Our Crews Never Miss a Beet!

Road safety is always our #1 priority.

One of the methods used by the Public Works Department to treat the roads during winter weather is a mixture of beet juice and salt brine.

Pre-treating arterial roads before a snow storm with this mixture helps to create a layer of an ice melting product which helps prevent snow and ice from bonding to the pavement.

The beet juice is an agricultural byproduct that helps to adhere salt brine to roadways while improving the prolonged effectiveness of the salt brine. The liquid mixture is applied to the road by using a tank and spray bar on the back of a dump truck as pictured above.

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Check the Date on your Vehicle License Plate Sticker, as the State Will Not Be Sending Reminders

Due to State budget cuts, vehicle owners won't be getting registration reminders for their vehicle license sticker or license plate renewal reminders.

The Secretary of State's office asks that owners check their vehicle's registration and be sure to renew on time so they don't end up on driving with expired stickers. Because of the change, more vehicle owners will have to visit the state's offices to renew their stickers. Without a reminder notice, they will not have a PIN number needed to renew the stickers online.

The closest office to renew your licence sticker is at the Deerfield Park Plaza, 405 Lake Cook Road in Deerfield.

Background:



Notes from Village President Sandy Frum



On behalf of the Village Board and Staff, I'd like to wish you and yours a very Happy New Year. One of the most interesting aspects of local government is the diversity of projects within the Village and working with Police, Fire, Public Works, Development, Information Technology and Finance. This month I wanted to take a look back at 2015 and share some of the highlights from the various Village departments.

Numerous developments were completed last year and some are still in progress, including new roadway and stormwater infrastructure as well as new commercial, businesses and residential opportunities. Many stores and restaurants opened

at NorthShore 770, on the corner of Dundee Road and Skokie Boulevard, as well as the 347-unit apartment building that will open later this year. The Waterway Gas & Wash opened just north of the Willow Festival Shopping Center, and several senior living communities were built or expanded offering our residents numerous independent living opportunities. Other significant developments that were completed in 2015, include the MeadowPark Office development, which houses the Ann & Robert H. Lurie Children's Hospital outpatient facility and a child day care facility.

Barilla relocated its North America headquarters to Northbrook and joins the likes of Crate and Barrel, Bell Flavors and Fragrances, and UL, all of which have their world headquarters here.

Northbrook Fire Department

The Fire Department responded to 6,111 calls for service, a 3.65% increase in service requests from last year. In addition to receiving support on 447 calls and providing aid on 465 calls, the Northbrook Fire Department assisted nearby jurisdictions on several large scale incidents.

The Northbrook Fire Department, along with the Northbrook Police Department, hosted a multi-municipality emergency preparedness exercise at Techny Towers that involved 18 different public safety agencies and private partners. This type of training is at the forefront of our community's preparation efforts to deal with large-scale emergencies, and provides collaboration between police and fire agencies in a dynamic and stressful environment.

Northbrook Police Department

The Police Department continued its tradition of providing law enforcement and community services to the Village. The Department is committed to keeping Northbrook a safe and desirable place in which to live, work, shop, dine and play.

In 2015, the department transitioned from paper to electronic crash reports. This required a significant investment in new technology including the installation of mobile printers for the patrol fleet. The Department is also replacing the in-car video camera systems and laptop computers, offering better access to technology.

Northbrook Public Works

The Public Works Department continued maintenance and construction of the Village's vast infrastructure including street maintenance, water production and distribution, sanitary sewer, and storm sewers. In addition, Public Works manages our urban forest, maintains the Village's buildings and vehicle fleet, as well as snow and ice control. In total, the Village had 20 snow and ice control events last winter, with 13 requiring only salting operations. A total of 2,200 tons of salt were utilized.

Stormwater management continued to be a priority in the Village in 2015. The Village completed the Cherry Lane Underpass project to reduce the severity and duration of flooding at this location, and the Shermer Road Overflow stormwater project, which included the installation of sewers between Shermer Road and the West Fork of the North Branch of the Chicago River. In order to continue to meet the needs of the Skokie Boulevard corridor, the installation of approximately 4,600 linear feet of sewers was completed this year.

Due to damage by the Emerald Ash Borer, 572 parkway Ash trees were removed, and about 800 parkway trees have been or will be replanted.

Information Technology

The Village's new Enterprise Resource Planning (ERP) system started rolling out in this past year. The ERP replaces stand alone, non-integrated systems previously used at the Village, which were no longer supported by vendors. The new system will easily tie resident and business data together, allowing easy access to information.

Finances in the Village

For the past fifteen years Northbrook has earned triple-A ratings from Standard and Poor's as well as Moody's. Only four other communities in Illinois carry this distinction.

Substance Abuse in the Suburbs

Abuse of prescription drugs is on the rise, and it has significantly affected a segment of the population traditionally considered to be at a lower risk for addiction problems.

Painkillers, anti-depressants and stimulants are among the more frequently abused prescription medications and are typically found in the home medicine cabinet.

Prescription medications are not the only drugs that present a growing problem among suburban populations; illegal drugs, such as heroin, are also problematic.

