We continue to stand united as a nation as we remember the innocent victims of the September 11, 2001, attack on America.

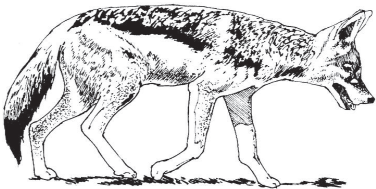

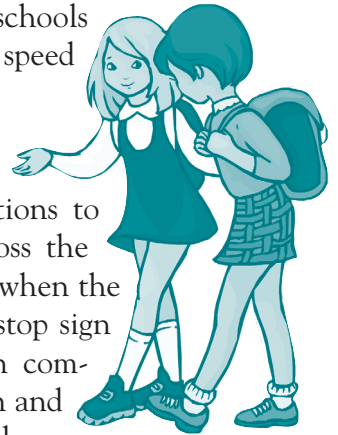

Fighting Mosquitoes and the West Nile Virus

WNV is still a concern in Illinois and Northbrook! The fight continues until the colder weather sets in and the mosquitoes disappear until next year.

***Prevention is Still Your Best Defense!
Eliminate Every Possibility of Mosquitoes
Breeding On Your Property!***

The best way to prevent West Nile Virus and other mosquito-borne illnesses is to reduce the number of mosquitoes around your home and neighborhood. Remember to thoroughly inspect YOUR property and eliminate “mosquito breeding habitats” such as any standing water. Make sure bird bath water is changed frequently and eliminate containers that hold water. Other concerns include swimming pools that are not in service as well as improperly maintained compost piles.

An Important Safety Reminder for All Drivers

It's not unusual to see drivers talking on their mobile phones while traveling through town. All are reminded that it is illegal to use a cell phone while operating a motor vehicle on a roadway in a school speed zone or highway construction zone. It is also illegal to operate a motor vehicle anytime while using an electronic communication device of any type to compose, send or read an electronic message. This includes

electronic mail, a text message, an instant message or a command or request to access an Internet site. (This ban does not include GPS navigation systems.) Local Road Construction and Special Alert for Metra Commuters

The construction laborers and operators strike this past summer delayed the start date of several projects in Northbrook. The most notable one that will impact Metra commuters will be the repaving of the large west commuter parking lot which is scheduled to take place between Sept. 15-19 and Sept. 29-Oct. 3. Staff had originally scheduled this project to be completed during the summer months when use was lower because of vacationing commuters. Flood Protection Information

History of Flooding In Northbrook

On May 13-14, 2010, the Village received 2.35 inches of rain with the most intense portion of rain producing 1-inch in less than one hour's time. As a result of this rain, the Public Works Department responded to 267 calls from residents and business owners. Surface flooding accounted for 226 of these calls; 41 were for sanitary sewer back-ups. It was unusual to see these types of flooding conditions with just over two inches of rain, however the impact of this storm was magnified because of saturated ground conditions from another storm earlier in the week.

The last flood event that severely affected the Village was the heavy rainstorm on August 21-22 of 2002. It represented the most recent flood event that caused substantial flooding in various areas within the Village. The storm yielded 5.25 inches of rain in a 12-hour period, which defined a "35-year" frequency storm. This is "engineer-speak" for a storm that has a 35% chance of occurring in any given rain event. The heavy rains resulted in many flooded basements as well as various yard and street flooding. Due to a long prior period of consistent rain, saturated ground conditions allowed for little absorption of rainwater which in turn increased the extent of the flooding.

Northbrook, like every other community, has some flood risk although we have an active Storm Water Management Commission and are working toward the realization of the goals of a long term plan to reduce this risk. All flood management plans anticipate there will be some occasions when street and low portions of yards may be inundated. Streets in particular are part of the infrastructure for temporarily storing excessive storm water.

Flood Insurance – Are you Protected? Check your Policy!

