

## Downtown Plan Implementation

The Village continues to work on implementing initial elements of the Downtown Plan presented to the Village Board of Trustees earlier this year.

In August the Village Board directed staff to proceed with the following items:

- The Village will study zoning and development regulations to ensure they encourage the appropriate types of redevelopment in the downtown. The study is to commence this fall and findings to be presented in the spring of 2013.
- Staff will continue to assist downtown property owners and brokers with finding desirable retail and restaurant tenants for available downtown commercial space.
- During the FY13-14 budget process, staff will present a comprehensive streetscape maintenance program for the downtown. A long-term program for incorporating streetscape elements into the Village's five-year Capital Improvement Program (CIP) will also be presented.
- In the near future, staff will present the Village Board with a contract for professional services to further study the creation of a regional stormwater facility behind the Village Hall that would facilitate the development of identified redevelopment sites in the downtown. If the study determines that a facility would be beneficial, a more detailed analysis will take place to see if amenities, such as recreational facilities, could also be incorporated into this area.
- Late this year the Board will discuss property maintenance enforcement policies in the downtown.
- Staff will continue efforts to educate the community regarding the opportunities and challenges of encouraging redevelopment in the downtown.

As Village continues to implement the downtown work program, look for more information on the Village's progress in upcoming issues of *Northbrook*.

completed in September and the associated installation of storm sewer on Pfingsten Road is planned to be completed by mid-October. While there is still a lot of work to do (roadway repaving, site restoration), we remain optimistic that the positive impact of the dry construction season will help to get Techny Road up and running (and open to two-way traffic) more quickly than originally planned. Thank you for your patience. Please keep an eye on the Village's website for important construction updates, and remember to travel slowly and carefully in construction zones.

## Commuter Parking – New Payment Options on the Horizon

The Village is currently exploring the purchase of automated parking machines for the downtown commuter lots. The machines would allow commuters to pay for parking using numerous options including coins, cash, debit/credit cards and even by using a smart phone. These machines will also provide a receipt with payment. We expect this new equipment to offer greater convenience for those who utilize the commuter parking lots. Staff is currently reviewing proposals submitted by vendors and will be presenting a recommendation to the Village Board in the near future.

## GO Request

Last month, we announced the launch of the Village's new, much enhanced service request system, GORequest. If you haven't had the opportunity to download the GORequest App (either iPhone or Android), I would encourage you to visit the Village's website at [www.northbrook.il.us/GOApp](http://www.northbrook.il.us/GOApp) to do so. This system

One positive outcome of our overly hot and dry summer is that it has allowed the construction process on various projects in the community to stay on or ahead of schedule. Dry weather always helps to keep projects moving forward, which helps to minimize the negative impacts of construction on residents, businesses and those who use our roadways.

In particular, construction on Techny Road has been moving forward with very few delays. The storm sewer installation on Techny Road was

## Sustainability Plan Underway

Earlier this year, the Village and Park District partnered to jointly create a sustainability plan for the Northbrook community. The consultant that was selected to develop the plan, the Delta Institute, has been working on gathering community input for the plan. In September, an online survey sought feedback from numerous stakeholders in the community, and in October, two forums for public input are planned. The first will be held on October 3 at 7:00 p.m. at the Village Hall. This will begin with an overview presentation followed by several small group discussions in order to develop key action items and draft measurable goals. These discussions will be facilitated by a combination of project team members and Northbrook residents that have volunteered to assist. A follow up meeting is scheduled for October 30 at 7:00 p.m. at the Leisure Center, 3323 Walters Avenue, and will revisit the findings and offer additional opportunities for input. I would encourage you to participate in these forums – they will provide invaluable input on the draft plan that both the Village Board and Park District Board will review later this year.

- Keep candle-lit jack-o'-lanterns and luminaries out of the reach of pets and small children, and never leave them unattended.
- Drivers are reminded to watch out for trick-or-treaters and to drive safely.

## Regulations Regarding Political Signs

**The Village of Northbrook supports every citizen's right to free speech.**

As election time approaches, we want to remind you of the regulations that are in place regarding the proper placement of political signs in the Village.

Political signs cannot be placed in the parkway, the publicly-owned area between the sidewalk and the road, but are allowed in your yard. They also cannot be placed in other public properties such as schools, parks or the commuter parking lot.



Each property can have one sign for each candidate or ballot issue position. If you have a corner lot, you can have one sign on each street frontage.

Individual signs cannot exceed six square feet in area.

Please make sure your signs are posted following these simple rules so that you can properly show support for the candidate of your choice. Removing illegal political signs is an extremely time consuming task for Village personnel and we ask for your cooperation. ## Fall is Here and the Leaves are Falling

Before you begin to rake your lawn, residents are reminded that there are three landscape disposal options: composting, mulching and collection. Collection reminders: Yard waste must be in bio-degradable bags with yard waste stickers attached or use a 32 gallon can marked "Yard Waste" and loop the sticker on the handle.

Stickers are \$2.05 each and are available from Veolia (847/272-4145), the Village Hall and Dominick's. Bags/Stickers are available at Northbrook Ace Hardware stores, Jewel, Red's Garden Center and Sunset. Ferraro Garden Spot sells bags only. Landscape waste pick-up runs through the end of November.



# Historian's Corner

presented by the Northbrook Historical Society

### Did you know that our Fire Department was founded prior to the Incorporation of the Village?

The Department began with a group of civic-minded men who wanted to provide fire protection for the community. Within a few months a hand-drawn, hand-operated pumper and hose were purchased and by April of that year a permanent volunteer fire department was in operation.

About 1912, the volunteers adopted a resolution calling for a public water system in the Village of Shermerville. By 1917, instead of using wells and cisterns, the department began to draw water from the 23 newly installed fire hydrants. Some of that original infrastructure is still in use.

In the early years, when the fire bell rang, volunteer firemen closed their businesses and grabbed whatever horses were in town

to hitch to the fire pumper. Later, after the first motorized truck was purchased, downtown merchants would still close their businesses to join other volunteers to fight a fire.

It wasn't until 1964 that the first full-time fire fighters were hired to augment the volunteers. The paid department worked five days a week and the volunteers worked nights and weekends.

Four years later, the department became a full-time paid department. In 1973, the first ambulance was purchased and the Paramedic program was instituted.

In 1980, after 79 years of service to the community, the Volunteer Fire Department was dissolved by a vote of its members. The Village then instituted a paid-on-call system to provide extra personnel at fires and community outreach events.

Today, the Northbrook Fire Department has three fire stations staffed by well-trained professional fire fighters and paramedics who serve our Village with honor and distinction. October 7 to 13 is Fire Prevention Week.
