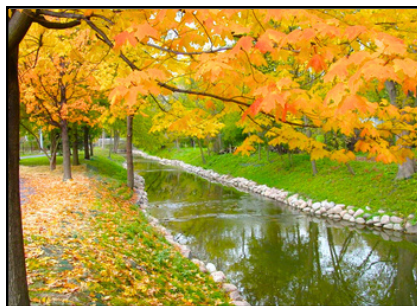

NOVEMBER STORIES RECORDED IN HISTORY

As we leave behind the beautiful fall colors for the upcoming winter stillness now is the perfect time to investigate and tell the stories waiting to be told. Each one of you has a story to tell, and every place you look in this village has a story, too. Village stories are often history hidden in plain sight. It's interesting to see conversations unfold on social media about what "used to be" in our downtown. Often, people disagree simply because their memories come from different eras, one person might recall a favorite restaurant or shop that was long gone by the time another's memories began. Different recollections don't make any of them wrong, they simply reflect our Village's evolving story.

Locals have long debated what to call the water running through town—a river, a creek, or a "crick." The West Fork of the North Branch of the Chicago River winds beneath our bridges, through Glenview, and into Morton Grove. This humble waterway (shown above) inspired our name when the Village became Northbrook in 1923.



On November 18, 1901, our village was incorporated as the Village of Shermerville. At the Centennial Celebration, the people born in Shermerville were honored. In 2026 Northbrook will turn 125 years old. The Historical Society will begin our celebration in November with two events. The first will be held at the Northbrook Public library on November 4 at 7 PM. A new video has been created for this occasion using the script and narration from the Centennial Opening celebration on November 18, 2000. Then, at the Museum on November 16, from 2 to 4 PM we host the Village's 124th Birthday party in the lower-level Lee Schinleber Room.

November is also the month in:

1918: Due to a flu outbreak, the Peace Celebration at the Triangle honoring the end of World War I was postponed until November 30.

1944: Residents approve the Park District referendum to purchase Barrenscheen's Grove on November 25. The park is now Village Green Park.

1950: The Board approved a Revised Zoning Ordinance for the first time since 1927 on November 8.

1959: The Meadows Shopping Center and Cherry Lane underpass opened on November 19.

1974: Glenbrook North beats East St. Louis to win the first Football State Championship on November 23.

1990 – November 12 the Village Hall opened for the first time to the public.

Downtown Holiday Traditions

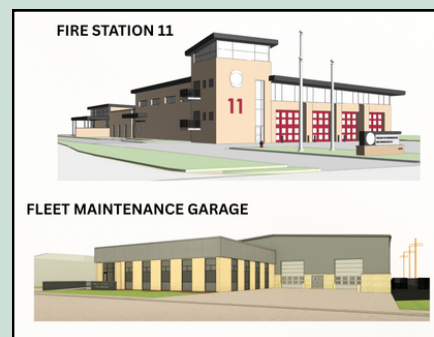

DIVERSITY, EQUITY & INCLUSION HIGHLIGHT NORTHBROOK DEDICATES NEW PEACE POLE AT VILLAGE HALL



The Village of Northbrook is proud to announce the installation of a Peace Pole at Village Hall, a lasting symbol of respect, inclusion, and collaboration. The project was made possible through the generosity of the Northbrook Rotary Club and the thoughtful guidance of the Village's Community Commission.

Rising nearly seven feet, the monument carries the message May Peace Prevail on Earth in eight languages + braille,

reflecting the rich diversity of Northbrook's residents. The pole features English, Korean, Russian, Polish, Ukrainian, Spanish, Urdu, Mongolian, Arabic, Hebrew, Hindi, Italian, Farsi-Persian, Swahili, Vietnamese, and Braille were chosen to honor the languages most commonly spoken in our community. Its prominent location in front of Village Hall, next to the library and across from Greenbriar Elementary, invites all who pass to pause and reflect on the importance of peace.

On September 21, the International Day of Peace, Village President Kathryn Ciesla joined Rotary members, Community Commissioners, and residents for a dedication ceremony. She highlighted the pole as a hopeful reminder at a time when many communities seek greater understanding and connection.

The project supports the Village's Welcoming and Inclusive Community Pledge, adopted in 2021 and reaffirmed in 2025, which affirms Northbrook as a place



where everyone feels welcome, safe, and valued. Proposed in January, reviewed by the Community Commission, and unanimously approved by the Village Board in February, this Peace Pole joins two others already in place in Northbrook.

The Village extends sincere thanks to the Rotary Club and the Community Commission for their partnership and leadership in bringing this meaningful landmark to life, celebrating a shared vision of mutual respect and collaboration for years to come.

