## **History Hidden in Plain Sight - A favorite memory during my time with the Historical Society**

For over a decade, the Historian's Corner has relayed stories about our community. Some of the stories are about places well known, and others are hidden stories. It has been my honor to be part of the Northbrook History Museum volunteer staff for over half of its existence, and on the board for almost a quarter of a century. During that time there have been incredible discoveries that I feel blessed to have discovered or witnessed. One discovery is that I have direct family ties to two of our founding settlers. Those discoveries came about when their family members reached out to the museum to arrange visits. On both occasions, I had the opportunity to spend time with individuals who, as it turned out, were my distant relatives.

One of the stories began on a beautiful fall day in 2012, when I stood in Techny Prairie Park and Fields with a descendent of the original landowner Dardanus Bishop.

He travelled from Northern Wisconsin to show the Glenview History Center and the Northbrook History Museum the Indigenous artifacts his ancestors had uncovered when the land was first tilled. He expected to see an area that had no resemblance to what his fifth great grandfather saw when he first came here from New York. Instead, he was overjoyed to see a pristine prairie which looked very much like the prairie that greeted his ancestor in 1841.



The Indigenous artifacts and family stories have been handed down through generations. After his first visit we continued our conversation about family stories and our shared love of family history.



Exchanging our research and his family history stories we soon made an amazing discovery. Unbeknownst to us at the time, the man I took to see his fifth great grandfather's land is my distant cousin.

Dardanus Bishop, the first purchaser of the land from the federal government for \$1.25 an acre was the second great grandson of my seventh great grandparents.

Together we stood on family land admiring the amazing view from the past. For us, Techny Prairie Parks and Fields is a real Trail Through Time.

# Northbrook Leads the Way in Sustainability Ahead of Earth Month

As Earth Month approaches in April, the Village is showcasing significant progress in its commitment to sustainability. The recently released 2024 Climate Action Progress Report highlights major strides in reducing greenhouse gas emissions, surpassing key targets outlined in the Village's Climate Action Plan (CAP). With a 40.8% reduction in emissions since 2010, Northbrook is not only meeting but exceeding its climate goals—just in time to reflect on the importance of environmental stewardship.

### Climate Action Plan: Sustainability Roadmap

Adopted in August 2021, Northbrook's CAP set ambitious goals to cut emissions 35% by 2030 and 80% by 2050. The plan outlines 200 action items, with the first phase prioritizing 100 initiatives. To ensure accountability and progress, the village collaborates quarterly with local schools, the library, and the park district, while the Sustainability Commission provides monthly input.

This graphic illustrates the current progress progress we have made on the CAP.



### Greenhouse Gas Inventory: Measuring Progress

The 2023 GHG Inventory, conducted by paleBLUEdot, highlights the village's success in reducing emissions across various sectors:

- Electricity-related emissions dropped 63.7% since 2010.
- Natural gas consumption emissions decreased 22.9%.
- Transportation emissions, increased by 6.2%, showing a need for further action in this sector.
- Solid waste emissions rose by 10.1%, highlighting an area for improvement.

Northbrook's overall progress remains on track with its long-term goals.

### Leadership in Municipal Sustainability

Northbrook's own municipal operations have outpaced expectations, achieving a 61.4% reduction in emissions since 2010—far exceeding the CAP's 2023 goal of 27.4%. Key factors include a shift to renewable energy sources and improved efficiency measures.

**A Greener Future for Northbrook**  
With sustainability at the forefront of local policy, Northbrook is setting a strong example for suburban communities looking to combat climate change. By continuing to invest in clean energy, waste reduction, and transportation improvements, the village is well on its way to meeting its ambitious 2050 goals.

### Ongoing Initiatives

- **Reusable Bag Program:** Reduction in plastic bag use, with continued education and business partnerships.
- **Leaf Blower Regulations:** Seasonal restrictions from April through October to promote noise reduction and environmental protection.

- **All-In Composting Program:** Expanding efforts to encourage composting and long-term sustainable waste management. See page 9 for more information.

### Priorities for 2025 and Beyond

Based on recent trends, the 2023 report recommends that Northbrook focus on:

- Expanding electric vehicle (EV) adoption to curb transportation emissions.
- Reducing natural gas usage through beneficial electrification.
- Enhancing organic waste collection and landfill diversion.
- Updating CAP reduction targets to reflect progress since 2021 and establish new goals.

Our environmental initiatives are making a real impact. Thank you for your continued support and dedication to making Northbrook the best place to live, work, and grow.