Keep in mind that standard homeowner's insurance policies do not cover losses due to floods. Property owners in Northbrook can purchase separate flood insurance policies because the Village is a participant in good standing in the National Flood Insurance Program (NFIP). Property owners can insure both their buildings and contents, while renters can insure contents only. The NFIP is administered by the Federal government and is available to everyone, even for properties that are located outside of the floodplain. The actual cost of the policy will depend upon the amount of coverage desired and the degree of flood hazard. As of January 2010, there were approximately 143 flood insurance policies in the Village. You may contact your homeowner's insurance provider for information on purchasing a flood insurance policy. Federal Law requires that a flood insurance policy be obtained as a condition of a federally-backed mortgage or loan that is secured by the building if it is located in the Special Flood Hazard Area (floodplain). CRS Classification – Reduce Your Flood Insurance Premium

The Village presently sustains a Class 7 status within the Community Rating System (CRS), which provides property owners in the Village a 15% reduction in flood insurance premiums for properties located in a Special Flood Hazard Area and a 5% reduction for properties located outside a Special Flood Hazard Area. The CRS program allows communities to achieve certain credits (i.e. reduction in flood insurance policy premiums) by implementing specified floodplain outreach activities and development regulations. Currently there are only 13 communities in Illinois with a Class 7 rating or better.

Floodplain Development Permit Requirements

The Village of Northbrook Zoning Code includes development regulations in the floodplain by the passage of Ordinance No. 92-6 covering floodplain development. The purpose of the regulations is to control the alteration of natural floodplains and stream channels to prevent the increase in flood hazards in other areas. Residents in floodplains who plan to do any type of work, including new construction, building additions, sheds, decks, fences, grading and landscaping, should first contact the Department of Development & Planning Services at 847 272-5050, ext. 4241, to determine what requirements apply and to obtain a Floodplain Development Permit application, if applicable. Residents may also call this number to report possible illegal development in the floodplain.

In accordance with the Village's Floodplain Development Ordinance, an existing habitable structure which was constructed prior to February 12, 1992 and located within the "flood fringe" (non-floodway portion of floodplain), may be improved by fifty percent (50%) or more of the market value of the structure prior to the proposed improvement, provided that the lowest floor, including any basement or sub-basement areas, is at or above base flood elevation (BFE). That is the historic measured level to which flood waters have risen in prior events. If any basement or sub-basement areas are below the BFE, they must be filled in and the structure properly elevated. These same requirements apply to repairs for substantially damaged structures which are defined as damages that are 50% or more than the structure's pre-damaged market value. For all new construction and improvements (on or after February 12, 1992) in the floodplain, the lowest floor must be elevated to a minimum of one foot above the BFE.

Flood Safety - Things To Do and NOT DO in a Flood

- **Keep a battery-powered radio** tuned to a local radio station and follow all instructions given. Be prepared to evacuate at a moments notice.
- **Do not walk through flowing water.** Currents can be deceptive; six inches of moving water can knock the average person off their feet.
- **Stay away from downed power lines and electrical wires.** Electrocution is another major source of deaths in floods. Electric current passes easily through water.
- **Six inches of water will reach the bottom of most passenger cars** causing loss of control and possible stalling.
- **If your car stalls in a flooded area, abandon it as soon as possible.** Floodwaters can rise very rapidly and sweep a car away. A foot of water will float many vehicles.

Property/Structure Protection

Before and especially in the hours prior to the threat of flooding:

- Move important papers, jewelry, clothing, collectibles and other valuable contents to upper floors or higher elevations.
- Bring outdoor possessions (lawn furniture, garbage cans, tools and other moveable objects) indoors, or tie them down securely to prevent them from being swept away or thrown about.
- Furnaces, electrical panel boxes, washers/dryers and hot water heaters should be elevated or relocated to areas that are less likely to flood. Turn off utilities at the main switches or valves if instructed to do so. Disconnect electrical appliances. Do not touch electrical equipment if you are wet or standing in water.