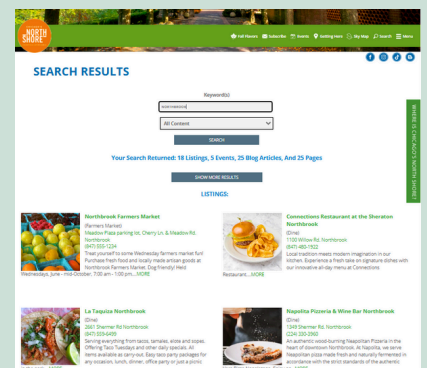

NORTHBROOK NEIGHBOR SPOTLIGHT

DEPUTY POLICE CHIEF GRADUATES FROM PRESTIGIOUS FBI NATIONAL ACADEMY

Growing up in Northbrook, Deputy Police Chief Marc Fainman says it was and still is a wonderful community – a safe place where he could spend time with family and friends and feel comfortable. “That experience makes me want to help ensure that others continue to enjoy that same sense of safety and community,” he said.

This fall, Deputy Chief Fainman completed the prestigious ten-week FBI National Academy program in Quantico, Virginia – an elite training experience for law enforcement leaders from across the nation and around the world. The academy combines advanced leadership instruction, graduate-level coursework, and demanding physical challenges designed to strengthen top police professionals. Fewer than one percent of officers are selected each year, making Deputy Chief Fainman's graduation a distinguished milestone in his career and for Northbrook.

Deputy Chief Fainman has dedicated nearly two decades to the Northbrook Police Department beginning in 2006. Throughout his career, he has served in patrol, specialized units, and investigative roles including work with the North Regional Major Crimes Task Force and the Internet Crimes Against Children Task Force. He has also held leadership positions as Sergeant, Commander, and Deputy Chief, overseeing patrol, detective, and departmental operations.

In each role, he has focused on fostering strong connections with both his fellow officers and the community.

The FBI National Academy stands among the most elite law enforcement programs in the world. Designed for top officers and future leaders, it combines intensive leadership training, rigorous graduate-level courses and demanding physical challenges. Its legendary Yellow Brick Road—a 6.1-mile obstacle course built by the U.S. Marine Corps—tests every ounce of grit. Those who complete it earn the coveted yellow brick, a lasting symbol of excellence, endurance, and honor.

“The Academy is a unique opportunity to learn from law enforcement leaders nationwide and around the world,” said Deputy Chief Fainman. “It’s about understanding modern policing trends, sharing best practices, and bringing those lessons back home to strengthen our department and community.”

A significant part of the program emphasizes officer wellness, including physical, mental, and emotional health. “If we want to be effective leaders and problem-solvers for the community, we must take care of ourselves,” he explained. “That includes supporting wellness programs, mental health initiatives, and ensuring our officers remain healthy and resilient.” He said the Academy gave him new insight into how to further support Northbrook officers and enhance existing wellness programs, benefiting both employees and residents.

Deputy Chief Fainman said his experience reinforces the Northbrook Police Department's commitment to community engagement. “Northbrook has an outstanding group of professional officers who are dedicated to keeping the community safe and building strong relationships with residents,” he said. “The Academy helps us continue to improve how we serve and connect with the people we protect.”

With his graduation from the FBI National Academy, Deputy Chief Fainman joins a network of law enforcement leaders who share insights, strategies, and innovations. He plans to apply his experience to enhance Northbrook's programs, support officer wellness, and continue fostering strong community partnerships.

“Northbrook is a special place,” he said. “Our Police Department is here not only to protect, but also to partner with residents. I'm excited to continue that work and ensure Northbrook remains safe, welcoming, and connected.”

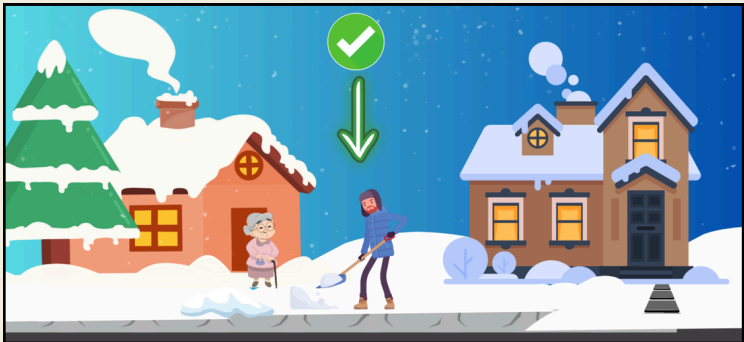
WINTER WEATHER **DOS** & **DONT'S**

Winter in Northbrook brings plenty to enjoy — sparkling snowfalls, cozy nights, and seasonal traditions. But along with the beauty of the season come a few challenges we all need to prepare for. From snow removal to safety reminders, here are some important winter weather dos and don'ts to help keep everyone running smoothly when the weather turns.



✓ **Make room for your bins**

When clearing your driveway, also clear out an area in the parkway for your bins. These containers are difficult to plow around and could be struck by plows or other vehicles.