### MENTAL HEALTH HIGHLIGHT

#### Village Awards Opioid Settlement Grants to Support Community Efforts Combating the Crisis

In January 2025, the Village of Northbrook awarded grants from the National Multistate Opioid Settlement to local organizations working to combat the opioid crisis. These funds will support efforts to provide treatment, improve education, and enhance safety measures in the community.



Brightside Clinic Receives Grant at Board Meeting

Brightside Clinic received a \$19,500 grant to provide immediate, no-cost treatment for individuals struggling with opioid use

disorder. Regardless of insurance status, those in need will have access to critical medical assistance, helping them take the first step toward recovery. Brightside Clinic's work plays a vital role in addressing the ongoing public health challenge posed by opioid addiction, ensuring that no one is turned away due to financial barriers.

Glenbrook North High School and School District 225 were awarded \$7,500 to train staff and school nurses in the use of FDA-approved opioid reversal drugs. This initiative will empower educators and healthcare professionals with the knowledge and resources needed to respond swiftly in the event of an opioid overdose, potentially saving lives. By equipping schools with these essential tools, the Village is reinforcing its commitment to protecting students and the broader school community.



GBN/District 225 Receives Grant at Board Meeting

The Northbrook Police Department will use its settlement funds to purchase TruNarc analyzers, allowing first responders to safely identify drugs without direct contact, reducing exposure to substances like fentanyl. The Village remains committed to addressing the opioid crisis through strategic funding and partnerships, enhancing treatment, emergency response, and public safety. Charlie Beinlich's Food and Tap is third generation owned and a true local favorite with the perfect old fashioned burger and the best shrimp cocktail in Northbrook. Beinlich's opened in 1950 and is located at 290 Skokie Blvd and just like the 1950s, it is cash only!



Opening in 1967, Little Louie's is also a family favorite with something for everyone from creative wraps, classic Italian beefs to hotdogs, fries, and healthy options. Located across from the Village Green at 1342 Shermer Road in downtown Northbrook it is open seven days a week for lunch and dinner.



Barnaby's of Northbrook has been serving the Northshore Community for over 40 years and is best known for its thin and

crispy, corn meal crust pizzas made fresh daily. It is no fuss, seat yourself and order with a cashier. Perfect for families with plenty of house specialties in addition to pizza.

Winter has been a great chance to try out these new spots including Lazy Dog Restaurant and Bar, Cabo Mexican Cocina, North Shore Bistro, and Moksha Indian Grill. # SEVENTH GRADER LAUNCHES LEGACY PANTRY TO FIGHT FOOD INSECURITY IN NORTHBROOK



Surrounded by the extraordinary beauty of Starved Rock State Park, Nathan Metzl found inspiration for a project to give back to those in need in Northbrook. During a family trip this past summer, Nathan and his family were walking through Ottawa, IL, discussing his upcoming Bar Mitzvah. For months, he had been thinking about a meaningful community project, and that day, he stumbled upon an idea with those in need in mind.

"We walked past a micro pantry—something like a Little Free Library, but filled with food," Nathan recalled. "We started talking about food insecurity and how these pantries help meet the needs of people struggling to afford meals. When I realized Northbrook didn't have one, I knew this was something I needed to bring to my community."

Nathan wasted no time turning his vision into reality. He researched mini pantries online and knew he needed to secure a location, build a storage cabinet, and gather community support. His biggest challenge? Finding a suitable site. Determined, he spoke at a Northbrook Village Board meeting, using the public forum to ask for help. That bold step connected

him with Northbrook Chamber of Commerce and Industry Executive Director Kathi Quinn and Chamber Board Director Mark DeBartolo, who helped secure a location.



Legacy Pantry located at 2002 Walters Avenue

That initial inspiration on this family vacation became the Legacy Pantry, located at 2002 Walters Avenue at the headquarters of the Chamber of Commerce. This Free Mini Pantry, operating under the motto "Take what you need, leave what you can," provides essential food items like cereal, canned goods, and pasta for those in need. With the support of his grandfather, Tommy Rifkin, who built the pantry's cabinet, the Legacy Pantry was officially installed and celebrated with a ribbon-cutting ceremony attended by U.S. Rep. Brad Schneider, State Rep. Tracy Katz Muhl, and local Village representatives.

