

Changes to ComEd Electricity Billing

Northbrook residents and small business owners should be aware that their electricity service with MC Squared is being transitioned to ComEd.

Please note the contract with MC Squared Energy Services is set to expire following the May 2015 meter reading. The transition back to ComEd will occur with the June 2015 meter reading automatically and requires no action by residents or small business owners.

In anticipation of the expiration of the MC Squared contract in May 2015, the North Shore Electricity Aggregation Consortium, entered into a two-year electricity supply contract with Constellation/Integrys Energy through May 2017 with the hope that a lower rate than ComEd would be secured. If a rate lower than ComEd is unavailable, residents and small business accounts will remain with ComEd.

Electricity supply and billing schedules will not be interrupted due to the transition.

Residents should be aware that representatives will not call or visit their homes as part of the transition. Residents should exercise caution if they are asked for their ComEd account numbers by any party.

Our easy to use renewal applications will be mailed to your home or business at the end of May.



All motor vehicles registered to a Northbrook address (residential or business) are required to have Village vehicle stickers. Only persons residing within the corporate limits of the Village are allowed to purchase a Northbrook vehicle sticker.

Your mailing should contain all vehicle and animal applications as applicable to each household or business. Please review the form and return both copies to the Village. If either your vehicle or pet information has changed, modifications may be made directly on the form. Your stickers/tags, along with your receipt, will be mailed to you promptly after June 1. Stickers must be displayed by midnight, June 30.

Persons living in unincorporated Northbrook must only purchase a Cook County vehicle sticker. These are available at the Northfield Township office, 847/724-8300.

Are You Prepared?

Because of the possibility of tornadoes and other disasters, the U.S. Department of Homeland Security's Federal Emergency Management Agency encourages everyone to be prepared.

Be alert during a thunderstorm watch. Severe thunderstorms can produce tornadoes. Being prepared will give you more time should the weather turn severe. If a tornado warning is issued, get indoors and move to the center of an interior room on the lowest level, such as a basement, away from corners, windows, doors and outside walls. Build a Disaster Supply Kit for Your Family

A disaster supply kit is simply a collection of basic items your household may need in the event of an emergency. Assemble your kit well in advance of an emergency as you may need your own food, water and other supplies in sufficient quantity to last for at least 72 hours. Additionally, basic services such as electricity, gas, water, sewage treatment and telephones may be cut off for days or even a week, or longer. Notes from Village President Sandy Frum



In the past, I've written about the diversity of issues that arise in local government. Thank you for taking the time to read my President Notes, as well as the information shared in this Village newsletter. I know word-of-mouth is still one of the most effective avenues of communication, so I hope you share this material with your family and your Northbrook friends and neighbors. This month I have a variety of topics to share with you. First and foremost is the issue of Public Safety.

Incidents, either weather related or man-made, typically happen with little notice or warning. Being prepared for emergencies

is key and knowing what to do and where to turn for information may be life-saving. Just over 50% of U.S. homes have a prepared emergency evacuation kit, according to new metropolitan area-level American Housing Survey statistics released by the U.S. Department of Housing and Urban Development and the U.S. Census Bureau. The Chicago metro area had among the lowest rate of homes with an emergency preparedness kit. I encourage all residents and business to visit www.ready.gov or see the article on page 2. Ice Cream Truck Regulations

The warmer weather brings the sounds of summer; chirping birds, children playing outside and the jingle of the local ice cream truck. Ice cream trucks are required to abide by the Village's noise ordinance regulations. The Board recently had a discussion about the allegations that certain vendors seem to be exceeding the allowed noise levels. Therefore, Village staff will now be evaluating this as part of a food vendor's annual license renewal inspection. So the sounds of summer will remain, and so will the songs from our ice cream trucks, perhaps just not as loud.

ComEd Drones – Unmanned Aircraft Systems

ComEd announced that it has received approval from the Federal Aviation Administration (FAA) to use innovative, unmanned aircraft systems (UASs) to inspect its transmission and distribution lines. Additionally, they may also be used following significant storms to assess damage. The project is a joint effort with the Illinois Institute of Technology (IIT). The UASs will have a camera that can provide video and still photos.

The utility is looking to launch the technology in the early summer. ComEd will work closely with municipalities before flying UASs in their areas.

Infrastructure Improvements

Now that warmer weather is here, so is road construction, both locally and regionally. Motorists are reminded to use caution in construction zones and always obey posted speed limits. The Northbrook area continues to see infrastructure improvements. Below are highlights of Village projects and other regional construction projects scheduled this year.

Village of Northbrook Projects

The Village of Northbrook strives to maintain the Village's water, sewer and surface infrastructure in a safe and stable condition. There are several projects scheduled for the 2015 "construction season" and web pages have been established for each of the projects to provide residents with current information on the status of these projects. Projects include Asphalt Street Resurfacing, Water Main Replacements, Concrete Street Rehabilitation, Sanitary Sewer Rehabilitation and Stormwater Management Projects, including the Cherry Lane Underpass, Shermer Road Overflow Sewer and Shermer Road Underpass projects identified in the Master Stormwater Management Plan.

Widening of Willow Road-Two Year Project

Illinois Department of Transportation

The reconstruction of Willow Road from approximately Waukegan Road to the Edens Expressway continues. The project includes widening the roadway and improving pedestrian

safety through signalized crossings and widened sidewalks. Construction began in April 2013 and is expected to be completed this summer.

Resurfacing/Shoulder Stabilization of Willow Road (Waukegan-Dundee)

The Illinois Department of Transportation will be resurfacing Shermer Road, including paving the existing aggregate shoulder, between Waukegan Road and Dundee Road, this fall. This project is dependent upon plan readiness and available funding.

