Business Briefs

Downtown Plan

Earlier this year, the Village's Downtown Plan Steering Committee completed its work on preparing its vision and formally recommended approval of a new Downtown Plan. The President and Board of Trustees are currently reviewing the document.

A copy of the draft plan can be found on the Village website at www.northbrook.il.us/downtownplan. The Downtown Plan takes the ideas gathered and developed throughout the public participation process and creates a comprehensive plan to guide the future of downtown.

The Plan identifies ways that the redevelopment and enhancement of the downtown occur in a coordinated and complementary way through land use decisions, transportation elements (transit, parking, circulation and access), public streetscape improvements (including entryway features), design guidelines, business development efforts, and zoning regulations.



The Plan also identifies potential redevelopment concepts for six targeted properties in the downtown. These redevelopment concepts were based upon the market study completed as part of the plan and were evaluated in terms of their potential financial feasibility.

The table on page 8 briefly summarizes the development options and the degree of public participation envisioned.

These general concepts were developed to create a vision of what could occur on each site. As developers express interest in development of any of these sites, the Village would remain open to proposals that generally meet the general goals of each of the concept plans.

As noted on page 8, some of the development concepts contain significant financial gaps due to a variety of factors and would require some form of public financial participation. For instance, the existing building on the Meadow Plaza site provides its owner with a significant income stream. For a developer to purchase this property for redevelopment,

they would need to pay the current property owners a price that reflects the current income stream – not just the value of the land. Having to pay a land price that truly reflects the value to the property owner is critical in successfully promoting redevelopment, but can also create a “gap” that may require some form of public financial participation. The Village Board has yet to decide if or how the Village would financially participate with the redevelopment of any of the sites.

One tool often used to promote redevelopment through public participation is tax increment financing (TIF). The “tax increment” is the difference between the amount of property taxes collected before and after the designation of a TIF District. The amount of taxes collected before the designation continues to go to all of the taxing districts. The tax increment is invested into development projects within the district that would not occur without the investment of the increment. Prior to the Board ever adopting the use of TIF financing, a process would take place that allows the other taxing districts and the public to participate in deciding the use of TIF financing. *continued on page 8*



Notes from Village President Sandy Frum



The Capitol is an interesting place during the last week of a session. I found that trying to speak directly to a legislator is not the easiest thing to do. They are very busy in the House or Senate Chambers, debating (and voting on) bills. The process involves sending in your business card and then waiting to talk to the legislator. When they do, you have just a few minutes to make your case. You have to hope that your previous correspondence has at least familiarized them with your concerns on any given issue. The point, I think, is simply to let them know you are still interested in the outcome – and that you are watching. Does it make a difference? I think so.

The State's 2013 budget was approved on May 31, at the last possible minute, and to our relief, it did not involve any major diversions of local government revenues. Some of the proposals originally floated would have affected us severely. After staunch opposition from local governments, none of them were included.

Two bills that I opposed did not move forward: One would have required that contractors working on public works or publicly financed projects comply with responsible bidder rules, including participation in a U.S. Department of Labor approved and registered apprenticeship and training programs. This would have prohibited virtually all small local businesses from bidding on Village projects. Another bill would have allowed banks to Fast Track Foreclosure of abandoned properties (a good thing) without provisions that would have greatly alleviated the burden on local governments to maintain these properties during the foreclosure process (not such a good thing).

And one bill I opposed passed: This bill bars municipalities from prohibiting charity solicitation by public safety personnel. The

While the Northbrook Village Board spends a significant amount of time on local issues, the Trustees and I are also mindful to focus on regional, state and national issues that affect Northbrook. Whether we are dealing with transportation, environment, taxes or infrastructure, working with other communities, agencies and/or legislators is another important responsibility that we share.

I traveled to Springfield in May to remind legislators that reforms for public safety pensions still need to be adopted. This visit was highlighted by a press conference along with discussions with legislators focusing on the lack of action on their part.

bill states that municipalities must allow their law enforcement personnel, firefighters or other persons “employed to protect the public safety” to solicit for a charitable organization on any street or in any intersection. My concern on this rests with safety.

Pension reform is still in the hands of the State legislature, as no reforms were passed during this session. We will continue to monitor proposals that are made in order to understand how any changes will impact our community and our employees.

What's Going on Around the Village?

Frequently I am stopped by residents inquiring about various projects and issues going on in the Village. Here are a few topics you may be wondering about:

What's going on with the property at Dundee and Skokie? Northwest Corner of Dundee and Skokie. The owner of the property, Beal Bank, has been marketing the property for a mixed use development. Interested buyers of the property had until June 8 to submit proposals and bids. Over the next several weeks and months, the bank will be evaluating the proposals and selecting a buyer. Any proposed development will need to be reviewed and approved by the Village Board.

What's up with all the water main breaks on Waukegan Road?

Over the past year, there have been multiple water main breaks on Waukegan Road. Once a water main has a break, the main becomes weakened and the likelihood of additional breaks is increased. The Public Works Department has already installed three new valves on the main to help reduce the number of customers affected by any potential breaks in the future. The long-term solution is to replace the main. Currently, Public Works is expediting the design of a new water main for this area and hopes to begin construction in 2013.