Your home may be better protected from flood damage by regrading your lot to achieve positive drainage away from the structure and/or constructing a small earth berm. These methods may work as long as flooding is not too deep and the property is not located in a floodway. Any change in grade requires a permit and will not be allowed if it adversely impacts neighboring property. Another means of protecting your home is to waterproof walls and place watertight closures over doorways and basement or sub-basement windows. This method is not recommended if flood levels are expected to exceed two feet. The installation of a standpipe or backflow prevention device can help prevent surcharging sanitary sewers from backing up in basements or sub-basement levels during periods of heavy rains. Standpipes and backflow devices are not recommended where water levels are expected to exceed two feet.

Drainage System Maintenance

If your property is located adjacent to a creek or other waterway, please try to keep the banks and channel clear of debris. Any filling or dumping of grass clippings, branches, other types of yard wastes and trash can obstruct the flow of water or reduce the conveyance capacity, which could potentially cause flooding problems to upstream properties. If you observe any filling, dumping or evidence of past filling or dumping in any watercourse in the Village, please contact the Public Works Department at 847 272-4711. Causing an obstruction in any watercourse within the Village is in violation of Section 16-3 of the Northbrook Municipal Code. No filling of any watercourse is allowed unless the proper state and Village permit requirements have been met. Please also check with the Department of Development & Planning Services at 847 272-5050, ext. 4241, on the permit requirements for any proposed bank stabilization work such as the installation/replacement of retaining walls. Residents are encouraged to perform routine maintenance checks of any watercourse adjacent to their property at least twice a year to ensure that no obstructions are present or unauthorized filling has occurred.

Flood Insurance Rate Map Inquiry

The Village of Northbrook's Department of Development & Planning Services will continue to provide Flood Insurance Rate Map (FIRM) Inquiries for all properties located within the Village limits. This is the federal document that determines if a property is within or outside the regulated flood plain. This department also maintains FEMA Elevation Certificates on file for many structures that are located in or near the floodplain. That information can help you make decisions about investing in property. Contact the Department of Development & Planning Services at 847 272-5050, ext. 4241, for more information. ❁

Special Alert: Emerald Ash Borer Beetle Confirmed in Northbrook

Emerald Ash Borer: What You Need to Know...

The first confirmed case of the Emerald Ash Borer (EAB) beetle was found in western Northbrook on May 1, 2010. The tree has since been removed and any other infested parkway trees will be removed between October and April to avoid the winter months.

EAB Q&A:

What is the Emerald Ash Borer

The Emerald Ash Borer is an invasive, non-native insect that feeds on and ultimately causes the demise of Ash trees. The beetle is metallic green in color and approximately one half (1/2) inch long.

The EAB was first discovered in Michigan in 2002 and is believed to have been transported to the United States from China on shipping crates. To date, the EAB has killed tens of millions of Ash trees across the United States.

What are the signs of EAB infestation?

Signs of EAB infestation include dieback in the top or "crown" of the tree, overall decline in the health of the tree and woodpecker activity. Ultimately, the only way to be sure that your Ash tree is or is not infested with the Emerald Ash Borer is to contact a certified arborist for an assessment. The Village has posted information for certified arborists on its webpage (www.northbrook.il.us).

What is Northbrook doing about the Emerald Ash Borer?

The Village is taking a methodical and measured approach to stopping the spread of the Emerald Ash Borer. Our Public Works Department has recently completed a survey of all parkway Ash trees in the Village and rated them on a scale of 1 (perfectly healthy) to 5 (dead). Parkway Ash trees that are classified as a category 3, 4, or 5 will be removed by the Public Works Department to help slow the spread of the EAB. Removal of these Ash trees will be completed over a three year period and residents will be notified before their parkway tree is removed.

Will Ash trees removed from the parkway be replaced?

Yes! Parkway Ash trees that are removed as part of the Village's EAB Management Plan will be replaced as long as there is sufficient room on the parkway. There is no cost to the homeowner for these replacement trees.

11, 2010 near Wessling Drive and Walters Avenue. The initial four trees, discovered near Walters Avenue, have ended the adult EAB fly season.

How do I know if my tree is in the parkway?

