Our easy to use renewal applications will be mailed to your home or business at the end of May.


All motor vehicles registered to a Northbrook address (residential or business) are required to have Village vehicle stickers. Only persons residing within the corporate limits of the Village are allowed to purchase a Northbrook vehicle sticker.

Your mailing should contain all vehicle and animal applications, as applicable, to each household or business. Please review the form and return both copies to the Village. If your vehicle or pet information has changed, modifications may be made directly on the form. Your stickers/tags, along with your receipt, will be mailed to you promptly after June 1. Stickers must be displayed by midnight, Friday, June 30.


Persons living in unincorporated Northbrook must only purchase a Cook County vehicle sticker. These are available at the Northfield Township office, 847-724-8300.

Northbrook's Fire Hydrant Flushing Program

The Public Works Department will begin its regular hydrant flushing program in May and continue through the summer.

The hydrant maintenance work will be on weekdays between the hours of 8am and 3pm. When hydrant maintenance is being done in your area, it may cause some discoloration or rust in your water. Should there be any rust or discoloration, the water will remain safe. Letting the cold water on your faucets run until the water is clear will help rid your lines of rust or discoloration. What are Flamingo Fridays?

Flamingo Fridays are a way to connect with your neighbors in a completely casual atmosphere. Every Friday evening (or choose another night) starting around 6pm, from Memorial Day through Labor Day, a neighborhood gathering will be held in someone's driveway, designated by a Pink Flamingo perched in the lawn. The host provides the driveway. No effort needed! Everyone brings their own lawn chairs, beverages, kids, snacks, etc. Gatherings may last 30 minutes or a couple hours, depending on the group assembled on any given evening.



Infrastructure & Road Improvements

Motorists are reminded to use caution in construction zones and always obey posted speed limits.

Below are highlights of Village projects and other regional construction projects scheduled this year.

Central Business District Improvements

The Village of Northbrook is undertaking improvements to the infrastructure and streetscape in the Central Business District (CBD). The areas where work will be done include Shermer Road between Maple Avenue and Waukegan Road, Meadow Road between Walters Avenue and Cherry Lane, Cherry Lane between the railroad underpass and Keystone Avenue and Church Street between Keystone Avenue and Shermer Road. Construction is scheduled to be complete by late October. This work will include:

- Resurfacing/replacement of portions of streets and sidewalks
- Replacement of failed curbs and gutters
- Replacement of existing plantings and the addition of new landscaped areas within the rights-of-way
- Narrowing of Shermer Road
- Replacement of street lighting on Shermer Road between Church Street and Angle Avenue

- Intersection improvements and replacement of the traffic signals at Shermer Road and Church Street
- Reconfiguration of lanes on Shermer Road between Waukegan Road and Church Street to accommodate on-street parking

While the CBD and all businesses will be accessible during construction, please note there may be traffic delays and intermittent lane closures. A highlight of the project includes lane reconfigurations within two segments of Shermer Road.

- Shermer Road, between Church Street and Waukegan Road, will be reconfigured with two lanes of traffic, a center turn lane, mid-block pedestrian crossing, and on-street parking on the south/east side of the road. (See rendering below.)
- Shermer Road, between Walters and Maple Avenues, will have a segment of roadway curb line extended into the striped area of the pavement to create additional parkway and green space.

Other Village Projects

The Village will also be undertaking water, sewer, sidewalk and other roadway improvements.

Projects include reconstruction of Lee Road between Williamsburg Drive and Lake-Cook Road, asphalt resurfacing, water main replacements, concrete street rehabilitation and sanitary sewer rehabilitation.

Stormwater Management projects that will be constructed this year include Sunset Lane and the Dundee Road/Skokie Boulevard Intersection and the Keystone/Chartres Stormwater Project.

Other Agency Projects

The Illinois Department of Transportation (IDOT) is completing the addition of southbound & eastbound right turn lanes at the Pfingsten Road intersection and eastbound & westbound right turn lanes at the Landwehr Road intersections. IDOT will also be replacing the bridge structure at Lee Road and Dundee Road in the spring of 2018. This work will necessitate a closure of Dundee Road for approximately six months during construction.

Village Board Approves Budget

At their regular meeting on April 25, 2017, the Village Board of Trustees approved the Annual Budget for Fiscal Year 2017/2018, which begins May 1, 2017.

The total approved budget for Fiscal Year 2017/2018 is \$100,625,028.

The General Fund, which provides for the basic public service operations of the Village (Police, Fire, Public Works, Code Enforcement, Planning and Economic Development, among others) accounts for 45% of the total budget. The approved budget for the General Fund is balanced for next fiscal year and allowed the Village Board to abate \$508,429 of the property tax increase approved in December 2015 for police and fire pensions.

