

Memorial Day History

Three years after the Civil War ended, on May 5, 1868, Decoration Day was established as a time for the nation to decorate the graves of the war dead with flowers.

In 1868, Maj. Gen. John A. Logan, National Commander of the Grand Army of the Republic, declared that Decoration Day should be observed on May 30. It is believed that date was chosen because flowers would be in bloom all over the country. It was not until after World War I, however, that the day was expanded to honor those who have died in all American wars.

In 1971, Memorial Day was declared a national holiday by an act of Congress, though it is still often called Decoration Day. In 2000, Congress established a National Moment of Remembrance, which asks Americans to pause for one minute at 3pm in an act of national unity. The time was chosen because 3pm, "is the time when most Americans are enjoying their freedoms on the national holiday."

Northbrook's Electronics Recycling Drop-off Expands to include 1st Saturdays

Currently, Northbrook offers drop-off opportunities for household electronics on the first Tuesday of every month from 7am to 3pm at the Fleet Maintenance Garage, 1227 Cedar Lane, behind the Village Hall. In order to ensure all residents can take advantage of this service, the Village has expanded its monthly household electronics recycling services to the first Saturday of each month.

Beginning on May 7, recycling will be available on the first Saturday of every month from 9am to noon.

Drop-off Bins for Household Batteries and Light Bulbs Available Monday –Friday from 7am to 3pm

Drop-off bins for household batteries and light bulbs are located behind the Northbrook Village Hall, at the Fleet Maintenance Garage. There is also a bin for LEDs and 4-foot fluorescent bulbs.!

Vehicle Stickers & Pet Licenses Available in June

Our easy to use renewal applications will be mailed to your home or business at the end of May.

All motor vehicles registered to a Northbrook address (residential or business) are required to have Village vehicle stickers. Only persons residing within the corporate limits of the Village are allowed to purchase a Northbrook vehicle sticker.

Your mailing should contain all vehicle and animal applications as applicable to each household or business. Please review the form and return both copies to the Village. If either your vehicle or pet information has changed, modifications may be made directly on the form. Your stickers/tags, along with your receipt, will be mailed to you promptly after June 1. Stickers must be displayed by midnight, Thursday, June 30.

Persons living in unincorporated Northbrook must only purchase a Cook County vehicle sticker. These are available at the Northfield Township office, 847/724-8300.

ComEd Reminds Customers to Keep Foil Balloons Away from Power Lines

Did you know foil balloons, also known as Mylar, in the air can lead to power outages when they come into contact with power lines?

In the past four years, more than 240,000 customer interruptions occurred because of foil balloon contact. When a foil balloon contacts a power line or a part of substation equipment, its metallic properties can cause a surge of electricity that can, in turn, cause the equipment to short-circuit. The spark generated could lead to a power outage or fire.



Village to Celebrate Ferris Bueller's Day Off

The Village is getting ready to celebrate the 30th anniversary of the film *Ferris Bueller's Day Off*, which includes many scenes from Northbrook, where writer-director John Hughes spent his teenage years.


The fictional town of Shermer, Illinois makes an appearance in many of his films, based on Northbrook's roots as Shererville. One of his best known movie images is the Northbrook water tower with the message, *Save Ferris*, emblazoned across the side.

This month, the Village of Northbrook, Northbrook Park District, Northbrook Chamber, Northbrook Library and Northbrook Historical Society are collaborating to recognize the anniversary of the Ferris film. A permanent bench will be installed on a grassy area between Village Hall and the Library with a plaque honoring John Hughes and a permanent sign near the bench will recognize the Northbrook connection to his films.

Experience an Evening in the Park on June 3 Rock the Green and *Ferris Bueller's Day Off*

The Northbrook Park District will present a free showing of *Ferris Bueller's Day Off* on Friday, June 3 at Village Green Park, beginning at approximately 9pm. Bring a blanket or lawn chairs to enjoy the prankster comedy about three friends who skipped school and enjoyed a series of wild adventures in and around Chicago. The film was released in June of 1986 and placed on the National Film Registry by the Library of Congress in 2014.

The film (rated PG-13) will start just after Rock the Green – Battle of the North Shore Youth Bands, which will rock the park from 6-9pm. This is the seventh year for the showcase and competition, sponsored by the Northbrook Park District and Northbrook Arts Commission. All ages are invited to enjoy the talent on stage, share the experience, and cheer their favorite bands. There is no charge for admission; popcorn will be available for purchase.



