

Severe Weather Preparedness

Every year, lives are threatened or lost and property is destroyed by severe weather events.

There are a variety of severe weather hazards that affect Illinois, including thunderstorms and tornadoes. Tornadoes pose the greatest severe weather risk in Illinois. An average of 27 tornadoes occur in the state every year. Severe thunderstorms can also produce damaging winds, which can cause significant structural damage to buildings. It's important for you and your family to be informed and ready.

March 1-7 is *Severe Weather Preparedness Week* in Illinois. Learn how to prepare your family before a disaster strikes. Do you know the difference between a Watch and a Warning? Do you have a battery operated radio? Have you registered your contact information with Northbrook Notify? Please see page 2 for important information about preparedness including details about the Outdoor Warning Siren System and suggestions for weather monitoring.

Consolidated Election Information

Register to Vote by March 10 for the April 7th Election

If you change your name or move, even within the Village, you must update your voter registration or you can be turned away at the polling place. If you wish to check your registration, call 312/603-5656 or go on-line at www.cookcountyclerk.com

There are four convenient methods of registering to vote:

- Register at the Village Hall by March 10
- Apply online by March 10
- Call for an application - due March 10
- Register and vote in-person during Grace-period Registration from March 11 to April 4

Early Voting: March 23 – April 4

Northbrook Village Hall, 1225 Cedar Lane, is an early voting location in Cook County. The hours for early voting at the Village Hall will be Monday through Saturday, 9am to 5pm. A government-issued photo ID is required for early voting.

March 1-7 is Severe Weather Preparedness Week – Be Informed and Be Prepared

Do you know the terms used to describe a tornado or severe thunderstorm threat?

Take a moment to review this information with your family.

- WATCH – A tornado or severe thunderstorm is possible. Watch the sky and listen to the radio or television for more information. Be prepared to take shelter. Please note, severe weather watches are reports of weather conditions in which severe weather could occur. The warning system is not activated for severe weather watches.
- WARNING – A tornado or severe thunderstorm has been sighted or indicated by weather radar. For a tornado or severe thunderstorm warning, take shelter immediately, turn on a battery-operated radio or television and wait for the “all clear” announcement by authorities.

What You Should Know About the Outdoor Warning Siren System

Northbrook has an outdoor siren warning system installed throughout the community. The system consists of a series of sirens strategically located and is intended to provide warning of impending danger. The primary purpose of the warning sirens is to notify individuals who are outdoors at the time of the weather threat. You may not hear them inside your home or business.

Warning System Activation

The system is designed to notify the community by Alert Warning and Attack Warning signals. The signals are standardized for outdoor warning devices by the Federal Emergency Management Agency.

➤ Alert Warning

An Alert Warning signal is a 3 to 5 minute steady siren. This signal is used in the event of a tornado or funnel cloud sighting. The reporting area includes a ten-mile perimeter around the Village. The Alert Warning signal shall indicate to all persons to “immediately seek shelter, turn on your radio or television, and listen for essential emergency information.”

➤ Attack Warning

An Attack Warning signal is a 3 to 5 minute wavering siren. This signal means that an actual attack against the United States has been detected and that the Federal Emergency Broadcast System has been activated.

➤ Reactivation

Once it is activated, the warning sirens will not be reactivated for the same incident. The warning sirens will be reactivated only for new, confirmed incidents.

➤ The Village of Northbrook will not issue the all clear announcement for any Alert or Attack signals. Please monitor commercial radio and television for further information as well as the Village website at www.northbrook.il.us



Things to Remember!

- Know the different signals and know what to do.
- Look for the following danger signs:
 - Dark, often greenish sky
 - Large hail
 - A large, dark, low-lying cloud (particularly if rotating)
 - Loud roar, similar to a freight train
- If you see approaching storms or any of the danger signs, be prepared to take shelter immediately.
- Visit www.ready.gov to learn more about how to prepare, plan and stay informed.

Northbrook Notify is a notification system that is used to alert residents about storm clean-up information, road closures, water outages, meeting notices and special events.



Notes from Village President Sandy Frum



One of the highlights of local government public service is the diversity of topics and projects that cross my path every week. I find it fascinating and also educational, to learn about everything from water distribution systems and government finance to stormwater management and raising chickens. Severe weather, dealing with skunks, water bills, celebrating Earth and Arbor Day, learning about the history of subdivisions and mapping are just some of the topics covered in this month's Village newsletter.

The diversity and complexity of Village services necessitates

the use of current technologies. The Village is presently operating on disparate and non-integrated computer systems. After careful analysis, the Village has recently acquired a fully integrated ERP (Enterprise Resource Planning) System. The ERP system will support the Village's business processes and be regularly updated and maintained by a vendor with more than 600 municipal clients.

