Downtown Improvements Require Shermer Road Bridge Closure this Summer

The Shermer Road Bridge Project consists of the removal/replacement of the bridge deck and beams that carry Shermer Road over the West Fork of the North Branch of the Chicago River, as well as resurfacing on Shermer Road, between Church Street and Waukegan Road. Starting Tuesday, August 7, the bridge, located between Church Street and Village Green Park in downtown Northbrook, will be closed to both pedestrian and vehicle traffic for roughly three months. Utility work will start mid-July.

Business District Detour Route

Detour routes during the road closure will include Shermer Road to Cherry-Church intersection to Meadow Road, or Church Street to Walters Avenue to Meadow Road. Business Briefs

Property Tax Incentives for Businesses

A strong property tax base is critically important for the Village, school districts, park district and other taxing bodies to deliver essential public services to the residents and businesses of Northbrook.

The Village selectively uses incentives to attract new businesses and retain existing businesses, provided certain pre-established criteria are satisfied.

The most frequently used incentive program for the Village is a Cook County 6B property tax incentive program, available for manufacturing, warehouse, and research facilities that are either expanding or occupying vacant buildings.

The Cook County Class 6B program reduces the overall property tax bill for industrial and warehouse buildings over the course of 12 years, but increases the taxes to their normal level in year 13. Northbrook does not allow businesses to apply for renewal of the 6B incentive, although that option is available under the County program.

The Village has recently used the County 6B incentive programs in three instances, allowing two existing Northbrook businesses to move ahead with major expansion plans and attracting a new business to move to Northbrook. This article briefly highlights the three businesses and the incentives received.

Wiss, Janney, Elstner Associates, (WJE) Inc. received a 6B property tax incentive in 2016 to significantly improve and expand their headquarters complex, located at the corner of Pfingsten Road and Maria Road in the Sky Harbor Business Park.

WJE is a world leader in the investigation, testing, and design of repairs for buildings, bridges, and other structures and has 270 employees at their Northbrook headquarters. The highlight of the campus improvement is a new 70,000 square foot laboratory facility, estimated to cost over \$25 million to construct. Work on the new campus is nearly complete. Approving the incentive allowed the Village to retain this important local business and its synergy with our other research facilities, including UL, which is located directly across the street from WJE on Pfingsten Road.

Earlier this year, Pyramid Packaging, Inc. received a 6B incentive to construct a \$1.5 million expansion of their existing facility at 2901 Shermer Road.

Pyramid Packaging is a supplier of packaging machinery, supplies, and services. Pyramid Packaging was established in 1968 specializing in packaging supplies for food, medical, and industrial customers. They have been located at 2901 Shermer Road for approximately four years.

Jet International is a supplier of airframe and engine components for commercial aircraft.

In 2017, Jet International received a 6B incentive to relocate their existing business from Glenview to the vacant industrial building at 1919 Stanley Street. Maurice Sporting Goods formerly occupied the vacant building. The company plans to occupy the entire building and invest approximately \$500,000 into building improvements. They plan to move its entire operation and bring their 26 full-time employees to Northbrook.

Economic Development in Northbrook

The Village's Industrial & Commercial Development Commission and Economic Development Committee are both involved in the review of these incentive requests and make recommendations to the Village President and Board of Trustees. Notes from Village President Sandy Frum



As we celebrate America's 242nd birthday on July 4, I invite everyone to gather with their family, friends, and neighbors to enjoy a full day of festivities organized by Village and Park District staff, aided by volunteers from the Rotary Club of Northbrook. During the planning of Northbrook's Independence Day festivities, safety is our #1 concern. Portions of the parade route along Cherry Lane have been identified as a special concern, due to the popularity of the area at the beginning of the parade.

In an effort to accommodate the spectators in the area along Cherry Lane, from

Western Avenue to Briarwood Lane, safety barricades will be placed along the roadway to expand the viewing area away from the curb line and to ensure spectators are off the parade route. Parents are reminded to keep children from running into the roadway during the parade. Candy and giveaways will be handed out only to those on or behind the curb or safety barricades.

Please join me in cheering on this year's Parade Marshals, recently promoted Police Chief Roger Adkins and Fire Chief Andy Carlson. The Chiefs were promoted from within and have served 31 years and 19 years respectively. I'm very proud of both Chiefs and with their experience and professionalism Northbrook remains a safe and secure community.