Five years ago, the Village introduced an expanded two-year budget for the General Fund to further assist the Village Board in developing fiscal policy. Last year, we projected total General Fund expenses for FY 2017/18 of \$44.1 million, with total operating expenses of \$41.8 million. Our current projection for total General Fund expenses is 1.97% lower, with total operating expenses 2.93% lower than our projections at this time last year.

The two-year operating budget and the Village's five-year Capital Improvement Plan provide the basis for meaningful planning and the capacity to adjust our resource allocations as necessary in order to meet the changing service needs of the community.

Through this careful planning and analysis, the Village Board has increased their commitment to maintaining and improving the Village's significant infrastructure assets. The Village maintains 130 center line miles of asphalt and concrete streets, 170 miles of water mains, 127 miles of sanitary sewers and 123 miles of storm sewers. The Village has invested more than \$250 million in our municipal infrastructure. Proactive annual maintenance is required in order to protect our significant investment and avoid costly failures in the future.

Significant capital projects for the coming year include:

- Street maintenance and improvements – \$7.6 million
- Water distribution system improvements – \$6.4 million
- Water plant and pump station improvements – \$1.9 million
- Storm water mitigation – \$3.1 million
- Public building improvements – \$1.1 million

From an external perspective, the State fiscal crisis continues to loom as a threat to Northbrook's financial picture. The State has been without a budget for nearly two years. Given the State's financial position, some further reduction to our distributive revenues seems likely. It is difficult to say how much and for how long, or if there will be other offsets from the State that may mitigate these reductions.



There are two proposals in particular which would significantly impact our revenues.

- Local Government Distributive Fund

Local governments in Illinois are not allowed to levy income taxes. Instead, they receive a share of State income tax proceeds from the Local Government Distributive Fund (LGDF). Currently, 8% of personal income taxes and 9.14% of corporate taxes are deposited to the LGDF and distributed to local governments on a per capita basis. Governor Rauner has proposed reducing the local share by 50%. This would equate to a reduction of approximately \$1,675,000 annually to Northbrook.

- Property Tax Freeze

The Governor has also proposed a permanent property tax freeze. There have been several versions of this in draft legislation during the past two years. Currently proposed is SB 13, which is part of the Senate budget plan referred to as the "grand bargain." SB 13 would freeze the property taxes for 2017 and 2018 at the 2016 extension, however levies made for debt service, pensions or public safety would be allowed to increase by the lesser of 5% or the increase in the Consumer Price Index (CPI). The CPI increase used by the Illinois Department of Revenue for 2016 was 2.1%.

It is important to note that SB 13 would impose the tax limitations based on the 2016 extension. Should this ultimately become law, the Village levy, net of abatements, would be used for calculating the caps.

Together, the Village Board and staff have responded to the realities of the last several years with policies and processes that have focused our efforts to meaningfully and appropriately address the short- and long-term financial health of our Village government.

This careful management by the Village Board and staff has provided the flexibility to adjust our resources as necessary in order to meet the changing service needs of the community. Constraining costs without diminishing quality services, steady growth in certain revenue streams and strong legislative and management oversight will keep the Village in an enviable position moving into the coming fiscal years.



A Look Back at Downtown Northbrook

As you travel through the road construction in and around town, remember that the underpass, Cherry Lane from the underpass to Shermer Road, and Meadow Road from Cherry Lane to Walters, did not exist until 1959 and that streets in town were not paved until the mid-1920s.

This photo shows Shermer Road, from Waukegan Road looking toward town, before the road was paved. Notice the dirt street and concrete sidewalks with children roller skating. Bank America is now where the houses on the right are located. c. 1918 (Below)



One lonely car is crossing the bridge heading toward town on the newly paved Shermer Road. On the left is the intersection with Church Street and on the right is now the site of the Village Church. c. 1925 (Right)



The photographer who took this photo was at the intersection of Walters Avenue and Shermer Road, looking east toward the railroad tracks. The building on the left now houses Bank Financial. The triangle in the middle of the intersection was Northbrook's first park. c. 1930s (Above)



This view of downtown Northbrook is Shermer Road, at the tracks, looking east toward Waukegan Road. The first building on the right now houses Edwards Florist. The second building on the left is now the Landmark Inn and the next building, to the right of Landmark Inn, will soon house Bar Jar restaurant. Notice the gas pump on the right side of the street along Shermer Road, in front of the new Lucky Fish restaurant. c. early 1950s. (Above)
