Business Briefs

Recent Development Activity in Northbrook

The following is a quick snapshot of major development activity in the Village:

Mixed Use Development & Commercial Development

Construction has been completed on the *NorthShore 770* mixed-use development project located at the northwest corner of Dundee Road and Skokie Boulevard. Occupancy in the residential apartment building continues to grow.

Site improvements will soon begin on the mixed-use development project located at 1000 Skokie Boulevard, which is located on the east side of Skokie, South of Sunset Ridge Road. Construction on the *Life Time Fitness* facility will begin first, followed by the 5-story, 304-unit luxury apartment complex by the Finger Company. At this time, it appears that the *Children's Learning Adventure* early childhood center will not be proceeding as part of the development. Whatever use would replace that facility will require Village Board approval.

Construction continues on the new three-story building that is part of the *Village Green Center* on Shermer Road across from Village Green Park in downtown Northbrook. The building will include 10 apartment units on the second and third floors and 2,400 square feet of commercial space on the first floor with enclosed parking located behind the commercial space. Tenants for the commercial space have not yet been announced.

Construction continues on the *The Lock-Up Self Storage* facility located on the south corner of the intersection of Sunset Ridge Road and Skokie Boulevard. Once completed, the 120,000 square foot, three-story building will house nearly 950 individual storage units that would be accessed from inside of the building.

The Village Board recently approved a proposed 6,700-square foot multi-tenant building on the northeast corner of Dundee Road and Anthony Trail. Once the applicant applies for and receives building permit approval, they could begin construction.

Residential Development

Kogen Zivin Friedman continues construction of homes in its 21-unit detached single-family home development on a 6.8-acre site located in the 3800 block of Dundee Road. Four homes are currently constructed with more to begin construction soon.

Celebrating Earth and Arbor Day



Honoring our 9-1-1 Telecommunicators

Public Safety Telecommunicators operate radio, telephone and computer aided communications systems utilizing state-of-the-art technological techniques to ensure the safety of everyone in our community.

Every day our residents, and those who travel through our Village, are able to get the care and protection they need in their most difficult moments due to the

efforts of the Northbrook Police and the Regional Emergency Dispatch (RED) Center Fire Telecommunicators.

Every hour of every day, Telecommunicators access, monitor and disseminate information of critical importance to police and fire personnel. They are the pivotal link between citizens and the police and fire departments.

The Village will celebrate our Northbrook Telecommunicators by issuing a proclamation from President Frum and the Village Board naming April 9 – 15 as Telecommunicators Week in Northbrook.

Child Abuse Prevention... Everyone Has a Role to Play

What is Child Abuse & Neglect?

Whether through action or failing to act, there are many forms of child maltreatment. Often the abuser is someone the child knows, such as a parent, relative, neighbor or friend of the family.

Neglect: failure to provide for a child's basic physical, emotional medical or educational needs. Child neglect oftentimes occurs when parents are overwhelmed with an array of stressors such as single parenthood, limited parenting skills, depression, substance abuse or interpersonal violence.

Sexual Abuse: any sexual activity with a child including exhibitionism, photographs or videos, pornography, prostitution, fondling or rape. Sexual abuse exploits and degrades children. Child sexual abuse is a crime and children can never consent to sexual activity.

Physical Abuse: an injury to a child that is not an accident or action that physically harms a child. This may include: hitting, kicking, punching, beating, burning, shaking or biting. Physical abuse is a form of trauma that impacts a child's cognitive, physical, social and emotional development. Multiple stressors on a family can lead to anger and loss of control.

Emotional Abuse: maltreatment of a child that may involve criticizing, insulting, yelling, swearing, rejecting or withholding love. Emotional abuse is a misunderstood form of trauma that can cause damage to a child's developing brain leading to long term learning difficulties, problematic behaviors and increased incidences of physical and mental health issues.

What Can I Do?

If you suspect abuse, please report it.

Anything you do to support kids and parents can help reduce the isolation & stress that often leads to abuse and neglect.



Want to Save Water, Reduce Flooding and Water your Garden?