Smart Consumers and Staying Safe

I'm sure everyone has heard about fraudulent emails and phishing scams that con you into sharing valuable information – such as bank account numbers. Scammers use your information to steal your money, your identity, or both. Another fraudulent activity to be aware of is spoofing. This occurs when a caller falsifies the information shown on your telephone's caller ID display. Some residents have received calls from a scammer posing as the Village of Northbrook and asking for credit card information. Please be careful about providing personal information over the phone, especially if someone has unexpectedly called you asking for account numbers, mother's maiden names, passwords, or other personal information. Enjoy Northbrook Events this Summer

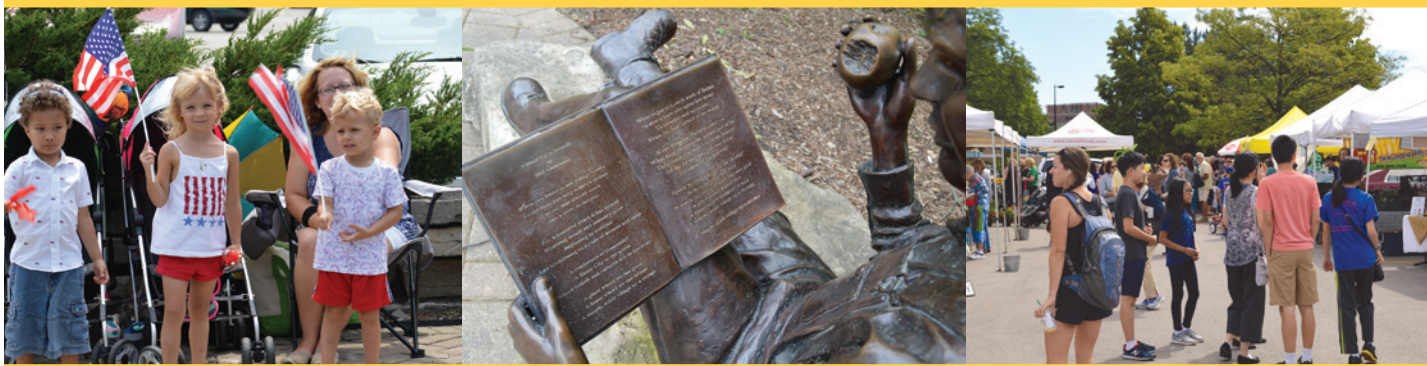

A Reminder About Curfew Laws from Police Chief Adkins

Parents – Are you aware of the curfew for teen drivers under 18?

There are restrictions on the time that anyone under the age of 18 can be out driving. On Fridays and Saturdays, teens are allowed to drive until 11pm; and from Sunday through Thursday, it's 10pm.

There are exemptions: teens driving to or from religious functions, employment,

or school activities are allowed to be out as long as they make no extra stops and head home immediately.

Many parents impose stricter curfews on their children during the school year and perhaps are more lenient during the summer months.

Curfew Laws in Illinois

The general curfew laws are 11pm - 6am on weekdays (Sunday through Thursday) and midnight - 6am on weekends (Friday and Saturday) for anyone under the age of 17.

Can You Taste the Water?

From time to time during summer and early autumn, the Village receives inquiries about a musty/earthy taste and odor in drinking water.

The problem appears to be the result of ecological changes caused by the colonization of Zebra mussels in Lake Michigan.

The water is safe to drink. The presence of algae by-products poses no health risks and the taste and odor gradually subside with the onset of cooler weather. If you have special sensitivity to this taste/odor, you may wish to consider an in-home treatment device.

ComEd Reminds Customers to Keep Foil Balloons Away from Power Lines

Did you know foil balloons, also known as Mylar, in the air can lead to power outages when they come into contact with power lines?

In the past, more than 240,000 customer interruptions occurred because of foil balloon contact. When a foil balloon contacts a power line or a part of substation equipment, its metallic properties can cause a surge of electricity that may, in turn, cause the equipment to short-circuit. The spark generated could lead to a power outage or fire.

