

Northbrook's Balanced Budget Approved

The Village Board and staff have worked together to meet the challenge of maintaining high service levels in an environment of declining revenues.

At their regular meeting on April 10, 2012, the Village Board of Trustees approved the Annual Budget for Fiscal Year 2012/2013, which begins May 1, 2012.

Due to unprecedeted economic turmoil, the approved budgets of the past three years have mainly been budgets of survival.

Simply put, the Village tightened its belt and reorganized shrinking resources around critical roles and functions. Sound economic policies have allowed the Village to maintain fiscal strength and flexibility by maintaining healthy reserves.

Electricity Aggregation: The Next Step

Last month, Northbrook, along with the seven other members of the North Shore Electric Aggregation Consortium, entered into a three-year contract with MC Squared Energy Services, LLC. (mc^2)—the selected alternative electricity supplier.

In mid-April, the Consortium communities locked in electricity rates of 4.836 cents per kilowatt hour (kWh) through the May 2013 ComEd billing cycle. The current ComEd residential rate is 8.233* cents per kWh.

New rates through mc^2 are anticipated to begin in June and July. By now, all eligible customers should have received official Village of Northbrook correspondence regarding the Village's electricity aggregation program via first class mail. **In order to take advantage of the new rate, eligible ComEd customers do not need to do anything.** Transfers will take place automatically. Customers will have an ability to opt-out if they choose to do so, as long as they inform mc^2 within 21 days from the postmark of the official correspondence. The letter details the opt-out process.

Residents will not be contacted by mc^2 via phone; however residents may be called by the Village's Northbrook Notify with information about the opt-out deadline.

Budget Highlights

During the past year, the Board has had in-depth discussions regarding the future of Northbrook and how best to address our long term capital and infrastructure needs. In particular, the Board focused on how best to comprehensively address two main issues in our community: funding of core services and stormwater management.

Capital Projects

The major projects planned for FY 12/13, totalling nearly \$17 million, include the following:

- Water main replacement of aging infrastructure along Dundee Road - \$4 million
- Water Plant improvements - \$1.2 million
- Stormwater Management /Roadway Reconstruction-Techny Drain Phase III - \$5 million (a majority of this expense will be reimbursed by Cook County)
- Asphalt and Concrete Street Maintenance - \$2.9 million
- Replacement Ambulance - \$275,000

The operating budget remains focused on maintaining our public infrastructure and quality essential services. The budget projects a General Fund surplus of \$32,605 for FY 12/13 and provides a sound revenue and expenditure structure for the future.

Stormwater Utility Fund

Given the breadth and magnitude of the stormwater issues throughout Northbrook, the Village is addressing this as a community-wide program through the creation of a new Stormwater Utility Fund, which will provide a dedicated revenue source and allow for a full accounting of the operating, capital, and debt service costs associated with providing ongoing stormwater management services. The fee of \$1 per 1,000 gallons of water consumed will be effective May 1, 2012. This fee will be solely dedicated to funding approximately \$20 million in stormwater management projects which were developed as a part of the Village's new Master Stormwater Management Plan and the ongoing maintenance of our stormwater management system. It is estimated this fee will add approximately \$27.00 to the average quarterly residential water bill.

Telecommunications Tax

In order to address needs related to operations, changes have also been made to the 911 Surcharge and to the Village's Telecommunications Tax.

Though the surcharge has been a flat revenue source since inception, the Village's costs of providing 911 services have increased substantially over the past 16 years.

In 1988, the Village passed a referendum implementing a 911 Surcharge at the rate of .50 cents per land line, which was increased to .75 cents per land line in 1996.

The budget eliminates the land line surcharge to customers and increases the Telecommunications Tax to 6%, effective January 1, 2013. The Telecommunications Tax is applied to the total phone bill, regardless of the number of lines on the account. This increase will add approximately \$5 for every \$100 of cell phone billings and \$2.25 to a \$60 land line bill.

Abatement of Property Tax

While the Village's property tax rate continues to be among the lowest in the area, the approved budget provides for the abatement of approximately 33% of the General Fund property tax increase, which was approved in December 2011. This was done to further reduce the Village's reliance on the property tax.

With approval of the new budget, the Village Board and staff are focused decisively on maintaining and enhancing a diverse, desirable community and local economy.

Techny Storm Sewer and Roadway Improvements Project Begins Mid-May

The Village's Board of Trustees awarded the contract for the reconstruction of Techny Road, which includes the installation of a main line storm relief sewer between Second Street to west of Pfingsten Road.

The storm relief sewer is the third phase of the comprehensive (4 phase) Techny Drain stormwater management improvements. Also included in the project is an additional storm relief sewer on Pfingsten Road to reduce flooding impacts within the Willow Creek subdivision.

Traffic Flow During Techny Road Construction

Once construction begins, on or about May 15, portions of Techny Road will be reduced to one-way westbound traffic. All current street and driveway connections will be maintained during construction. The detour route for eastbound traffic will be Shermer Road to Willow Road to Pfingsten Road. Please note that Pfingsten Road traffic will be reduced from two lanes in each direction to one lane in each direction at Techny Road intersection. Completion of this project is expected by the next year.

Motorists are reminded to use caution in construction zones.

Village Fiscal Year 2012/13 Budget

I am pleased to announce that the Village Board passed a balanced budget for the Fiscal Year 2012/13 which begins May 1. The budget enables the Village to maintain high quality essential public services while addressing important capital and infrastructure needs. A particular emphasis is placed on mitigating storm water/flooding issues which has become a community wide concern. Resources are being directed into a new Stormwater Management Fund to pay for and account for operations and capital projects aimed at reducing storm water flooding.