Parkway trees are generally located between the sidewalk and curb of the street. If you do not have a curb or sidewalk and need assistance to determine if a tree is public or private, call 847 272-4711 for help.

How do I know if I have an Ash tree?

Ash trees can be identified by their distinctive diamond type bark and leaf clusters. When present on trees, seeds are dry, oar-shaped samaras. They usually occur in clusters and typically hang on the tree until late fall, early winter.

Are there treatments for EAB?

Yes! The Village of Northbrook has begun a treatment program for parkway Ash trees classified as a category 1 and at least eight (8) inches in diameter. An insecticide is used to help control or prevent the spread of the beetle. The insecticide, called Treeage, is injected directly into the trunk of Ash trees. Unlike some insecticides or pesticides that are applied to lawns, Treeage does not have any application restrictions because the treatment is injected directly into the tree trunk.

What assistance is available for private property owners?

For more information or to schedule an on-site appointment with the Village's certified arborists, please contact the Public Works Department at 847 272-4711. Ash trees on private property are the property owner's responsibility, therefore the cost of any treatment or removal must be paid by the property owner.

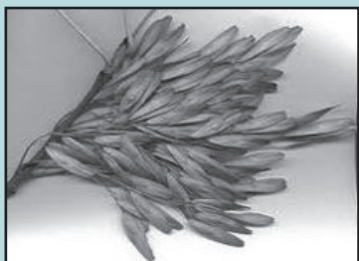

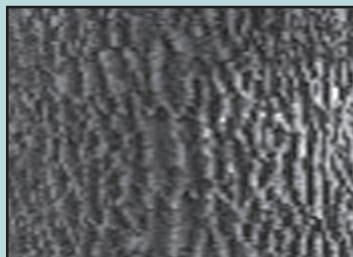

Keep Your Children Safe from Window Falls!

Now that the weather is cooler, it's time to open the windows and enjoy a comfortable breeze. But beware...parents are reminded to watch their children around open windows and keep their children safe.

Top Tips to Prevent Window Falls

- ✓ Install window guards to prevent children from falling out of windows. For windows above the first floor, install window guards with an emergency release device in case of fire.
- ✓ Install window stops so that windows open no more than four inches.
- ✓ Keep windows locked and closed when they are not being used.
- ✓ Keep furniture away from windows so children cannot climb to the ledge.
- ✓ If you have double-hung windows — the kind that can open down from the top as well as up from the bottom — it is generally safer to open the top pane, but growing kids may have enough strength, dexterity and curiosity to open the bottom pane.
- ✓ Do not rely on window screens to prevent falls.
- ✓ Keep windows locked when they are closed.
- ✓ Supervise children at all times, especially around open windows. ❁

Construction Projects Update:

West Commuter Parking Lot Resurfacing

Construction is expected to occur in two stages and will involve milling and resurfacing of the existing parking lot with new pavement markings and signage. Work is expected to take place from Sept. 15 thru Sept. 19 and Sept. 29 thru Oct. 3. During the Commuter Lot construction, please consider car-pooling to the train station or using alternate stations:

Northbrook East Water Main Improvements

Construction is underway and expected to continue until the end of September. Work involves the replacement of water mains on Longaker Rd. and Whitfield Rd.

Revere Drive Reconstruction

Work will include the reconstruction of the existing deteriorated concrete pavement and replacement with asphalt until mid-November.

Annual Asphalt Street Resurfacing

Work will include milling and resurfacing of the existing pavement, select curb and gutter removal/replacement and new pavement markings. Locations for this year include the remaining streets in the Northbrook East subdivision, Ancient Tree subdivision, Glenbrook Drive, Lincoln Avenue and Sunset Court. Construction is expected to begin in mid-September and continue until mid-November.

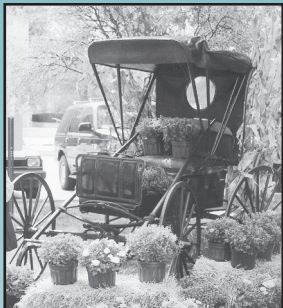
