A HISTORY OF COLLABORATION AND PARTNERSHIPS BUILD A BETTER COMMUNITY

The Northbrook calendar year contains events brought to you by various organizations. These groups come together to facilitate community activities that begin new traditions and provide cherished childhood and family memories. We are a month past Northbrook Days, a beloved community festival for 100 years. The first Northbrook Day on August 29, 1925 began as a partnership with the State of Illinois' Good Roads committee tasked with turning dirt streets into "hard" paved roads.



Ed Landwehr, a member of both groups, worked with the Village to organize the very first Northbrook Day as a celebration of the progress Northbrook had made since its name change. The event was such a success that it started the 100-year history of the

festival. A long-held oral-history belief that the festival was always in Village Green until recently is incorrect as it was held at two other locations for five years in the 1930s and 40s. At one time Civic partnered with the American Legion and the Northbrook Volunteer Fire Department as co-sponsors to raise funding for the construction of a home for the Legion, and new fire equipment. All the profits from Northbrook Days are returned to the community in scholarships, to organizations and governmental institutions.

The second oldest outdoor community festival is the Historical Society's Shermerfest held each fall since 1979. We could not do it without our partners the Northbrook Park District, the Village of Northbrook, Sunset Foods, and Wagner Farms. Mark your calendars for the 2025 Shermerfest on September 21, from noon to 4 PM at Village Green Park. Not only is this year the 47th annual Shermerfest, but it is also the 25th year anniversary of our "Classic Northbrook" Car and Truck show.

As the Keeper of the Stories, the Society has also been busy planning ways to commemorate three important

anniversaries in 2026. The celebration of Americas 250th birthday, the Village of Northbrook's 125th birthday, and the 50th anniversary of the opening of the Northbrook History Museum to the public for the first time. These three anniversaries happened together on July 4, 1976, during celebrations for the 200th Bicentennial of America.

Borrowing from the past, the narration used at the Village's Centennial opening program on November 18, 2000, and previously unseen photos combine in a new video that takes the viewer through Village history from its inception. Please mark your calendar and join us for the video screening at 7 PM on November 4, at the Northbrook Public Library.

This September, the Village of Northbrook joins communities across the country in recognizing Emergency Preparedness Month—an annual initiative led by the Federal Emergency Management Agency (FEMA) to promote readiness for emergencies and disasters.

Make a Plan

Developing a family emergency plan is essential. Discuss with your family how you will contact one another and where you will meet if separated. Identify a friend or relative in another area who can act as a central point of contact.

Build a Kit

An emergency supply kit can make a critical difference.

Recommended essentials include:

- Water (one gallon per person per day for at least three days)
- Non-perishable food (three-day supply)
- Battery-powered or hand-crank radio
- Flashlight and extra batteries
- First aid kit and medications
- Important documents and cash
- Personal hygiene items
- Pet supplies

Review and update your kit regularly to meet your household's needs. Learn more at ready.gov.

A Message from President Ciesla Village of Northbrook

Downtown Northbrook Gets a Fresh Look and Feel

I'm proud to share that the Village of Northbrook has completed the first phase of Downtown streetscape improvements. Since launching this project in March, our goal has been clear: to strengthen our Downtown business district while creating a more inviting, safe, and vibrant space for residents and visitors alike.



This phase involved important construction and infrastructure upgrades, including widening sidewalks along Shermer Road to create over 3,300 square feet of dedicated year-round outdoor dining space. We installed decorative stamped concrete to clearly define dining and pedestrian areas, enhancing both function and aesthetics.



Safety has been a top priority. We replaced five brick crosswalks with more visible alternatives and added 16 crash-rated security bollards and three new pedestrian push-button signals at key intersections, including Shermer and Meadow. Over 1,050 feet of curb was replaced, and 2,650 square feet of parking and roadway resurfaced, including the addition of two new ADA-compliant parking spaces to improve accessibility.


To brighten and secure our streets, 13 existing light poles were refurbished and upgraded with energy-efficient LED fixtures, complemented by 28 illuminated bollards along key pedestrian corridors.



Our landscaping improvements reflect our commitment to sustainability and stormwater management. We planted 20 new trees with advanced irrigation and structural soil systems, regraded walkways to better manage runoff, and installed 300 feet of new storm sewer.



These improvements are about more than construction – they represent our dedication to creating a Downtown that's safe, welcoming, and thriving. I thank our residents, businesses, and partners for their continued support as we work together to revitalize Northbrook's heart.



This is just the beginning, this project is part of ongoing efforts to enhance our Downtown and the Village, support local businesses, and keep Northbrook a place people want to visit and residents are proud to call home.