✓ **Be a good neighbor and shovel the sidewalk in front of your home**

There's no ordinance requiring sidewalk shoveling, but residents are encouraged to help neighbors, especially seniors and those with disabilities.



✗ **Don't park when the plows are out**

When 2 or more inches of snow fall, it is illegal to park on Northbrook streets until plowing is complete. The Village will use Northbrook Notify to alert residents when the parking ban is in effect and lifted.



✗ **Don't put snow in the street when clearing your driveway & sidewalk**

Pushing snow onto the street is prohibited and creates hazards for drivers, cyclists, and pedestrians. If you use a plowing service, ensure they keep snow on your property.

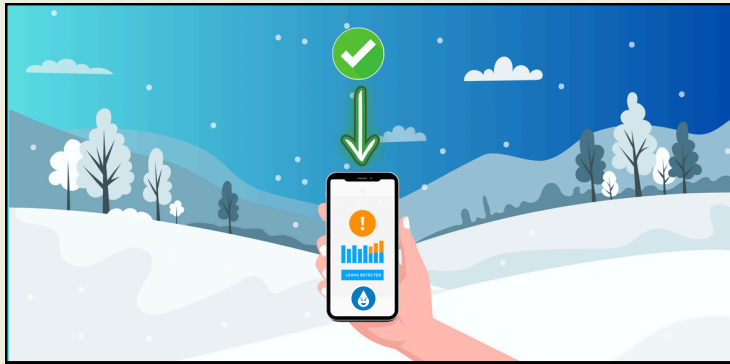
Don't neglect your downspouts

Don't forget about your downspouts. Keep them clear of snow and ice to prevent flooding when temperatures rise. After each snowfall, make sure snow isn't piled up around the base of your downspouts.



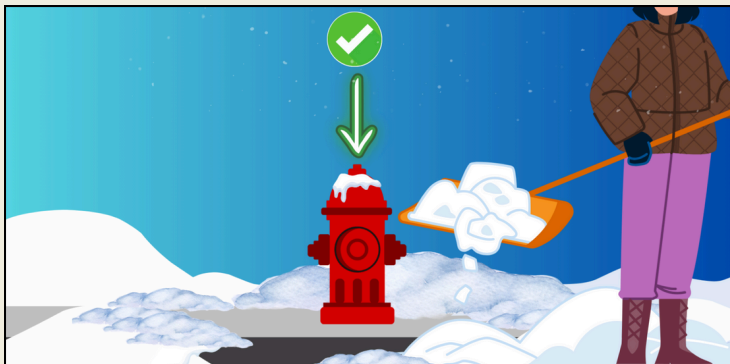
Pre-Treat with Anti-Icing Salt Brine

Road salt can harm the environment when it washes into soil and waterways. To reduce salt use, the Village pre-treats roads with a beet juice/salt brine blend before snowstorms. You can help, too—make a simple salt brine (water and rock salt) to pre-treat your driveway or sidewalk and cut your salt use by up to 30%. Learn more at northbrook.il.us/salt.

Clear the fire hydrants near your property of snow and ice

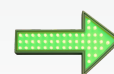

Road salt can harm the environment when it washes off roads, seeps into the ground, and enters local waterways. To minimize these impacts, the Village uses a beet juice and salt brine blend to pre-treat roads before snowstorms—significantly reducing salt use. You can help too! STAY ALERT THIS HOLIDAY SEASON: AVOID SCAMS AND THEFT

The holiday season brings joy, celebration, and community but it's also a time when scams and theft tend to rise. With the excitement of shopping, travel, and online deals, it's easy to get distracted. Unfortunately, criminals often take advantage of those busy moments.

As you prepare for the holidays, take a few simple precautions to protect yourself, your purchases, and your personal information:

Be Aware of Your Surroundings

Whether shopping in stores or running errands, stay alert to what's happening around you. Keep your bags and wallets secure, and avoid leaving valuables visible in your vehicle.

Shop Smart, Both Online and In Person

Only make purchases from trusted retailers and verified websites. Be cautious of too-good-to-be-true deals, fake charity requests, and online marketplace scams. When possible, use secure payment methods such as credit cards instead of wire transfers or gift cards.

Protect Your Packages

If you're expecting deliveries, track them and bring packages inside as soon as possible. Consider having them delivered to your workplace, a trusted neighbor, or a secure pickup location.

Guard Your Personal Information

Scammers often send phishing emails or texts posing as delivery companies or retailers. Avoid clicking on links or providing personal information unless you're sure the source is legitimate.

Lock Up and Illuminate

At home or on the go, keep doors locked and outdoor areas well lit. When parking, choose well-lit, busy areas and keep your car locked—even for quick stops.

Trust Your Instincts

If something feels off, take a step back. Don't share information, click suspicious links, or engage with strangers offering unsolicited help or deals.

The Village of Northbrook remains a safe community and by staying alert and taking small precautions, we can help keep it that way through the holidays and beyond. Have a safe and happy holiday season!