Dundee Road Intersection Improvements

The Illinois Department of Transportation will be adding a southbound & eastbound right turn lane at the Pfingsten Road intersection and eastbound & westbound right turn lanes at the Landwehr Road intersection this fall. This project is dependent upon plan readiness and available funding.

Northbrook's Fire Hydrant Flushing Program

The Public Works Department will begin its regular hydrant flushing program in June and continue through the summer.

The hydrant maintenance work will be on weekdays between the hours of 8am and 3pm.

When hydrant maintenance is being done in your area, it may cause some discoloration or rust in your water.

Should there be any rust or discoloration, the water will remain safe. Letting the cold water on your faucets run until the water is clear will help rid your lines of rust or discoloration.

Village Board Approves Budget

At their regular meeting on April 14, 2015, the Village Board of Trustees approved the Annual Budget for Fiscal Year 2015/2016, which begins May 1, 2015. The total approved budget for Fiscal Year 2015/2016 is \$93,842,131, which represents a 3.1% increase from the total budget approved for the previous fiscal year.

The General Fund, which provides for the basic public service operations of the Village (Police, Fire, Public Works, Code Enforcement, Planning and Economic Development, among others) accounts for 48% of the total budget. The approved budget projects a General Fund surplus for next fiscal year of \$216,505 and achieves the Village Board's goal of abating the \$300,000 property tax increase approved for pensions in December 2014.

Three years ago, the Village introduced an expanded two year budget for the General Fund to further assist the Village Board in the discussion of the Village's fiscal policy. Last year, we projected total General Fund expenses for FY 2015/16 of \$44.1 million, with total operating expenses of \$39.8 million. As shown in the table below, our current projection for total General Fund expenses is 1.9% lower, and total operating expenses are within 0.13% of our projections at this time last year.

The two-year operating budget and the Village's five-year Capital Improvement Plan provide the basis for meaningful planning and the capacity to adjust our resource allocations as necessary in order to meet the changing service needs of the community.

Through this careful planning and analysis, the Village Board has increased their commitment to maintaining and improving the Village's significant infrastructure assets. The Village maintains 130 centerline miles of asphalt and concrete streets, 170 miles of water mains, 127 miles of sanitary sewers and 123 miles of storm sewers. The Village has invested more than \$220 million in our municipal infrastructure. Proactive annual maintenance is required in order to protect our significant investment and avoid costly failures in the future.

Significant capital projects for the coming year include:

- Street maintenance - \$2.6 million
- Water distribution system improvements - \$2.3 million
- Water plant and pump station improvements - \$2.4 million
- Storm water mitigation - \$6.1 million
- Sanitary sewer maintenance and replacement - \$1.1 million

From an external perspective, the State fiscal crisis looms as a threat to Northbrook's financial picture. In his February budget address, Governor Rauner proposed a 50% reduction to the Local Government Distributive Fund (LGDF). This would equate to a reduction of approximately \$1,600,000 annually to Northbrook. It is unclear whether the State Legislature will approve such a large diversion of LGDF away from municipalities. We are actively working with our local legislators to defeat this attempt

at pushing the State's financial problems onto local government. Given the State's financial position, it does appear likely that we will experience some reduction to our distributive revenues. It is difficult to say how much and for how long, or if there will be other offsets from the State that may mitigate these reductions. The Village Board has asked Staff to begin preparing various options to deal with this potential loss for the Village Board to consider as we gain more clarity from the State in the coming months.

Together, the Village Board and staff have responded to the realities of the last several years with policies and processes that have focused our efforts to meaningfully and appropriately address the short- and long-term financial health of our Village government.

This careful management by the Village Board and staff has provided the flexibility to adjust our resources as necessary in order to meet the changing service needs of the community. There is a reason Northbrook is one of only five communities in Illinois to carry triple-A ratings from both Standard and Poor's and Moody's. Constraining costs without diminishing quality services, steady growth in certain revenue streams and strong legislative and management oversight will keep the Village in an enviable position moving into the coming fiscal years.



Looking Skyward Over Northbrook – Then and Now

Soon you may see drones in the skies over Northbrook as they check power lines. Some Northbrookians saw their first drone near the beginning of the July 4th parade last year. Flying over the parade route, the drone captured video images of the parade.

While drones are a fairly new technology, they certainly are not the first motorized machines flying over town. The sound of airplane motors was a familiar one between 1923 and 1995 when the flight pattern for the Glenview Naval Air Station crossed a portion of town. During the summer, Northbrookians looked skyward as the Thunderbirds, Blue Angels or other aerial acrobat teams streaked through the sky on the way to or from GNAS. The overpass hillside on Willow Road was filled with people watching the planes landing and taking off during the annual Chicago Air and Water Show.

In the summer of 1930, all Northbrookians looked skyward as the Hunter brothers lifted off from Sky Harbor Airport in their Stinson SM-1 Detroiter airplane named *The City of Chicago* in an attempt to set a flight endurance record. The five Hunter siblings worked together to make the flight endurance record happen. John and Kenneth shared flying and repair duties while brothers Albert and Walter handled the mid-air refueling. Irene Hunter, sister

of the pilots, cooked the meals which were lowered to the pilots by bucket from the refueling plane.

By continuously staying aloft from June 11 to July 4, 1930, the brothers set the endurance record by flying for 23 days, one hour and 41 minutes (553 hours and 41 minutes) in the skies over Northbrook. The flight came to an abrupt end when a broken oil pressure gauge spewed oil all over the cockpit. Unfortunately, they held

the record for just a short time.