The ERP will be implemented in phases over the next eighteen months. Upon completion, the system will provide residents and businesses greater ability to interact with the Village online by providing improvements such as an interactive portal to apply for and view status of permits, request inspections online and pay utility bills online. Preparing for Severe Weather

March 1 – 7 is Severe Weather Preparedness week in Illinois. While, there is nothing we can do to stop severe weather, there are actions that everyone can take to minimize its impact on our lives. Melting Snow and Spring Rains – Stormwater Management Plan

The Village of Northbrook's Master Stormwater Management Plan (MSMP) is comprised of two documents: an executive report and an appendix that provides in depth history and

analysis on stormwater in the Village of Northbrook, as well as detailed information on the projects included in the plan. The projects, programs, and recommendations included in the plan were created around the Village's four goals for managing stormwater. The goals in order of priority are:

- Reduce structure flooding/damage as a result of stormwater.
- Reduce street and front yard flooding to maintain access for emergency responders.
- Manage property flooding (rear and side yard).
- Manage development/redevelopment.

Discounted Nuisance Wildlife

Trapping Services

The Village has negotiated discounted nuisance wildlife trapping services of skunks, raccoons, squirrels, opossums and chipmunks for Northbrook single family home residents. Northwest Suburban Animal Control will perform an initial inspection, setting of the trap and daily monitoring Monday through Friday for \$95. The animal pick up/removal fee is \$45 per animal. 
Start organizing your Earth Day Team by gathering your friends, family, organization members and scout troops to help clean up Northbrook.

Northbrook Welcomes New Fire Chief

The Village of Northbrook is pleased to announce the appointment of Jose M. Torres as the new Fire Chief of the Northbrook Fire Department. Jose Torres was selected following a nationwide search.

Chief Torres comes to Northbrook with over 34 years of experience. He began his firefighting career with the United States Air Force serving as a Firefighter and Assistant Chief for Training. Torres served as a Firefighter, Fire Engineer and Acting Captain for the City of Ventura, California for seven years. Most recently, Torres served as the Training Division Chief with the Santa Monica, California Fire Department, where he served from 1997 to 2015, when he left to come to the Village of Northbrook. There, Jose was hired as a lateral Firefighter and promoted to Firefighter/Paramedic, Fire Captain, Battalion Chief and eventually to Division Chief where



he also assumed the duties of Acting Fire Chief on a regular basis. Torres was also a Clinical Instructor for the UCLA Medical School Paramedic Training program for over three years during his tenure with the Santa Monica Fire Department.

Torres earned a Bachelor of Science degree from Eastern Kentucky University in Fire and Safety Engineering and Technology, with an emphasis in Fire Protection Administration, graduating Cum Laude. He also holds two Associates Degrees and numerous certifications from the Office of the California State Fire Marshal's Office, California State Fire Service Training, FEMA and the U.S. Department of Homeland Security, as well as multiple service awards and recognitions including Firefighter of the Year with the Ventura City Fire Department and distinguished service during the Los Angeles Civil unrest of April 1992.

With an extensive background in management, leadership, administration, education, emergency incident management and training, in addition to multiple professional certifications, Torres will be a great leader for the Northbrook Fire Department and a valuable asset for the Village of Northbrook.

Torres and his wife, Leanna, relocated from California. He began his duties as Fire Chief for the Village of Northbrook on February 16. Please join us in welcoming Chief Jose M. Torres.

Illinois Premise Alert Program

The Illinois Premise Alert Program is a state program aimed to provide first responders with vital information for people with special needs.

The Premise Alert Program allows people to notify local police and fire departments about a family member who may require special assistance or treatment in an emergency at home. That could be a lifesaver for people who have autism, Alzheimer's, are blind or paralyzed. Operators at 911 call centers will have access to the information and will share it with first responders.

Northbrook has computer-aided dispatch technology necessary to make use of this program.

Will this program help? Definitely! If police and/or fire personnel responding to a call know they may encounter someone with autism, they can ease the situation by speaking more softly and avoiding physical contact. Firefighters who respond to a call at the home of a disabled person can plan for a more complicated rescue.

It's Tax Season... Beware of the IRS Impostor

In this scam, the IRS impostor calls the victim pretending to represent the IRS and claims that taxes are owed to the IRS. The impostor often demands immediate payment and threatens that the police will make an arrest if payment is not made.