Can You Taste the Water?



From time to time during summer and early autumn months, the Village receives inquiries about a musty/earthy taste and odor of the Village's drinking water.

This phenomenon may begin as early as July and can last through October. The problem appears to be the result of ecological changes due to the colonization of Zebra mussels along the shoreline of Lake Michigan.

The water is safe to drink. The presence of algae by-products poses no health risks and the taste and odor gradually subside with the onset of cooler weather.

If you have special sensitivity to this taste/odor, you may wish to consider an in-home treatment device with an activated charcoal filter that has replaceable cartridges. The Downtown Plan sets a framework for the how the downtown could redevelop and be enhanced.

Over the next several months the Village Board will be identifying specific initial steps the Village can take to encourage this. However, the Village itself cannot dictate when and how the downtown actually redevelops. A partnership of

downtown business and property owners, developers, residents, and the Village is required to make change happen.

Site	Description of Redevelopment	Public Financial Participation Required
West Metra Parking Lot	Construct a new structure with multi-family residential units and combination of surface and structured parking spaces containing 567 spaces for Metra users (an increase of 127 new Metra spaces).	A new public parking structure would require additional public investment to construct and operate.
Meadow Plaza Shopping Center	Two Redevelopment Options were studied: Option 1. Modest rehabilitation of the existing structures and new "storefronts" facing Meadow Road. Option 2. A major redevelopment of the shopping center, adding nearly 100 multi-family residential units while retaining approximately 90,000 square feet of commercial space. A five-story mixed use building and a one-story commercial structure were envisioned.	Option 1 would not require public financial participation, but would involve increased rents for tenants Option 2 would not be economically self-sufficient and would likely require public participation and much more favorable market conditions.

Would require public financial participation to make the desired improvements and relocate the existing Village Public Works garage.
Northbrook Shopping Center Expansion	Allow for some new retail uses at the corner of Shermer and Church by replacing a current office structure and a portion of the Bank of America parking lot with new retail buildings.	Would not require public financial participation, but would require increased rents.

Village Goes to Great Depths for Stormwater Improvements

**How deep do you have to dig to
construct an 84 inch (7-foot) diameter
storm sewer under Techny Road?
No, it's not a trick question but
the answer may surprise you.**

To construct the 7 foot diameter storm sewer under Techny Road, excavations have to go down more than 17 feet. This is because a base of stone must be put down under the 8 foot segments of pipe (weighing 11 tons each) and the roadway to provide sufficient support for the infrastructure. As part of the Techny Road construction project the Village will be installing 1,100 feet of 7-foot diameter sewer, 3,435 feet of 6-foot diameter sewer, and 1,500 feet of 4-foot diameter sewer pipe, which in total is enough to hold almost 1,184,0000 gallons of stormwater – more volume than our new water tower.

During construction, Techny Road will remain two-way between Second Street and Shermer to minimize impacts on Glenbrook North High School and Second Street. Access to Covenant Village from Foxglove Drive will remain open during construction. All other eastbound traffic will be directed to Willow Road as the detour route until construction is complete in December 2013.

Motorists will be able to access the YMCA and Northbrook Covenant Church from eastbound Techny Road until approximately late July, at which point this portion of Techny will be closed for construction. Residents will be able to continue accessing the YMCA and Covenant Church from westbound Techny Road during this second portion of construction.”



Imagine

In July we commemorate the independence of our nation. In August, we will celebrate our community at Northbrook Days. *Can you visualize our summer without these beloved events?*

There was a time when these celebrations and many of the organizations and other celebrations intrinsic to our community did not exist. What we know today began because someone or some group cared.

In 1925, volunteers organized the first Northbrook Day. The name of the organization that planned it evolved through the years to become the Northbrook Civic Foundation. The event and the community spirit continue today.

From 1956 through 1967, the Northbrook Jaycees planned and ran the fireworks program. The Northbrook Jaycees no longer exist. Yet the spirit in which they planned the first celebration is still evident today.

In 1963, Bert Pollak, who served as Village President from 1957 to 1969, issued a proclamation that captured that spirit. The proclamation said in part:

“... historically the 4th of July has been a time for reflection on the blessings of freedom inherent in the Declaration of Independence . . . we urge all the citizens of Northbrook to pause and reflect . . . upon the blessings of our American heritage.”

In 1966, Ken Thiel, who was then the North Suburban YMCA general secretary, planned a 4th of July parade that made national news. That year marchers carried transistor radios tuned to a local station playing patriotic music. The



parade, with no bands, drew an estimated 22,000 spectators.

The Northbrook 4th of July Association became an Illinois Not-For-Profit Corporation on June 20, 1968. Since that time, a revolving core of dedicated community volunteers has planned the July 4th celebrations we all love.

Today is the time to reflect upon the countless men and women who give of their time and talents for the betterment of the community. Please take a moment to thank them. “Imagine” is the theme of this year’s Independence Day parade. Imagine a Village without volunteers who step up to take over when others leave. The future of this story is yours to write.