Notes from Village President Sandy Frum



This year's budget, as always, includes expenditures for improvements to the Village's water, sewer and surface infrastructure to keep them in a safe and stable condition. In fact, there are numerous construction projects occurring in and around Northbrook, including those funded by other agencies such as the Illinois Department of Transportation and Metra. You may want to adjust your travel plans either to allow more time or to take an alternate route, especially between Wednesday, May 18 to Friday, May 27, when the Metra crossing at Dundee Rd. (1/2 mile west of Waukegan Road) will be closed to all traffic for repairs. I encourage motorists to drive carefully, especially while in construction zones.

A Reminder for Pedestrians and Motorists

In addition to addressing motorists, I also wanted to take this opportunity to remind pedestrians of all ages to be mindful when crossing the road and walking in parking lots. All too frequently I see pedestrians distracted with cell phones or stepping into the street without paying attention to traffic. While it is mandatory for all drivers to come to a complete stop for pedestrians in all crosswalks, regardless of whether or not there are traffic signals/stop signs present, it is also the pedestrian's responsibility to be aware of changing traffic situations and not step into moving traffic. Pedestrians should be focused and aware of their surroundings when crossing outside of a marked crosswalk or an unmarked crosswalk at an intersection. It's also sensible to assume that approaching drivers may not be paying attention to pedestrians near the roadway. Together, we can keep our residents and neighborhoods safe.

Not only does May bring our much anticipated warmer weather, but it is also a time to prepare for the exciting events coming up this summer. May provides us with a great opportunity to remember our nation's heroes, especially at the events scheduled during Memorial Day weekend, starting with the parade on Monday, May 30. What are Flamingo Fridays?

Flamingo Fridays are a way to connect with your neighbors in a completely casual atmosphere. Every Friday evening starting around 6pm, from Memorial Day through Labor Day, a neighborhood gathering will be held in someone's driveway, designated by a Pink Flamingo perched in the lawn. The host provides the driveway. No effort needed! Everyone brings their own lawn chairs, beverages, kids, snacks, etc. Gatherings may last 30 minutes or a couple hours, depending on the group assembled on any given evening.



Infrastructure & Road Improvements

Now that warmer weather is here, so is road construction, both locally and regionally. Motorists are reminded to use caution in construction zones and always obey posted speed limits.

Below are highlights of Village projects and other regional construction projects scheduled this year.

Village of Northbrook Projects

The Village of Northbrook strives to maintain the Village's water, sewer and surface infrastructure in a safe and stable condition. There are several projects scheduled for the 2016 "construction season" and web pages have been established for each of the projects to provide residents with current information on the status of these projects. Projects include Asphalt Street Resurfacing, Water Main Replacements, Concrete Street Rehabilitation and Sanitary Sewer Rehabilitation. Stormwater Management Projects identified in the Master Stormwater Management Plan include the Shermer Road Overflow Sewer (Project 2), Wescott Park Storage (Project 1) and Northbrook East Storage (Project 11).

Resurfacing/Shoulder Stabilization of Shermer Road

The Illinois Department of Transportation will be resurfacing Shermer Road, including paving the existing aggregate shoulder, between Waukegan Road and Dundee Road, this spring. Utility companies have already started moving their utilities in preparation for the project.

Dundee Road Intersection Improvements

The Illinois Department of Transportation will be adding a southbound & eastbound right turn lane at the Pfingsten Road intersection and eastbound & westbound right turn lanes at the Landwehr Road intersection this fall. This project is dependent upon plan readiness and available funding.



Dundee Road Metra Crossing Closure

The Metra crossing at Dundee Rd. (1/2 mile west of S. Waukegan Rd.) will be closed for repairs from Wednesday, May 18 to Friday, May 27. A detour will be marked on Pfingsten Rd., Lake Cook Rd., and S. Waukegan Rd.

Northbrook's Fire Hydrant Flushing Program

The Public Works Department will begin its regular hydrant flushing program in May and continue through the summer.

The hydrant maintenance work will be on weekdays between the hours of 8am and 3pm.

When hydrant maintenance is being done in your area, it may cause some discoloration or rust in your water.

Should there be any rust or discoloration, the water will remain safe. Letting the cold water on your faucets run until the water is clear will help rid your lines of rust or discoloration.

