

Our Crews are Ready

The next snowstorm might be just around the corner! Here are some important tips to make this winter a breeze!

Please Be Patient as the Public Works Department Clears Our Roadways!

Remember — It takes six (6) to seven (7) hours, after the snow has stopped, to clear Northbrook's roadways, and can take even longer during heavy or extended snowfalls. When driving, please give snow plows plenty of room. Large plows take longer to stop and have multiple blind spots.

Parking Restrictions

When the Snow Falls

After a snowfall of two (2) or more inches, it is illegal to park on Northbrook streets until they have been completely cleared. Vehicles in violation are subject to ticketing and towing. If your vehicle has become disabled, call 847/564-2060 to inform the police.

Northbrook to Ask Voters for Approval to Bid Out for Electricity

The Village Board unanimously voted to place a referendum on the ballot in the March 20th primary election that will ask voters whether Northbrook should bid on the purchase of electricity for residential and small commercial businesses. Through a bidding process, the Village may be able to arrange lower rates than are currently available. It should be noted that ComEd would still serve as the power system distributor. Customers will continue to receive a monthly bill from ComEd. ComEd has no position on the program, as it does not impact them financially.

So far, over 20 Illinois communities have participated in an "electrical aggregation" program that lets them enter into agreements with electrical suppliers who are less costly than the current provider. Downtown Plan

Are you interested in seeing what the future of downtown could be? The Downtown Plan Steering Committee will be doing just that as they review the draft downtown plan on Monday evening, January 9, 2012 at 7:30 pm in the Village



Hall Board Room. The consultant team headed by Teska Associates will present the draft plan, including the following preferred development options as selected by the Committee:

- Main Metra Parking Lot (Shermer Road) — New residential development and structured parking for Metra users.
- Landmark Inn Block — Preserve existing buildings and expand commercial space along Meadow Road.
- Meadow Shopping Plaza — Two potential development options for this site will be presented:
 - Rehabilitation of existing structure to create new store fronts that face onto

Meadow Road, as well as the existing private parking lot.

- Redevelopment of site consisting of commercial space, 5-stories of multi-family residential, and a combination of surface and structured parking.
- C-1 Zoned Properties Along Shermer Road (across from Bank of America) — Retain existing structures, add new buildings along Shermer and office buildings behind, while providing suitable setbacks from adjoining single family homes.

The draft plan will be available on-line at www.northbrook.il.us/downtownplan near the end of the week of January 2.

Notes from Village President Sandy Frum



Happy New Year! On behalf of the Village Board and Staff, I wish you a very happy 2012! As we welcome the New Year, I'm sure you've already noticed the new look to our Village newsletter. I hope you find the revitalized format to be more reader friendly!

From a new, stricter Ethics Ordinance to better communication through our redesigned website and Northbrook Notify, www.northbrook.il.us/Notify, to the quarterly review of Village finances, and

completion of Northbrook's new water tower, 2011 was a busy year. I've addressed these topics in past newsletters, but I'd like to briefly focus on three areas of change for Northbrook in 2012.

Stormwater Management

After many years of dealing with stormwater, we have taken a new look at how to better handle flooding. In the past we focused on large detention areas — picture the ponds at Meadowhill Park, Northbrook Court, or at the intersection of Lake Cook and Pfingsten Roads. Our new plan focuses instead on local/neighborhood storage.

We don't have a problem with conveyance of water; we have a problem of where to retain that water until it can be released once there is capacity downstream. The new Stormwater Management Master Plan embodies this concept, and begins to address it with over 20 projects (long-term) that will help control flooding in many areas of the community.

And while there will always be street and backyard flooding (which are part of any plan), basements shouldn't flood.

ComEd

Even though we're in the midst of winter, I don't think many of us have forgotten the trials of last summer's storms. In November, the Board heard from ComEd representatives who addressed the issue of electrical reliability in Northbrook.

Here's what's in the works: Replace over 10,000 feet of old overhead cable with new "Hendrix" overhead cable which is less susceptible to outages; Improve automation and power source redundancy on three feeders in and around the Central Business District of Downtown Northbrook; replace old underground cable and have bi-annual meetings with the Village to review outage history and future improvements.

In addition, through the Northwest Municipal Conference, of which Northbrook is an active member, we have vigorously participated in legislative solutions designed to ensure that major power outages, such as those we saw due to the storms of June and July, will be addressed in a timely manner. I remain cautiously optimistic that what is being done will make a difference.

Finally, the Village Board has approved a resolution authorizing a referendum regarding electrical aggregation for the March 20 election. (See article on front page.)

Downtown Planning

Over the past couple of months, over 150 members of the Northbrook community — businesses, property owners, residents — have been involved in dreaming about possibilities that can, over time, transform our downtown. And while I haven't seen the final recommendations yet, the process has been exciting. They've talked about parking and residential structures, four-story buildings, an improved park behind the Village Hall with a lake, better access to and usage of the creek, bike lanes, and reorientation of buildings. I look forward to receiving the Committee's report and working to bring these dreams to reality.

Fire Prevention Tips

According to the National Fire Protection Association, in the U.S., someone dies from a home fire roughly every 134 minutes and every 20 seconds, a fire department responds to a fire somewhere in the nation. Smoking was the leading cause of home fire deaths overall, but in the months of December, January and February, smoking and heating equipment caused similar shares of fire deaths. With these startling statistics in mind, here are some safety tips for you and your family:

1. Have your furnace and/or fireplace inspected annually.
2. Keep flammable material 36 inches away from both your furnace and fireplace.
3. Before you go to sleep be sure your fireplace's fire is extinguished. Never close your damper with hot ashes in the fire place.
4. If you must use an electric heater be sure not to overload the circuit. Only use a properly rated extension cord.
5. Do not use portable space heaters in bathrooms or other areas where they may come in contact with water.
6. Always make sure your smoke and carbon monoxide detectors are in proper working order.

Clear the Snow Around Your Nearest Fire Hydrant!

In case of an emergency, seconds count! Please work with your neighbors to keep the fire hydrants on or near your property clear of snow for easy access.

Winter Snow Removal: Residents Encouraged to Pitch-in!

Please take the time to shovel the public sidewalks for the benefit of students, mail carriers and other pedestrians.

It's courteous and the right thing to do... and contrary to rumors, there is no liability per state law! (745 ILCS 75/1 and 75/2 of the state statutes generally provides immunity to owners, lessors or occupants of residential property for shoveling snow.)

Keep in mind that the Village is not responsible for all the roadways within the Village limits. Before calling, check the list on page 5.

Please work with your neighbors to keep the fire hydrants on or near your property clear of snow for easy access.



Winter Wonderland that was Northbrook

Generations of Northbrook children experienced the exhilarating joy of taking their sleds and toboggans down the sledding hills and gliding across the ice on sharpened ice skate blades. Skating for pleasure was a family activity. Prior to the time of outdoor rinks, children in town skated on the river which was frozen solid for most of the winter. There are even stories of skating to Glenview and back. Last winter, the river was frozen solid for just a few days.

The outdoor rink has occupied several locations. In the early days, the rink was behind the Northbrook School (now Crestwood Place). Later, the natural depression behind the Historical Society was the site.

The Tower Rink has been in official use since the late 1950s when the Cedar Lane property was purchased for the Village Hall. The rink was considerably larger than

it is today and had great ice for most of the winter. Today's winters are warmer and the ice is available for much shorter periods.

Of course, hockey players and speed skaters also filled outdoor rinks before the Sports Center and West Allis training