The Northbrook Fire Department responded to approximately 11 heroin related overdoses in the past three years, two of which resulted in deaths.

However, the expense of acquiring opioid painkillers such as hydrocodone (Vicodin) and OxyContin, as well as the effort to crack down on prescription drug abuse has led many teens and adults to try heroin, which provides a faster, more intense high and is also cheaper to purchase.

- Heroin is cheap. Currently, the street value for a small bag of heroin is around \$8 to \$10.
- Heroin is everywhere, yes even in Northbrook
- You can snort it, inject it or smoke it.
- Heroin is the second most common drug for which individuals enter treatment, after alcohol.
- Most new users are suburban white teens and young adults.

Northbrook paramedics carry Narcan, an antidote which helps counteract the effect of opioids such as heroin. When a person is overdosing on an opioid, breathing can slow down or stop, and it can be very difficult to wake them from this state.

A study by the Illinois Consortium on Drug Policy at Chicago's Roosevelt University found that 35 percent of individuals admitted to Illinois-funded substance abuse treatment programs are there due to heroin addiction, more than twice the national average. Heroin overdose is a particular risk because the amount and purity of the drug cannot be accurately known.

What are the signs of heroin addiction?

- Small pupils
- Increased sleeping
- Not following rules or skipping school
- Sneaking out of the house
- Lying about stolen money or items
- Distancing away from family
- Change in grooming, friends, and behavior
- Finding paraphernalia: needles, spoons, lighters, or bottle caps
- Constipation

If you think you're witnessing a drug overdose and seek medical help, you will receive immunity from criminal charges for drug possession. The overdose victim you're helping is protected, too. Call 911.

When driving, please give snow plows plenty of room. Large plows take longer to stop, have multiple blind spots and make frequent backing maneuvers. Keep in mind that the Village is not responsible for plowing all the roadways within the Village limits.

Shoveling Does Have Health Risks!

Stop shoveling and call 911 if you experience: discomfort or heaviness in chest, arms or neck; unusual or prolonged shortness of breath; dizzy or faint feeling; blurred vision; excessive sweating; nausea; or vomiting.

Parking Restrictions

After a snowfall of two or more inches, it is illegal to park on the streets until they have been completely cleared. Vehicles in violation are subject to ticketing and towing. If your vehicle has become disabled, call 847/564-2060 to inform the police.

Clear the Snow Around Your Nearest Fire Hydrant!



In case of an emergency, every second counts!
Please work with neighbors to keep the fire hydrants on or near your property clear of snow for easy access.

How to Shovel Your Driveway

When clearing snow from your driveway, shovel snow in the direction of traffic, and try to make a pocket on the opposite side of the driveway, as shown. By doing so, more snow that is plowed by our trucks will be dumped into that pocket and less snow on your driveway.

Coyotes — Living with Wildlife in Northbrook

Coyotes are part of the natural wildlife that surrounds our community. Generally, the coyotes are non-aggressive and spend the vast majority of time in the forest preserves.

All are reminded that winter weather may make coyotes more visible as they venture from the woodlands to forage for food. Please review the following information with your family:

- Coyotes will search out small animals for food, so pet owners should be vigilant about watching their small pets when outside.
- Always keep pets on a leash, especially in or around wooded areas. Keep cats indoors.
- Coyotes eat a variety of foods, including plants and small animals, and generally cause few problems in the community.

- Although the coyotes are wild animals and do hunt to survive, they will generally shy away from humans.
- Children should be cautioned that coyotes are not dogs, and they should not chase or try to pet them.
- Aggressive behavior toward humans is rare but not unknown.
- Try to keep coyotes away from your home by making sure that your garbage cans have lids that are sealed tightly.
- Do not feed your pet outside or leave pet food outside.
- Never feed the coyotes!



Shermerville/Northbrook

A Community Built Around the Railroad

When the first settlers came to this area they settled in all corners of the Township building schools, stores and houses of worship.

In 1872, the Milwaukee and St. Paul Railroad laid a single track connecting Milwaukee to Chicago. Two years later, the railroad's name was changed to Chicago, Milwaukee and St. Paul; that's when the Shermerville Railroad Station was built across the tracks from the present station, setting in motion a dramatic shift in settlement patterns.

Within a few years, commercial buildings clustered around the station and Shermerville began to prosper. Shermerville was one of many settlements that sprang up beside the railroad tracks.

In 1892, when a small residential subdivision began on Church Street, a

Village was born and the population center shifted to what is now the Shermer Road corridor, where it remained for many years. It was this settlement of just under two square miles in size

that was incorporated as the Village of Shermerville in 1901. The railroad was also one of the factors that prompted the rapid growth of the town from 1950s – 1980s.

Railroads were also responsible for opening up coast-to-coast exploration, as they made it possible for the average person to board a train and see the country. Sleeping compartments with pull-down berths and fine meals in the dining car were part of the romance of the rails.



Today, the Milwaukee Road is still vital to the success of Northbrook. While it no longer carries crops to market, it does carry thousands of our citizens to the city and back each day.
