

## Snow, Snow, Snow!

Just last month we dealt with extreme cold, excessive snow, school and workplace closings, challenging road conditions and lots and lots of Snow!

In response to the recent weather, Village staff cleared snow, helped stranded motorists, fixed broken water mains and helped residents with frozen water meters. The Village staff are well trained and worked as a team to provide excellent services under extreme conditions. *See Village President notes on page 3 for some interesting statistics.*

During the weather events, the Village utilized Northbrook Notify to alert residents and businesses about delayed scavenger pick-ups, frozen water pipes and space heater safety, as well as the 2" or more of snow parking ban, which helped Public Works to clear the streets with minimal obstacles.

## Primary Election on March 18

The General Primary Election On March 18, 2014 will include U.S. Senator; U.S. Representatives; State: Governor; Lieutenant Governor, Attorney General; Secretary of State; Comptroller; Treasurer; Some State Senators; State Representatives. Cook County: Board of Commissioners President; County Commissioners; Clerk; Treasurer; Sheriff, Assessor, Board of Review (1st And 2nd District), 3 Commissioners of the Metropolitan Water Reclamation District, and Judicial Office Vacancies.

Below are just some of the milestone dates for voters:

- February 6 is the first day for registered voters to apply for absentee ballot.
- February 18 is the last day to register to vote in the primary.
- February 19 is the first day for grace period registration and voting.
- March 3 is first day for early voting.
- March 15 is the last day for Grace Period registration and voting and last day for early voting.
- March 18 is the Primary Election Day

### New this Year

A citizen who is 17 years old on the date of the general primary election may vote provided: (1) that person will be 18 years old on the date of the immediately following general election, and (2) the person is registered to vote.

## Crime Prevention is the Best Defense

Review the following crime prevention safety tips in order to familiarize yourself in ways to help prevent crimes of opportunity.

- Always lock doors, windows and set home alarms, if you have one, before leaving the house. Always lock deadbolt locks.
- If you have an attached garage, be sure to lock the inside door between your garage and house. If you have a detached garage, keep it secured.
- Lock your car doors while at home, even if cars are stored inside your garage or parked in the driveway.
- Keep your garage door closed.
- Remove valuables from vehicles.
- Install secure window well covers.

- If you have double-hung or sliding windows or doors, place a wooden rod or stick in the track.
- Use timers for your lights if you come home after dark.
- If you are going on vacation, be sure to stop mail service and cancel newspapers so they don't pile up in front of your home while you are away.
- Be on the lookout and report suspicious vehicles that look out of place. Remember, burglars can be male or female, young or old, and driving any type of vehicle.

Northbrook remains a very safe community, and we all must work together to keep it that way.

Call 911 immediately with details, descriptions and plate numbers if you see:

- Any suspicious vehicles driving slowly or repetitively through your neighborhood.
- Observe someone at a neighbor's front door, then see them walking to the side or rear of the house.
- Someone rings your doorbell "by mistake." Burglars never just break in - they always ring the bell to see if anyone is home.

# Notes from Village President Sandy Frum



events responding to vehicle accidents, alarms, patrolling, and conducting well-being checks. Aside from plowing our roads, Public Works Department employees respond to calls about frozen meters and water main breaks. While most of us were enjoying the holidays in the warmth of our homes, the Village's first responders were working around the clock to keep us safe during these storms and frigid temperatures. I am extremely proud of the service our staff provides, regardless of the challenges Mother Nature has to offer.

To put the weather and snow storms experienced at the end of December and beginning of January into context, here are some interesting statistics:

The Public Works Department conducted plowing or salting operations 12 out of the 14 days between December 22nd and January 5th. During this time 1,150 tons of salt were used on our 537 lane miles of Village owned and maintained streets and municipal parking lots. In addition, Public Works responded to 22 frozen water meter calls, eight water main breaks and two water service line breaks.

During this same period, the Fire and Police Departments responded to 277 weather related calls for service; more than twice the average. These calls included accidents, fire alarms, broken water pipes and medical calls. While many businesses were closed, the Village Hall was open to support the departments and conduct business as usual.

With the potential of another six to eight weeks of winter weather, here are few tips to make life a little more bearable:

It's only February and what a winter it's been! Whether it's receiving a total of almost 2 feet of snow this year or sub-zero temperatures and wind chills for 72 consecutive hours in January, the winter weather has tested even the most stalwart of Northbrook's residents, businesses and staff.

Here are a few things you might not have thought about before - Police and Fire Departments are routinely busy during snow storms and extreme weather

- Keep your home and the area where your water meter is located heated to at least 50°F to prevent your pipes and meter from freezing.
- When removing snow from the end of your driveway, place as much snow as possible to the right side of your driveway (as you are facing the street). This will help to minimize the amount of snow ending up back on your driveway.
- When driving in winter weather, reduce speeds and increase following distances to help prevent an accident.
- Also, please give our snow and ice control equipment enough room to work - as they may make frequent stops and take longer to maneuver.

# 2014 Parkway Tree Order Form

## The Village is offering the cost sharing Parkway Tree Planting Program to residents again this year.

New trees will be 2-diameter-inches or about 8 feet tall. A property owner's cost share will be \$175 per tree ordered, regardless of variety or size. Multiple trees may be ordered, providing there is adequate room within the public parkway area. Sorry, no trees may be ordered for private property.

The trees will be scheduled for planting during the month of May, as weather permits.

### Limitations

Trees must be planted:

- equidistant from curb and sidewalks, typically at least 35' from other parkway trees
- at least 10' from a driveway or street light
- at least 45' from an intersection to ensure unobstructed sight lines
- at least 5' from manholes, fire hydrants and b-boxes

Note: Trees cannot be planted in the same spot as a recently removed parkway tree.

Ten species of trees are currently available. All trees are limited quantities on a first come, first serve basis. All trees may be viewed at [www.northbrook.il.us/ParkwayTree](http://www.northbrook.il.us/ParkwayTree).

Orders must be submitted by March 14, 2014.

- Village makes final determination on planting location.
- Orders are processed on a first come, first serve basis.
- Trees may not be refused, moved or exchanged for any reason.



### A Look Back at Northbrook Winters

As we've dealt with a winter of snow and bone-chilling cold, it's interesting to think about what life must have been like for the people who settled this town. No central heat, electricity or motorized vehicles. Just candles and lanterns for light. Wood-burning fireplaces and stoves filled with logs you cut down, hauled, cured and then split to size to keep the house warm. A horse and sleigh, open to the elements, was required for every trip.

There is a story in the Northbrook Historical Society collection that tells how Herman Bubert regularly hauled fresh eggs, butter and butchered hogs to Chicago in his wagon. On his return trip, he brought back sugar, sundries, and dry goods for his brother's store. One winter, it was reported that the snow

was so deep in Northbrook, that roads were impassable and fences were covered with snow. So, people made their own roads, driving their sleighs over the fence rails. Since Herman couldn't get the butchered hogs to market, they buried the hogs in a snow bank until the roads cleared enough to make the trip to Chicago.