Please note, the IRS does not call without first sending correspondence in the mail. If you owe taxes, you have a right to request specific details and discuss payment options. Never engage or share information with someone who calls you saying they are from the IRS. Hang up and call the IRS directly at 800/829-1040 to see if you owe taxes. If you believe you have been the target of an IRS scam, please notify the Federal Trade Commission Consumer Fraud Section at 877/382-4357.

Using Village Maps On-line

Easily look up your polling location for the April 7 Election on the Village website

The *Property Information Online* search box located on the Village homepage allows you to gain quick access to a wide range of information specific to a property through an address search. Easily discover your polling location, current government representatives, garbage/recycling collection day, school district, zoning information and much more using the *Property Information Online* tool.

Begin your search by visiting www.northbrook.il.us and entering your home address into the *Property Information Online* search box in the upper right hand corner of the homepage.



When you press the GO button you will be redirected to a landing page showing general information about your property. Next click on the tab labeled *Government Representatives* on the blue ribbon to locate your polling locations, find out what precinct you live in and information about your government representatives.

Take a close look at the interactive Village Subdivision Map at www.northbrook.il.us/SubdivisionMaps and enter your address in the *Find* search box at the top left and press *Go* to zoom in to your neighborhood. Register to Vote for the April 7th Election

Make sure you are registered to vote. Remember, if you change your name or move, even within the Village, you must update your registration.

Register at the Village Hall

The Northbrook Village Hall will be open for voter registration Monday through Friday, 8:30am to 4:30pm, until March 10. You must provide two forms of identification – one showing your address and the other must be a state identification with photo.

Apply Online

You can also apply online to register to vote by using an online application provided by the Illinois State Board of Elections. You must have a printer or provide an email to complete your online application. Visit www.elections.il.gov/InfoForVoters

Call for an Application

The Cook County Clerk's office can also mail you an application form. Call 312/603-0906 to request one. First-time voters who register by mail no longer have to vote in person the first time they vote. They can either vote in person or vote absentee by mail.



Grace-period Registration: March 11 – April 4

Grace period registration and voting is conducted only at the Clerk's downtown office: 69 W. Washington, 5th Floor, Chicago. (You must vote the same time you register.)

Springtime Weather Tips

As the seasons begin to transition from winter to spring, snow storms will begin to give way to melting snow and rainfall. During heavy rain events, here are some important tips that can help keep you safe:

- Do not walk or wade through flooded streets or waterways.
- Stay away from downed power lines and electrical wires.
- Do not touch electrical equipment or appliances if you are wet or standing in water.
- Do not drive your vehicle into standing water on the roadway. It may be deeper than you think and result in your vehicle becoming stalled.

- If your car stalls in a flooded area, abandon it as soon as possible. Floodwaters can rise rapidly and sweep a car away.
- Visit www.northbrook.il.us/NorthbrookNotify to register for Northbrook's mass notification system to receive messages via phone, text, and/or email.

You can help minimize localized flooding by clearing leaves and other debris off of storm sewer inlets adjacent to your property so that they function properly. Residents that live next to creeks or have drainage ditches next to their properties are asked to keep them free of grass clippings, branches, yard waste, and trash which can affect the flow of stormwater.



Historian's Corner

presented by the Northbrook Historical Society

Watching the Village grow through documents, maps and aerial photographs fascinates many people coming to the Historical Society to research the history of a piece of property or their personal family history.

Recently, while spending time researching the Village's geographic information system maps at www.northbrook.il.us/Map, I was struck by the correlation of subdivision names to eras in Northbrook history. Most of the very early ones were simply named for the owner who filed the plans for subdividing their land. Many of these subdivisions bear the same names seen on Village streets and founding documents.

Jacob Kiest subdivided his land into the Kiest Subdivision at what is now Sherman Road and Church Street, prior to the Village's incorporation in 1901. Church Street was originally named Midway because it was approximately in the center of the two-square-mile Village limits. The Walter's Subdivision to Shermerville is the only subdivision bearing the Village's original name.

Beginning in the late 1940s through the 1960s, large tracts of land were subdivided and given names that often described the land, or images of wide-open spaces

and places to raise happy young families – images designed to attract potential buyers to purchase a home in this far north, rural community. Many of them contain such names as country, estates, fields, grove, garden, heights, knolls, meadows, manor, orchard, park, view and woodlands. Still others incorporated the four directional compass points in their names or used historical references.



As the empty land filled up, the subdivisions became isolated re-subdivisions of small parcels. The smaller the re-subdivisions are, the more likely that the name of the sellers, developers or project name became the new subdivision's name. Among my personal favorite subdivision names are Fair Meadows, Heart O' Northbrook and Sunny Acres.