Northbrook is pleased to offer a program to promote the use of rain barrels for its residents.

The Village is selling 55-gallon rain barrels at a price of \$25 each (they typically sell for around \$100) to reduce the amount of water that enters our storm sewer system. Residents are limited to two (2) barrels per household. The rain barrels can be purchased in the Village Hall lobby during regular business hours.

Please ensure you have the means to transport the rain barrels home, as the Village does not offer rain barrel delivery services.

The barrels are terra-cotta colored to match planters and hanging pots that most nurseries and greenhouses currently sell. The color also blends in well with red brick homes. There are holes drilled into the lid for the water to drain into from your downspout. The screening over the holes keeps debris from entering the barrel and keeps mosquitoes from breeding, as well. Because all barrels are equipped with a spigot at the bottom, you have several options on how to water your plants — a garden hose, landscape tubing or drip tubing can be attached to the barrel.

If you want to use a watering can, simply situate the barrel on a wooden pedestal. The barrels also have an overflow fitting to allow excess water that flows from the downspout to be diverted away from the barrel and a linking hose fitting so barrels can be joined together and fill up from just one downspout.

Northbrook Community Portal – Information Right at Your Fingertips!

Residents who are interested in obtaining detailed information about properties in the Village now have a free resource available to them.

It's all available by simply searching an address.

The Northbrook Community Portal can be found on the Village of Northbrook website. With the click of a button, an address can be searched and an array of information can be accessed by residents, 24 hours a day, 365 days a year!

Information available includes the property PIN (property index number), zoning information and what school district, township and/or county the address is located in.



The voter precinct name and number, along with polling locations are also provided, in addition to the names of state and federal elected officials.

Other important information is available to residents, including garbage, recycling and waste collection times, as well as a Map Gallery that highlights information like responsible jurisdictions for road maintenance. All of this and more is available through the Northbrook Community Portal.

Attention Commuters — Metra Station Improvements

Improvements to the Northbrook Metra station are scheduled to be completed by the end of May.

The improvements include new doors, windows, roof replacement, exterior concrete stairs, vestibules, ADA ramp replacement, exterior railing replacements and interior tile floor repairs. Because of the construction, there may be longer lines at the parking machines, so commuters should allow extra time while improvements are underway. While the station pictured to the left is Northbrook's third train station which was built in 1988, Northbrook's first train station, pictured below, was located on the east side of the railroad tracks and built in the late 1800s. The train stop was called Shermer Station and later Shererville, in 1885. The same name was used for our Village when the area was officially incorporated in 1901 as Shererville.





Northbrook Voices Capture Our Village History... Leaving a Legacy for Generations

Each month, interviewers for the Northbrook Historical Society have the privilege of sitting down with Northbrook residents to talk about and record their Northbrook stories. While each story is different, there is a thread that runs through them all. A thread that includes neighborhoods, schools, parks, houses of worship, civic organizations and most of all, the feeling of home. Some of the stories talk about life in other countries before coming to Northbrook and how Northbrook provides a safe and welcoming place to call home.

This feeling of community is true for all generations from the very beginning of our town. In early times, it was the immigrants who joined with the English speaking population to build a community. Louis Voltz, our first Village President, was a first-generation immigrant.



Eighteen of the streets in town carry the names of some of the first immigrant settlers. These immigrants and their neighbors began the fire department and incorporated our Village.

Together, in 1907, they formed the Shermerville Improvement Club “To actively promote, by the united effort of the citizens and property owners, the material interests of the Village, endeavoring at all times to increase prosperity, beauty and facilities of the Village, to the comfort and welfare of its inhabitants.” Today, we know this same organization run by community volunteers as the Northbrook Civic Foundation.

Our schools enroll many students whose native language is not English. Many of the families in our neighborhoods are first and second generation immigrants from a multitude of countries including, but not limited to, Asia, Poland, Germany, Russia, Columbia, Mexico and Argentina. Their religious preferences are as varied as their country of origin. So while the nationality of our citizens may have changed over the generations, the Northbrook welcome they received has not.