MENTAL HEALTH HIGHLIGHT

NEW BOOK FEATURES COLLECTION OF HUMOROUS STORIES FROM THE DISABILITY COMMUNITY



Northbrook residents Mike Walther and Randi Gillespie know firsthand that life in the disability community comes with challenges, but also with laughter, joy, and unforgettable moments. Both have loved ones with disabilities and work at Oak Wealth Advisors, a Northbrook-based financial advisory firm dedicated to helping families plan for the future of their loved ones with disabilities. In fact, every member of the Oak Wealth Advisors team has a personal connection to the disability community.

Their new book, *It's Okay to Laugh*, is a first-of-its-kind collection of humorous stories from families across the country, many of them right here in Northbrook. The idea was born after years of hearing clients share lighthearted moments during meetings, presentations, and lectures. "Why don't we take the time to document and share all the funny stories people are telling us?" recalled Mike, the firm's founder and president. Randi, Director of Special Needs Services, quickly added, "I've got a zillion stories about my own daughter that I can contribute."

The resulting book, created in collaboration with comedian Ryan Niemiller, from America's Got Talent, reminds readers that humor is a universal connector. Whether or not you have a loved one with a disability, the message is the same: it's okay to laugh.

"All proceeds from the book will support the disability-based charities that shared their stories," Randi said. "Our hope is that it makes people smile, helps break down barriers, and inspires a new perspective—one that sees our loved ones as valued, respected members of the community who also have an incredible sense of humor."

She added that humor is often an overlooked but powerful tool in building understanding and connection. That sentiment is echoed by comedian and collaborator Ryan Niemiller, who says, "Laughter really is the best medicine—especially in the disability community."

NEIGHBOR SPOTLIGHT: TOM POUPARD HONORED AS NAMESAKE OF HOUSING DEVELOPMENT

For more than 30 years, Tom Poupart helped turn the visions of Northbrook's developers, business owners, and residents into reality. As the Village's Director of Development & Planning Services, he oversaw community planning, building review, code enforcement, and environmental initiatives—always striving to balance innovation with the Village's core values.


Tom's planning career began in 1990 when he joined the Village as a Planner. He was promoted to Director of Community Development in 1995 and ultimately to Director of Development & Planning Services (DPS) in 2008. Armed with degrees in Urban Planning from Iowa State and the University of Illinois, and certified as an AICP Planner through the American Planning Association, Tom brought professional expertise, a collaborative approach, and a deep sense of civic responsibility to his work.

Now retired, Tom's legacy has taken on a new and deeply personal dimension: Poupart Place, a 48-unit affordable apartment named in his honor located at 1593 Shermer Road. Developed by the Housing Opportunity Development Corporation (HODC), Poupart Place will provide supportive housing for individuals and families with a household member living with a chronic disability and earning less than 60% of the area median income. Located close to transit and the Village

center, the building is designed to help residents live independently with dignity, while supported by local social service partners.



At the groundbreaking ceremony, Tom reflected on what the project means to him. "When I first moved to Northbrook, I was able to buy a small, modest starter home – the kind of home that gave me stability, a sense of place, and the ability to grow a family here," he said. "Now, my own children are in their 30s, and I see firsthand just how difficult it has become for the next generation to afford a home in the very community they grew up in. Housing affordability isn't just an abstract issue... it's urgent."



During his tenure, Tom championed affordable housing policy in Northbrook, helping lay the groundwork for developments like Poupart Place. He expressed gratitude to those who shared the vision:

"I want to express my deep gratitude to the Village Board of Trustees and the Plan Commission for having the courage, foresight, and empathy to adopt affordable housing legislation that laid the foundation for this development to occur. It's not always easy to lead on complex issues like housing, but their commitment to doing what's right for the long-term health and inclusiveness of this community made this possible."

While proud to see his name on the project, Tom is quick to emphasize that the true legacy is in the lives it will touch. "The legacy of Poupart Place might be on a sign, but it will live in the lives changed by those living here – and the freedom and belonging that everyone deserves," he said.

Tom's decades of service, his leadership on transformative projects, and his enduring commitment to community values are woven into the fabric of Northbrook. The Village is proud to feature him as this issue's Northbrook Strong Neighbor Spotlight.

NORTHBROOK'S 10-YEAR COMMITMENT TO STORMWATER INFRASTRUCTURE INVESTMENT

Stormwater management has been a top priority for the Village of Northbrook, with 25 projects completed since the adoption of the Master Stormwater Management Plan in 2011 and its two addendums in 2012 and 2015. All 31 planned projects have been reviewed—those not built were deemed unconstructable, too costly, or offered limited benefit. Backed by \$26 million in funding from stormwater fees, state support, and grants, these efforts have increased drainage capacity, protected property, and improved infrastructure to withstand heavy rains. THE IMPACT: SOME OF THE MANY PROJECTS THAT HAVE MADE NORTHBROOK MORE RESILIENT TO STORM EVENTS



Project 3 – Techny Drain Phase IV (Complete)

Completed in 2012, this project addressed drainage limitations by constructing a relief storm sewer along Pfingsten Road and installing new stormwater piping between Fieldwood Drive and Pfingsten Road. These improvements increased system capacity, allowing water to move more efficiently and reducing the risk of flooding during heavy rain events.