You can help reduce foil balloon-related power outages and ensure safety by keeping the following tips in mind:



- Keep balloons tethered and attached to a weight at all times.
- Properly dispose of Mylar balloons by puncturing the balloon to release helium that otherwise could cause the balloon to float away.
- Never touch a power line. Do not attempt to retrieve a balloon, toy, or any other object that is entangled in an overhead power line. For assistance, call ComEd at 1-800-EDISON-1 (800/334-7661).
- Always assume power lines are live and keep yourself, your belongings and anything you are carrying at least 10 feet away from power lines.

Risk for Pets and Wildlife

Dogs, cats, and other domesticated animals, as well as wildlife, may be exposed to toxic rodenticide.

Sadly, these chemicals make the top-ten list of toxins responsible for pet poisonings, according to the American Society for the Prevention of Cruelty to Animals (ASPCA). The US EPA states that more than 100 pet deaths are reported each year from exposure to rodenticides.

Rodenticides are not only poisonous for rodents. Rodent baits can be lethal to any mammal or bird that ingests them or feeds on a poisoned rodent.

Controlling rodents with rodenticide baits puts pets at high risk of becoming ill or dying – either through direct ingestion (primary poisoning) or by eating poisoned rodents (secondary poisoning).

Safeguarding your home from mice and other rodents doesn't require the use of potentially hazardous poisons. Safe, effective, and affordable solutions can help you rodent-proof your home while ensuring the health of your pets.

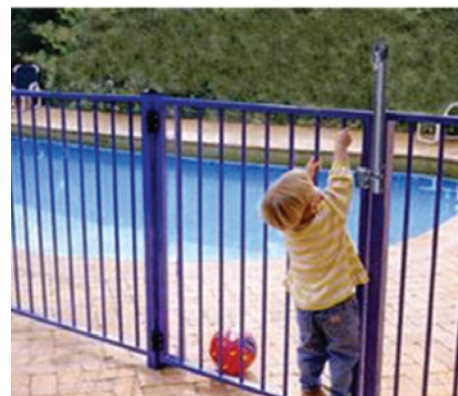
Maintain a Safe Environment Around Your Swimming Pool

Tragically, over 200 young children drown in backyard swimming pools each year. Drowning is the leading cause of injury-related death among children ages one to four.

Northbrook Fire Chief Andy Carlson suggests that pool owners make safety their number one priority by following these guidelines.

- Secure your pool with appropriate barriers. Completely surround your pool with a minimum five-foot-high fence or barrier with a self-closing, self-latching gate at every opening.
- Pools and hot tubs should have drain covers and a safety vacuum release system to prevent drain suction entrapment.
- Consider installing a pool alarm that goes off if anyone enters the pool.
- Place a locking/safety cover on the pool or hot tub when not in use and remove any ladders or steps used for access.
- Keep children supervised at all times and especially stay in arm's reach of all young kids. Designate a responsible person to watch the water when people are in the pool and never allow anyone to swim alone. Have young or inexperienced swimmers wear an approved life jacket.
- Ensure everyone in the home knows how to swim well by enrolling him or her in age-appropriate water orientation and learn-to-swim courses.
- Establish and enforce rules and safe behaviors, such as "no diving," "stay away from drain covers," "swim with a buddy" and "walk please."
- Keep your pool or hot tub water clean and clear. Maintain proper chemical levels, circulation, and filtration to avoid stagnant water. Regularly test and adjust the chemical levels to minimize the risk of earaches, rashes or more serious diseases.
- Make sure everyone in the home knows how to respond to aquatic emergencies by having appropriate safety equipment and taking water safety, first aid, and CPR courses.
- If you experience an emergency call 911! The dispatcher's safety training will allow you to take immediate action until the first responders arrive.

What is Distracted Driving?

Distracted driving is any activity that diverts attention from safe driving, including talking or texting on your phone, eating and drinking, talking to people in your vehicle, paying for something with a credit card, fiddling with the entertainment or navigation system. Texting is the most alarming distraction. Sending or reading a text takes your eyes off the road for five seconds. At 55 mph, that's like driving the length of an entire football field with your eyes closed.



You cannot drive safely unless the task of driving has your full attention. Any non-driving activity you engage in is a potential distraction and increases your risk of crashing.

