school systems, families, and communities. One of the most impactful concepts behind Erika's Lighthouse is that they began at a kitchen table with the goal to ensure that every child has access to mental health services and can be peer led. What started as a small group of teens and adults has grown to have impacted over 535,000 students in just the 2022-2023 school year alone, which does not include the overall impact of two million.

What exactly does this mean? It means that 97% of students who receive Erika's Lighthouse educational curriculum are able to identify at least one trusted adult and 84% of students would speak to a trusted adult about their mental health. This results in a decrease in suicide rates, increased sense of community, and education surrounding mental health. Erika's Lighthouse aims to support positive mental health environments while having open conversations about mental health and mental illness. As a mental health professional within the community as well as a clinical ambassador for Erika's Lighthouse, my goal is to bridge the gap between families, communities, and school systems regarding the stigma surrounding mental health. Research has shown that community support and connection is an essential component of healthy mental

health along with healing and recovering from mental illness. Erika's Lighthouse focuses on just that- bringing the community together with education, prevention, support, and conversations.

As a community member, mother, mental health therapist, and ambassador with Erika's Lighthouse I have been hosting community fundraising events throughout the summer. Thank you to Culvers in Northbrook, Pinstripes, Goldfish Swim School, and Little Louie's for help with these events.

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Diversity, Equity & Inclusion in Northbrook

Embracing Neurodiversity: Affirming Care in Occupational and Speech Therapy

Neurodiversity affirming care in occupational therapy and speech/language therapy helps a person develop skills based on who they are at their core. Neurodiversity is an understanding that brain function is varied in the population in terms of sensory processing, motor abilities, cognition and social skills and these differences are valued. Strengths and difficulties in each of these areas are unique to each individual.

Those with neurological differences including those with ADHD, autism, dyslexia, and a variety of other conditions benefit from neuro-affirming therapy which is different from an older understanding of therapy that often aims to "normalize" individuals with neurological differences, inadvertently perpetuating a deficit-based model. By focusing on an individual's strengths and providing tailored

interventions, neurodiversity affirming therapies help build confidence and improve social-emotional well-being while they further develop communication, social, and daily living skills. A neuro affirming speech-language pathologist working with a client with ADHD knows that those with ADHD often have a natural ability to think creatively and approach problems from a unique perspective. The therapist could use this strength to help the client develop organization and planning skills.

Neuro-affirming therapy can help neurodiverse individuals learn to enjoy and participate more fully in their community. When neurodiversity is respected, accommodations are more easily implemented by the individual and their communities, which in turn helps create a richer community and culture of acceptance and inclusion.

Northbrook's Amplifying Potential Therapy (APT) offers neurodiversity affirming speech and occupational therapy services for children through young adults. APT's approach is grounded in the belief that every individual has potential that should be nurtured and enhanced. In addition to 1:1 therapy, APT offers social opportunities five days a week for neurodiverse individuals, including groups for non-speaking autistic people focused on practicing alternative augmentative communication skills alongside peers to help them connect, learn, grow, and develop communication.

Meet Amy Oberholtzer

From Living Room to Community Lifeline for Youth: Amy Oberholtzer's Journey to Founding CATCH

Amy Oberholtzer was a parent of a GBN student in 2017 and faced a reality known too well by many fellow parents — having a student that was impacted by anxiety and other mental health challenges. In response to seeing her child struggle, Amy felt galvanized to take action not only to help her own child, but to find and help other parents who were witnessing their children experiencing the same pain. From this collective concern for the health and well-being of the community's youngest members, CATCH (Community Action Together for Children's Health) was established in 2018. Amy recalls the inception of CATCH as an organic process of like minded parents deciding to take action.

"CATCH was born in my living room with moms that I had known for years way back from a preschool playgroup. I batted the idea around and they were on board and off we went."

From the outset, a key component of CATCH has been strong community involvement. The foundation of CATCH was built on the idea of dedicated volunteers collaborating to enhance the well-being of children and adolescents through a community-focused approach to health and wellness. CATCH sought to collaborate with local schools, healthcare providers, and businesses to create a support network primarily for parents and also directly for students.

This network was further strengthened by CATCH creating the Parent Support Network (PSN). CATCH's PSN offers tailored support for parents and caregivers by offering access to personalized

resources and opportunities for one-on-one connections with other parents. Additionally, participants can learn from peers in small, confidential groups. These programs help parents of children facing emotional challenges to feel less isolated and receive valuable support and advice from those who have experienced similar situations.

By 2020, CATCH was gaining momentum and making a difference in the lives of local families and like everything in society was shut down by the COVID-19 Pandemic. CATCH was able to pivot and found itself filling a growing need to aid families with children that were suffering from the Pandemic's lingering mental health effects. The wide spread adoption of virtual meetings during this time allowed CATCH to broaden its scope by offering virtual webinars and virtual education opportunities not only around the anxiety and uncertainty of COVID, but also childhood mental health in general.

