Northbrook Notify! Sign-up Today!

A new feature incorporated into the new website is "Northbrook Notify." The program is actually an upgrade to our auto-dialer system that has been used for mass callouts for alerts such as water boil orders and hydrant testing. The new software now allows residents and businesses to register their mobile devices for calls and text-messaging as well as e-mail addresses for Northbrook notifications. In addition, Northbrook Notify offers an option to sign up for general and non-emergency announcements. ❖ History of Communications in Northbrook

Over the past 24 years of serving as an elected Village Official, I have witnessed how the procedures and processes of offering municipal services and communicating to taxpayers have dramatically changed. When I was first elected as a Trustee in 1987, the Village communicated with the public very differently than it does today. In addition to the Village newsletter and articles in the Northbrook Star, cable television local access channels began cablecasting local programs and using video bulletin boards to share information with residents. In 1993, the Village began cablecasting board meetings on NCTV, literally bringing our political decision making process into the living rooms of Northbrook residents. In 1996, the Village launched its first webpage, one of the first in the region, to provide information for residents and businesses utilizing a new technology known as the Internet. This past September we began web streaming Village Board and Plan Commission meetings, a technology that allows anyone with Internet access, whether in Northbrook or the North Pole, to view our meetings. We've even begun using social networking – a concept never contemplated when I took office as a Trustee – to communicate with our residents and businesses, hoping to reach those who might not be drawn to our website or newsletter.

The Village Board and staff is pleased to announce the launch of the redesigned Village website. When you visit www.northbrook.il.us you'll not only see our new website design, but also a more "customer" friendly navigation system and a variety of new features. After a series of interviews by the Communications and Legislation Committee, the Village contracted with Vision Internet, one of the largest municipal website design firms in the nation, for the design, hosting and maintenance of the site. ❖ Northbrook – On the Forefront of Technology

Northbrook is proud to be on the forefront of utilizing new technology to better serve its constituents. It's important to keep our residents and businesses connected and informed about Board decisions that impact the community, in addition to Village activities and events. This month, the Village is focusing on the importance of being connected, the advantages of our redesigned website and new community notification system, and how Northbrook's government is changing to be more responsive by utilizing new technology. In addition to our more interactive website, the Village utilizes Facebook as a means to communicate on a more timely basis to those who participate. Keep in mind that Village staff is always just a phone call or e-mail away to answer questions, respond to concerns or to assist you.

❖ Northbrook's Drinking Water

An article published in the Chicago Tribune in December, 2010 looked at a recent report summarizing the levels of hexavalent chromium (also called chromium-6) in tap water from many areas of the country including Chicago in relation to a proposed standard developed by the State of California (0.06 parts per billion). Chromium-6 is a naturally occurring substance in many areas and is also a byproduct of metal working including stainless steel production and chrome plating. In response to this article, the Village of Northbrook has had its water tested for Chromium-6 using a highly sensitive process capable of detecting this contaminant down to 0.02 parts per billion.

The results of the test showed that the levels of chromium-6 in the Village's drinking water are in the non-detectable range. The Village of Northbrook continues to monitor its water to ensure its quality and safety and test for new potential contaminants based on U.S. and IEPA requirements and emerging health concerns. 2011 Parkway Tree Order Form

The Village will again share with residents and businesses the cost of purchasing and planting up to 150 parkway trees. Trees will range between 2 and 2 1/2 inches in diameter. A property owner's share will be \$100 per each tree ordered, regardless of variety or size. Multiple trees may be ordered providing there is adequate room within the public parkway area. **Sorry, no trees may be ordered for private property.**

The trees will be planted during the month of May, as weather permits. There is a 12-month one-time replacement guarantee for each tree. Guarantees do not cover tree death due to "obvious owner neglect," including over or under watering and decorative, but destructive "volcano mulching" by landscapers. Those with automatic irrigation systems should be especially alert to the potential of over watering, which can easily kill a young tree. Public Works will provide property owners with tree-care instructions.

Limitations

Trees must be planted equidistant from curb and sidewalks, typically at least 35' from other parkway trees, at least 10' from a driveway or street light, and at least 45' from an intersection to ensure unobstructed sight lines. Locations must be at least 5' from manholes, fire hydrants and B-boxes. Orders must be submitted before February 28, 2011, and will be processed in the order received. **Please send a check for the total amount due, \$100 per tree, with your application form!**

The Village has joined the Suburban Tree Consortium to offer quality trees from Wilson Nurseries, Hinsdale Nurseries, Beeson Nurseries and Beaver Creek Nursery.





Setting the Record Straight: Contrary to popular belief, the amount of energy needed to bring a room back up to temperature is less than the amount of energy needed to keep a room at a set temperature. In fact, from the time your room stabilizes at the lower temperature until you start heating it up again, you're saving energy and GHG emissions!

The Historian's Corner

The story of Edward D. Landwehr is a story of community involvement that has touched nearly every part of our Village for the past 110 years.

■ Mr. Landwehr grew up on a farm at what is now Dundee and Landwehr Roads and attended the first Grove school on Dundee Road. He was among the 70 men who formed the Fire Department in 1901. Later that year, he signed the petition to place Village incorporation up for a vote on the ballot.

■ As an elected official, he served as one of the first Park District Commissioners and as a District 28 Board of Education member from 1908 to 1931. He actively served as a volunteer in the Citizens Club of Shermerville and the Northbrook Civic Association – predecessors of The Civic Foundation. He also served on the State of Illinois committee, from its inception in the late teens, that successfully lobbied to pass referendums to pave roads across the state.

■ In 1922, he signed the petition to change the name of the Village from Shermerville to Northbrook. In fact, Northbrook, named for the west fork of the North Branch of the Chicago River, was his suggestion.

The Landwehr family is commemorated with a road named for them. His name is on a monument in the Village... do you know which monument and where it is located? Visit www.northbrook.il.us to find out! *