Project 5 – Cherry Underpass (Complete)

Completed in July 2023 after three months of construction, this project addressed flooding issues along Cherry Lane between Meadow Road and Cedar Lane, a critical route for emergency service delivery and one of only two grade-separated intersections in the Village. Work included installing additional inlets and storm sewer to improve stormwater conveyance and reduce flooding at the underpass.



Project 22 – Woodlawn Rd (Complete)

This project addressed substantial flooding in the residential area by improving stormwater conveyance through the installation of new inlet structures and the regrading of roadside ditches. These improvements allow water to move more efficiently through the system, reducing standing water and preventing backups during heavy rain.

A GUIDE TO YOUR WATER METER UPGRADE!

The Village of Northbrook is in the middle of an important upgrade to our water system, replacing every water meter in town with new Automated Metering Infrastructure (AMI) meters. Below learn about the key benefits, project details, and what you can do now depending on what step of the journey you're at this point.

Key Benefits

Customer service – Get quick access to usage data and other helpful tools.

Leak detection – Catch leaks sooner, saving water and money.

Remote reading – No more visits from a meter reader.

Sustainability – More accurate tracking helps reduce unintended water usage.

The Village is partnering with Veregy LLC to handle installation. Licensed Illinois plumbers will install the new meters at no cost to you. Work began in April 2025 and will continue through March 2026. So far, 45% of Northbrook's homes and businesses have been upgraded. Installations are scheduled by billing area, so if you haven't heard from us yet, your turn is coming!



what step of the journey are you at?

I have NOT scheduled an appointment yet!

Watch your mailbox—when it's your turn, you'll receive a postcard from the Village with a QR code and phone number to set up your installation. If you don't schedule right away, you'll receive a series of color-coded reminders:



Green postcard – First notice to schedule.

Yellow postcard – Second notice to schedule.

Orange postcard – Final notice.

Failure to schedule after this could result in water service suspension.

When your postcard arrives, schedule quickly to secure the most convenient time.

I HAVE scheduled an appointment and need to prepare!

Before your installation date you can do the following:

- Find your current meter** – It may be in the basement, crawl space, utility room, or garage.
- Clear the area** – Move large objects or storage bins that block access. Installers need about 24 inches by 36 inches of space to work.
- Bonus step** – Test your water shut-off valve to make sure it works.

On the day of your appointment, an adult (18+) must be home. The installer will briefly turn off your water during the swap, which usually takes about 30 minutes.

My installation is complete! Now what?

Congratulations—you've joined the AMI future! Next, register for the WaterSmart portal (VXsmart) to:

- See your water usage in near real time.
- Get alerts if you might have a leak.
- Spot patterns and find ways to save.

Your installer will have provided instructions on how to sign up.

DEPARTMENT'S TRAFFIC SAFETY
EFFORTS

The Northbrook Police department is proud to be one of over 200 law enforcement agencies across Illinois participating in the statewide "Drive Sober or Get Pulled Over," "Drive High Get a DUI" and "Click It or Ticket" from June 20 through July 7 and August 15 through September 2.

Law enforcement agencies make an effort to get drunk, high and drugged drivers off our roads. "Driving under the influence - whether it's alcohol, cannabis or any impairing drug - is not just risky, it's illegal," said Community Relations Supervisor Richard Rash. "[We patrol] with zero tolerance for impaired driving, because our goal is to protect the people of Northbrook."

In addition to alcohol, officers lookout for drivers impaired by cannabis and other drugs. Messages like "Drive Sober or Get Pulled Over" and "Drive High Get a DUI" are part of a statewide education and enforcement effort aimed at saving lives.

Officers also enforce seat belt laws as part of the "Click It or Ticket" initiative. Buckling up is the most effective way to prevent serious injury or death in a crash. Everyone in the vehicle - front seat or back - should be properly buckled, every trip.

"We want our community to enjoy the holiday weekends safely and responsibly," said Rash. "Plan ahead, use a designated driver, and never get behind the wheel impaired. These decisions save lives."

This local effort is part of a larger statewide campaign made possible by the federal traffic safety funds administered by the Illinois Department of Transportation. The initiative is reinforced by IDOT's "It's Not a Game" media campaign, which emphasizes the serious consequences of impaired driving and other unsafe driving behaviors.