CATCH has continued these virtual events and outreach efforts covering a range of topics to counteract the ever growing concerns that mental health organizations have reported in kids and teens. Throughout parenthood and her work with CATCH, Amy has never seen this such a significant level of threat to the mental health wellbeing of youth today.

"I can say unequivocally that we are in a youth mental health crisis. Kids, teens, and youth are reporting significantly increased levels of anxiety and depression. Educators we partner with are seeing a significant increase in behavior challenges, which signal discomfort and dysregulation in the minds of young people."

Amy attributes this unprecedented level of teen mental health issues to the rise of social media and digital technology, which has increased the exposure of young people to cyberbullying and unrealistic comparisons with others. To combat this, CATCH has held targeted events for parents to educate them on what their children are facing. CATCH has also launched programs and resources for students. One such program is called Coping Kits which are mental health kits given to each third, sixth, and ninth grade student in the Northbrook area schools. The contents of the kits are curated by CATCH in consultation with mental health experts to give students information and items that are meant to reduce anxiety and offer a lifeline in case the recipient finds themselves in crisis.



Items include puzzles, fidgets of various types, scented Chapstick, and other tactile items that students can turn to as a distraction when things feel overwhelming. The kits also include step-by-step guides on how to calm down when overwhelmed and a card with a QR code that points to services that can provide support in times of crisis.

After nearly a decade of passionate advocacy through her work with CATCH, Amy has decided to retire and pass the torch to someone else to lead CATCH forward. As time goes on and the threats that CATCH combats continue to evolve, Amy is steadfast that the organization that was started in her living room will also evolve and grow.

"CATCH has an amazing network of individuals supporting it. CATCH would not be what it is today without the volunteers, CATCH board members, families, and partners that have cared deeply about our mission to create a community approach to prioritizing the emotional well-being of our children."

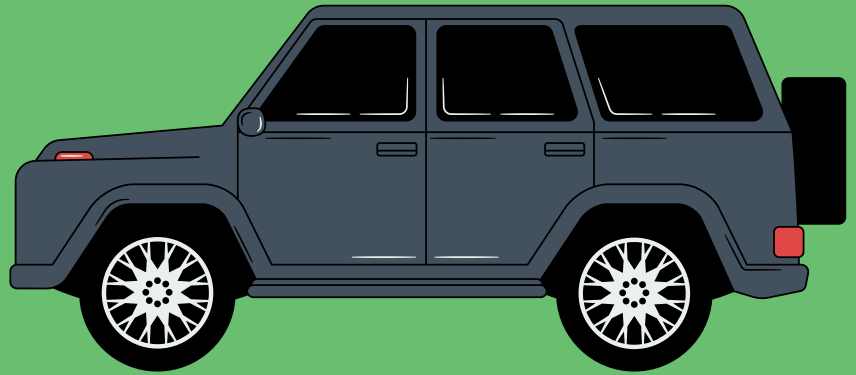

PROTECTING YOUR HOME, VEHICLE

*Ensuring the safety of your home, vehicle, and personal information is more important than ever
ensuring peace of mind*

AUTO THEFT:

- Lock all car doors: Ensure all doors are securely locked.
- Completely close all windows: Double-check that all windows are fully closed.
- Remove all valuables: Take all valuable items out of the car.
- Never leave spare keys in the car: Do not leave your spare keys inside the vehicle or leave it running unattended.
- Install an alarm system with GPS: Enhance security with an alarm system that includes GPS tracking.
- Park in well-lit areas: Choose well-lit locations and avoid isolated areas when parking.
- Use secure license plate screws: Install secure screws to prevent license plate theft.



HOME BURGLARY:

- Secure all entry points: Close and lock all doors, including garage doors and side gates.
- Keep windows locked: Ensure all windows are closed and locked at all times.
- Install motion sensor lights: Set up exterior motion sensor lights for added security.
- Manage mail when out of town: ask a neighbor to pick up your mail, packages, and newspapers if you are away.
- Install surveillance and alarm systems: use video surveillance and alarm systems, such as a video doorbell.
- The Police Department offers a house watch program for residents who are away from their home for four days or more visit northbrookil.us/watch or call (847) 664-4180.



LE, AND PERSONAL INFORMATION

Here are some essential tips to help you protect against theft, online scams, and pickpocketing, for you and your family.



ONLINE SCAMS:

Be cautious of scammers who pressure or intimidate you into compliance. Always verify before taking any action by contacting the company directly through their official website. Avoid clicking on links in emails from unfamiliar or suspicious sources. Report any scam attempts, whether you fell victim to them or not, to help prevent others from being targeted.

If someone instructs you to purchase gift cards for:

- Bail or ransom
- Social Security benefits
- IRS debt
- Assistance for a family member in trouble
- To reconcile a bank account balance

Disconnect immediately! This is a scam. Remember, gift cards are meant for gifts, not for payments.