Spoofing, Phishing & Frauds

Residents should be mindful of any solicitation or call asking for credit card or banking information. If you get a call from someone claiming to be from the IRS or telling you that you are going to be arrested, or asking you to pay a bill with a gift card, it's a scam.

Sometimes callers use Spoofing. "Spoofing" occurs when a caller deliberately falsifies the information transmitted to your caller ID display to disguise their identity. Spoofing is often used to trick someone into giving away valuable personal information so it can be used in fraudulent activity or sold illegally. Never give out personal information such as account numbers, Social Security numbers, mother's maiden names, passwords, or other identifying information in response to unexpected calls or if you are at all suspicious of the caller.

If you get an inquiry from someone who says they represent a company or a government agency, including the Village of Northbrook, seeking personal information, hang up and call the phone number on your account statement, in the phone book, or on the agency's official website to verify the authenticity of the request.

To report fraud, identity theft, or an unfair business practice, visit www.ftc.gov/complaint, click on the FTC Complaint Assistant icon. The more information you can provide about the situation, the more useful your complaint will be.

If you feel you are a victim of fraud, call the Northbrook Police at 847-564-2060.

Solicitors Going Door to Door

The law guarantees solicitors the right to solicit in the Village; however they must abide by the regulations. The Police Department screens all solicitor permit requests before a permit is issued.

Every year, especially during warm weather, the Northbrook Police Department receives calls from residents concerned about the number of solicitors going door to door.

Door to door solicitation permits fall into two categories:

- **Commercial** - Commercial permits are issued to solicitors that are selling goods and services door-to-door. This includes people hanging flyers on your doorknobs. Commercial solicitors should have a Village permit with their photo, the name of the company, and dates for which the permit is valid.
- **Not for Profit or Charitable Groups** - This category includes religious and political groups that are asking for donations. By law, they do not need a permit to solicit, but they do need to prove to the Village that they are a charitable organization in good standing with the Attorney General's office. Those that contact the Police Department are issued a letter acknowledging their request to be in Northbrook and are advised as to the regulations set forth in our ordinance.

Permits are not required for all door-to-door solicitors

People who come to your door and do not ask you for any donations, such as political candidates or certain religious organizations, do not need any type of permit or acknowledgement from the Police Department.

Post a No Solicitors sticker on your door

"No Solicitors" signs/stickers can be obtained at local hardware stores, the Village Hall, and the Police Department or at home. If you have a "No Solicitors" or similar notice on your property, a solicitor should not ring your doorbell or hang any type of flyer on your door handle, no matter under what category they fall.

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Historian's Corner

presented by the Northbrook Historical Society

Four of the many outdoor sculptures in town are in Village Green Park. Centennial Plaza and fountain, dedicated in 2001 at the corner of Shermer and Meadow, has three sculptures by Colorado artist and Illinois native James Haire. These bronze sculptures represent the Village's past and future and depict children at play throughout Northbrook's first century.

"Shermerville Sunset" represents the agricultural roots of the Village and salutes the families and businesses whose dedication built our Village. The book the Shermerville boy is reading is inscribed with the lyrics of the song "Village by a Stream" written by Wescott music teacher Bill Vaananen for the opening of the 2001 Centennial concert. Sunset Foods sponsored this statue.



"Skipping Through Time" honors community leaders and volunteers and aptly portrays the delicate balance that was required to guide the Village through times of rapid growth from a small rural Village to a bustling beautiful suburb. LaSalle Bank (now Bank of America) sponsored this statue of a girl jumping rope.



"Celebrating Northbrook", the boy with the fire helmet, symbolizes the community in 2001. He honors all those who have given their time and talent to make Northbrook a better place to live. His fire helmet honors all Village employees, with a special emphasis on the Fire Department, whose 100th birthday was also celebrated in 2001. The shield honors Assistant Fire Chief Wayne Luecht who gave his life in the line of duty and whose courage and commitment are still an inspiration to all. This statue was sponsored by The Northbrook Centennial 2001 Committee, which represented all of the residents of the Village.



Between the River and the Northbrook History Museum is Memorial Plaza dedicated in 2009 to the men who gave the ultimate sacrifice in war and peacetime while on military duties. Beside the flagpole is another James Haire statue titled, **"For Which It Stands."**