The name Legacy Pantry holds special meaning for Nathan. "Legacy means carrying on someone's ideas of living," he explained. "My Torah reading for my Bar Mitzvah was about Moses'

legacy, and this project also honors my Saba's legacy of doing good in the world. When you leave food for someone in need at the pantry, you are leaving a legacy of kindness."

Since its launch, the Legacy Pantry has been embraced by the Northbrook community. "We don't know who takes the food, and that's the point—there's no barrier to access," Nathan said. "But we've seen it being used, and that's an amazing feeling. Since it's gotten colder, we've had to restock once or twice a week. My school, Wood Oaks, even held a food drive that helped us through the holidays."

For those inspired to make a difference, Nathan offers this advice: "Research your idea thoroughly and ask everyone you know for help. I didn't know where to put the pantry, but someone suggested I speak at the Village Board meeting, and just a few weeks later, my idea became reality. And most importantly, never give up. If you want to help others, you can make real change in your community."

Nathan expresses deep gratitude to all who have contributed food and donations. "Every bag of food, every dollar donated—it all helps fill the cracks in the fight against food insecurity," he said.

Nathan's inspiration to make a difference in Northbrook can inspire us all to do the same in our own ways. The Village is proud to have him as this issue's Northbrook Strong Neighborhood Spotlight.

## IMPROVEMENT PROJECT

### Goals of the Project:

Support businesses in the Downtown and create a better sense of place for residents and visitors to the area with enhanced streetscape and more outdoor dining opportunities.

### Project Features:

- Expansion of sidewalks on the Northside of Shermer Road and adjacent to 1348 Shermer Road.
- Replacement of aging brick crosswalks with more visible and more easily maintained material.
- Enhanced landscaping including replacement of street trees in tree pits that are more pedestrian friendly.
- Installation of ADA parking spaces.
- Replacement of aging brick in sidewalks with decorative stamped/colored concrete.
- Refurbishment of existing streetlights and installation of new bollards.

### Project Timeline:

- Mid-March - Beginning of construction.
- End of June - Substantial completion of construction.

# ALL-IN COMPOSTING STARTS IN MAY

## WHAT IS ALL-IN COMPOSTING?

Starting in May, all LRS Residential customers in the Northbrook corporate limits will receive a 35-gallon LRS composting cart for year-round disposal of yard waste and food scraps. The new composting cart has a yellow lid and will be delivered to homes at the curb during the last two weeks in April. You can begin composting with curbside pick-up each Wednesday starting May 7, 2025 thru November 30, then every other Wednesday from December 1 thru March 31. Residents who do not wish to compost and prefer to purchase collection stickers for yard waste when needed, must decline / opt out of the composting program prior to March 10, 2025 to avoid delivery of the new composting cart (additional fees may apply to remove the composting cart once delivered). Similar to those customers who do not use recycling, there is no decrease in monthly billing for opting out of composting. 

**VILLAGE LAUNCHES INTERACTIVE  
DEVELOPMENT MAP**



Talk around town of new developments often takes center stage. To help keep residents informed about commercial development projects shaping the community, the Village has launched a new online tool to track the progress of new developments.

The Northbrook Development Tracker Map, now accessible through the Village website, offers an interactive and user-friendly map that tracks the commercial development projects shaping our local economic growth.

The map allows users to explore new developments by category: **Village Approved**, **Under Construction**, or **Construction Completed**, each color-coded for easy navigation enabling users to quickly identify the status of projects across town. Village staff updates the map monthly to ensure accuracy. Completed projects will also feature professional photography, giving residents a clear view of Northbrook's latest developments.

## Village to Replace Water Meters Starting This April

### Overview

The Village will be replacing water meters throughout the water distribution system as part of a twelve-month project starting in April of this year. This project provides several benefits including:

- Improving customer service by implementing a remotely read system;
- Eliminating the requirement to have a Meter Reader enter the premises to confirm water usage;
- Supports the Village's sustainability goals to partner with customers in reducing water consumption through improved meter accuracy in tracking the volume of water used;
- Enhancing leak detection as required by Illinois Department of Natural Resources.

Illinois plumbers will install new meters. Installers will have proper IDs, uniforms, and marked vehicles. Before meter installers begin work in your area, you'll receive a mailed postcard notification from Veregy with a phone number and website to schedule your appointment. Replacements will only occur by appointment; no one will visit without prior scheduling.

### How to Prepare

To prepare for this project, residents and businesses should confirm the existing meter is accessible. A meter is considered accessible when it has a clear unobstructed space of roughly 24 inches by 36 inches around them, although larger meters may require additional space.