PICKPOCKETING:

- Be aware of your surroundings: Frequent bumps in a crowd may indicate pickpocket activity.
- Limit what you carry: Take only the cash and cards you need.
- Do not leave your wallet unattended in a grocery or shopping cart.
- Use secure handbags or purses: Choose bags with zippers or locking flaps, keep them closed when not in use, and carry them in front and close to your body.
- Carry wallets securely: Place wallets inside a closed coat pocket or your front pants pocket. Avoid keeping wallets in rear pockets unless they are secured with a chain or button.

LRS Recycling and Refuse Services



The Village of Northbrook has selected LRS as its new Recycling and Refuse provider effective September 1, 2024. The normal service day will be delayed one day because of the Labor Day holiday. As LRS begins its contract with the Village, below are some key details about the LRS transition.

Refuse and Recycling Service

Carts & material must be placed out by 6:30am on your service day. Residents may set out as many recyclable items as they wish each week for collection. Recyclable material that won't fit in recycling carts may be placed at the side of the cart. Larger or bulky boxes should be broken down before collection. Refuse disposal is limited to the capacity of your cart. Any excess refuse bags will require a sticker and need to be under 50 lbs.

Organics & Yard Waste Service

Yard waste collection operates weekly from April 1 - November 30, on Wednesdays regardless of your regular refuse and recycling service day. This service will change to bi-weekly from December 1 - March 31. As part of LRS sustainability efforts, you may place organic waste in with yard waste. Please limit organic waste to food scraps.

WM Cart Removal

Throughout mid-to-late August WM and LRS removed and replaced all refuse & recycling carts in the Village. If you still have your old WM cart, please reach out to WM at 800-964-8988 to schedule cart removal.

Yard Waste Sticker Refunds – September 1 through September 30

Residents can return unused WM stickers to Village Hall for a refund between September 1 through September 30. Please note refunds could take between 4 – 6 weeks to process. LRS will also accept old WM stickers through October. LRS also has a sticker program. Yard waste must be in containers no larger than 32 gallons, biodegradable paper bags (minimum 2-ply thickness), and bundled appropriately (no more than 50 lbs. each, no longer than 4 ft., and not exceeding 2 ft. in diameter). Each item must have a sticker and be placed curbside on Wednesdays. Stickers cost \$3.25 each, and are red in color. Stickers are currently available for purchase at Village Hall.

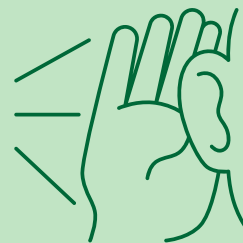

**Reminder: Northbrook's 9-Month Gas
Leaf Blower Ban Starts In 2025**

Starting January 1, 2025, use of gas-powered leaf blowers will be banned during the summer and winter months when their efficacy is less needed to meet landscaping expectations. They will be allowed use in the months of April, October, and November. This allows a 4-week and 8-week window during spring and fall clean up to use gas powered leaf blowers. Battery powered or electric leaf blowers are encouraged during the 9-months when gas-powered alternatives are restricted. This decision comes as part of a broader initiative to reduce noise pollution and promote environmental sustainability within the community.

BENEFITS

1. Limits noise level in neighborhoods - When measured at 50 feet away, average decibel levels of battery-operated blowers range from 52-65, while gas-powered leaf blowers range from 60-83. A major difference between the sounds from gas vs. electric blowers is that gas-powered leaf blowers have a low frequency, which is more able to penetrate walls and windows compared to the higher frequency noise of electric blowers.
2. Decreases air pollutants - Workers who operate commercial equipment are frequently exposed to emissions from the equipment for several hours per day, multiple days per week during periods of use. Additionally, other members of the public, including children, may also encounter high levels of emissions from commercial landscape maintenance equipment. For instance, operating a gas-powered leaf blower for half an hour can produce emissions equivalent to driving a Ford F-150 pickup truck from Chicago to San Francisco and back!
3. Safer for wildlife and the environment - All leaf blowers blast insects, habitat and soil at hurricane-force winds (up to 220 mph) affecting birds and beneficial insects like butterflies and pollinators. The use of leaf blowers eliminates essential habitat, harms soil health and leads to erosion and stormwater runoff.

NEXT STEPS

The Village now requires landscapers to apply for an annual Contractor Business License at no cost. Residents should inform their landscapers about this change. Complaints, including the time and location of violations, can be filed via GoNorthbrook request page at northbrook.il.us/Service-Requests. Starting January 1st, the Village will offer two incentive programs—one for residents and one for businesses—to help offset the cost of switching from gas-powered to eco-friendly options. Both programs will operate on a first-come, first-served basis. Residents are encouraged to discuss the benefits of battery-powered leaf blowers with their landscapers and prepare for the changes ahead. Together, the community can make significant strides toward sustainability and environmental responsibility.