Village Board Approves Budget

At their regular meeting on April 12, 2016, the Village Board of Trustees approved the Annual Budget for Fiscal Year 2016/2017, which begins May 1, 2016.

The total approved budget for Fiscal Year 2016/2017 is \$104,842,361.

The General Fund, which provides for the basic public service operations of the Village (Police, Fire, Public Works, Code Enforcement, Planning and Economic Development, among others) accounts for 43% of the total budget.

The approved budget projects a General Fund surplus for next fiscal year of \$125,025 and achieves the Village Board's goal of abating the \$234,980 property tax increase approved for the General Fund in December 2015.

Four years ago, the Village introduced an expanded two-year budget for the General Fund to further assist the Village Board in the discussion of the Village's fiscal policy. Last year, we projected total General Fund expenses for FY 2016/17 of \$44.98 million, with total operating expenses of \$41.4 million. Our current projection for total General Fund expenses is 1.1% lower, and total operating expenses are 1.3% lower than our projections at this time last year.

The two-year operating budget and the Village's five-year Capital Improvement Plan provide the basis for meaningful planning and the capacity to adjust our resource allocations as necessary in order to meet the changing service needs of the community.

Through this careful planning and analysis, the Village Board has increased their commitment to maintaining and improving the Village's significant infrastructure assets. The Village maintains 130 center line miles of asphalt and concrete streets, 170 miles of water mains, 127 miles of sanitary sewers and 123 miles of storm sewers. The Village has invested more than \$220 million in our municipal infrastructure. Proactive annual maintenance is required in order to protect our significant investment and avoid costly failures in the future.

Significant capital projects for the coming year include:

- Street maintenance and improvements – \$4.9 million
- Water distribution system improvements – \$4.1 million
- Water plant and pump station improvements – \$3.1 million
- Storm water mitigation – \$12.9 million
- Public building improvements – \$1.6 million
- Replacement fire engine and ambulance – \$1.1 million

From an external perspective, the State fiscal crisis continues to loom as a threat to Northbrook's financial picture. The State has been without a budget for nine months, and there seems to be no resolution in sight as the Governor and the State Legislature continue to disagree on political ideologies.



Governor Rauner has proposed a 50% reduction to the Local Government Distributive Fund (LGDF). This would equate to a reduction of approximately \$1,700,000 annually to Northbrook. Whether or not we ultimately realize a reduction of this magnitude is still uncertain however, given the State's financial position, some further reduction to our distributive revenues seems likely. It is difficult to say how much and for how long, or if there will be other offsets from the State that may mitigate these reductions. As this becomes clearer, the Administration & Finance Committee will meet to discuss options to deal with any ultimate reduction.

Together, the Village Board and staff have responded to the realities of the last several years with policies and processes that have focused our efforts to meaningfully and appropriately address the short- and long-term financial health of our Village government.

This careful management by the Village Board and staff has provided the flexibility to adjust our resources as necessary in order to meet the changing service needs of the community. There is a reason Northbrook is one of only five communities in Illinois to carry triple-A ratings from both Standard and Poor's and Moody's. Constraining costs without diminishing quality services, steady growth in certain revenue streams and strong legislative and management oversight will keep the Village in an enviable position moving into the coming fiscal years.

Historian's Corner

Changes in Downtown Northbrook

At one time, three of the four building facing the Chicago, Milwaukee & St. Paul railroad tracks (now Metra tracks) opened their doors track side. Today, two of the buildings facing the tracks have been demolished and the third one looks nothing like it did in 1917 when it was built, or in the 1950s when it was modernized.



The all-brick building was built for the Shermerville State Bank, which received its charter in 1913. The bank's name was changed when the town was renamed. It closed during the Great Depression but reopened. In 1946, a new bank opened its door there as the Northbrook Trust and Savings Bank where it remained until the summer of 1958 when the bank moved to a new location further east on Shermer. In its new location, the bank was bought out several times and is now housed in the multi-story building and known as the Bank of America.

The small bank, with its vault intact (pictured right), was sold to a local real estate investor who owned many of the downtown buildings. He modernized the building and rented it to Edwards Florist. Upon his death, the owners of the florist purchased the building from his heirs. In June 2011, a fire caused extensive interior smoke damage and kept the business closed until repairs were completed. Today, its second exterior revitalization, beautiful window displays and charming interior bring a modern-day feel to Northbrook's downtown business district.