Last month the Board also voted to abate 33% of the General Fund property tax levy increase that was previously approved in December 2011 and we anticipate holding that portion of the tax levy flat next year. For more budget details please see the article that starts on the front page.

Downtown Plan Accepted

This past February, the Board of Trustees reviewed the Downtown Plan as recommended by the Downtown Plan Steering Committee. At that meeting, I indicated that I would return to the Board with some initial recommendations as to how to move forward. I'd like to share some of them with you:

- Timely enforcement of existing property maintenance issues and consideration of any necessary amendments;

- Consider appropriate amendments to the Zoning Code to review and implement, if appropriate, height, bulk, and architectural standards as called for in the plan;
- Determine the cost/benefits of creating a stormwater facility and community gathering place in the area behind the Village Hall;
- Assist downtown property owners and brokers with finding desirable retail and restaurant tenants for the downtown.

The Village Manager will report back to the Village Board within the next three months with a work plan to begin consideration of these items.

Northbrook Police Alert Community to NATO Safety Concerns

With leaders from as many as 70 countries expected to attend the North Atlantic Treaty Organization (NATO) summit in downtown Chicago May 20-21, the Northbrook Police Department is working with other surrounding communities to be fully prepared for possible problems that could arise from protestors.

The City of Chicago has made extensive arrangements for peaceful protest, and law enforcement agencies at all levels

are making contingency plans for any disorderly demonstrations. There are concerns that these protests could spill into the suburbs, particularly those that are home to Fortune 500 companies. In the past, the NATO summit has attracted protestors from around the world. Many have disrupted businesses, blocked traffic and have even incited violence. The Police are asking businesses and residents to be on alert for unusual or suspicious activity such as large or disorderly gatherings of protestors in public areas or shopping

centers, parked vehicles in isolated areas, and any displays of graffiti and leafleting. Anyone witnessing anything suspicious should call 911.

Senior Transportation

There are two discount taxi ride programs that offer \$5.00 coupons off of taxi fares for seniors.

Zero Tolerance in Northbrook

The Village of Northbrook has a Zero Tolerance position in regard to underage drinking and possession of alcohol.

Residents are reminded that parties and teen alcohol use can have serious if not tragic consequences, not only for the teen but for parents as well. Parents must supervise parties at their home, because they are responsible for keeping it under control. If you feel the party is out of control and/or the teens have been drinking, end the party and start contacting parents to pick up their children. Teens that have been drinking should never be allowed to drive.

If you need help, call the Northbrook Police at 847/564-2060.

The State of Illinois has a Zero Tolerance position regarding underage drinking and operation of a vehicle. Anyone under the age of 21 stopped by the police and found to have been drinking alcohol will have their driving privileges suspended for six months in addition to criminal charges.

If your child is found at a party where underage drinking is taking place, but the child was not drinking, then a letter will be sent to his or her parents. If the child was drinking, then he or she will be issued citations and the parents will be contacted.

Parents – Are you aware of the Curfew for Teen Drivers under 18?

Did you know there are restrictions on the time that anyone under the age of 18 can be out driving? On Fridays and Saturdays, teens are only allowed to drive until 11pm and on Sunday through Thursday until 10pm.

The curfew laws are 11pm - 6am on weekdays (Sunday through Thursday) and 12am – 6am on weekends (Friday and Saturday) for anyone under the age of 17. The nighttime driving restriction is from Sunday through Thursday, 10pm - 6am

and Friday and Saturday from 11pm - 6am. However, there are exemptions.

Teens driving to or from religious functions, employment or school activities are allowed to be out as long as they make no extra stops and head home immediately after. There are other situations that may not result in penalty.

Disposal of Medical Sharps

Residents are reminded that Veolia Environmental accepts used medical sharps, such as diabetic syringes, with their weekly residential waste disposal services.

Improper management of discarded needles and other sharps can pose a health risk to the public and waste workers.

For example, discarded needles may expose waste workers to potential needle stick injuries and potential infection when containers break open inside garbage trucks or needles are mistakenly sent to recycling facilities.

Used sharps should be placed into a hard plastic container such as a detergent bottle or plastic pencil box. Secure the container with Duct tape and clearly mark it *Sharps*. Simply place the container at the curb with your garbage and recycling, and your Veolia driver will pick it up on your regular collection day.

PLEASE NOTE: If you have your sharps in a red sharps container, these containers are typically not permitted in the regular garbage or recycling because they are marked BIO HAZARDOUS MATERIAL.

Bio hazardous material is not allowed in the household garbage. In this case it's the actual container that is not permitted – not the sharps.

Residents and small businesses that have already switched to an alternative provider will not receive any correspondence from the Village on the new program. However, those residents and business will be able to "opt-in" to the municipal aggregation program; contact mc² directly at 888/808-7731 or email at *NorthShore@MC2energyservices.com* for more information about registration.

Be aware that there may be a fee from your current alternate provider that may apply if you switch to the Village's program.

As part of the agreement with mc², the Consortium communities will review electricity rates annually within the three-year time period to ensure that customers are receiving the best possible rate.

Residents will also have the opportunity to support renewable energy resources through a Green Power Program that purchases renewable energy certificates (RECs). More information regarding RECs will be mailed out to all program participants in the coming weeks.



Capturing our History for Future Generations

Background

In August of 1962, a special tribute to the Village of Northbrook was broadcast over radio station WIND in recognition of the community's growth and development from a rural village of 1,300 in 1950 to a thriving suburban community with a population estimated to be 13,600 in 1962. Twenty Northbrook School, Park, Village and Civic leaders were interviewed during the week long series. Sadly, no record of the event has been located beside the brief stories and announcement in newspaper articles. Because of the scope of the interviews, and the number of

organizations represented we have lost a treasure trove of information about the Village through the first-hand accounts of some of those who helped shape the direction of the town during a period of rapid growth.
