


From the Northbrook Economic Development Committee

Business Success Strengthens Community

Northbrook has enjoyed a long history as both an appealing residential community and an attractive center for business.

These coexisting identities are not in conflict; they complement and support each other in very tangible ways. A healthy business climate is essential to sustaining the excellent schools, parks, library, and other public services that benefit everyone.

Many local residents are familiar with the Village's rural roots from the late 1800s. Less well-known is the parallel story of local industry. For example, this area of Northfield Township was a regional center of brick making that helped rebuild Chicago after the Great Fire of 1871. Decades later, the combination of open land and easy transportation routes (including train lines and later, access to both I-94 and I-294) drew major companies to establish headquarters here. Retail business has also had a powerful impact on the Village's evolution, boosted by the opening of Northbrook Court in 1976 and Willow Festival in 2008.

This strong commercial environment, and the tax revenue generated by it, gives Northbrook a unique advantage over other North Shore communities. In a ranking of nearby municipalities, Northbrook boasts nearly 3000 active businesses, hundreds more than second-place Evanston despite that city having more than double Northbrook's population. These companies, large and small, provide the livelihood for thousands of residents and also bring in scores of commuters from other communities who spend their money shopping and dining near their workplaces.

Residents may not realize that Northbrook businesses offset the burden of Village expenses that would otherwise fall on residential property taxpayers. The three largest property tax payers remit more than \$12 million annually, dollars that support the services that we all value so highly. Due to tax ordinances existing only in Cook County, owners of business property pay 60% more in taxes than residential owners on a dollar-per-dollar basis. Commercial property produces 2.5 times the Equalized Assessment Value (EAV) and tax revenue per dollar of value compared to residential property. Across the border in Lake County, the ratio is 1:1 with no subsidy for residential owners.

This tax differential means that Northbrook homeowners pay a lower proportion of the overall cost to maintain our top-quality schools, outstanding park facilities, award-winning library, and vital public services.

In addition, sales tax revenue from retail and hospitality businesses constitute 35% of the Village's corporate fund, far more than any other single source. The Village partners with the Chamber of Commerce to promote local shopping and dining, recognizing the great importance of this economic sector to the well-being of the Village.

Businesses also provide support to the many non-profit agencies that enhance the community.

Companies donate money, volunteer time, and contribute expertise to the Northfield Township Food Pantry, North Suburban YMCA, Youth Services of Glenview/ Northbrook, and dozens of other entities. Without that business support, individuals, and families who rely on those agencies would be underserved.



In the coming years, Northbrook's business climate faces significant challenges. The transition from local to online shopping has required creative reimagining to keep traditional retail spaces like Northbrook Court viable. Increased Cook County costs, like the tax differential described earlier, place Northbrook at a competitive disadvantage in attracting new investment. These challenges can best be addressed when Northbrook's residents, governments, and business leaders work together to develop innovative solutions. By appreciating the concerns and contributions of each, Northbrook can continue its legacy as a welcoming community to live, work, and do business.

Impressive Full Scale Drill - Overview of Maple School First Responder Exercise

Speaking of safety, last month I attended a first responder exercise at the old Maple School prior to demolition. The full-scale exercise, coordinated by staff from the Northbrook Police and Fire Departments, was as close to the real thing as possible. It was impressive to watch our staff, along with representatives from the school districts, Northshore University Health Care, and area community first responders from Deerfield, Glencoe, Highland Park, and Northfield, test and evaluate functions in our emergency operations plan. The purpose of this full-scale exercise was to enhance Northbrook's preparedness and safety by evaluating Police and Emergency Medical Services' (EMS) ability to respond to and recover from a variety of emergency scenarios. During the drill, participants were able to assess and refine emergency operation procedures. I can tell you, it was quite an impressive display of communication and coordination. Northbrook is in good hands, with all the equipment and resources available in our area, combined with the knowledge and skills of our management and first responders.

As we celebrate America's 243rd birthday on July 4, I invite everyone to enjoy a full day of festivities organized by Village and Park District staff, aided by volunteers from the Rotary Club of Northbrook. This year, members of Northbrook's American Legion Post 791 will be our Parade Marshals. Please join me to cheer them on as they kick-off our 4th of July parade at 2:30 p.m.!

Can You Taste the Water?

From time to time during summer and early autumn months, the Village receives inquiries about a musty/earthy taste and odor of the Village's drinking water.

This phenomenon may begin in July and can last through October. The problem is due to the colonization of Zebra mussels along the shoreline of Lake Michigan. The water is safe to drink. The presence of algae by-products poses no health risks and the taste and odor gradually subside with the onset of cooler weather. If you have special sensitivity to this taste/odor, you may wish to consider an in-home treatment device with an activated charcoal filters. If you have any questions, please call 847-664-4116.

It's Past Curfew, Do You Know Where Your Children Are?

A Reminder About Curfew Laws from Police Chief Adkins

Parents – Are you aware of the curfew for teen drivers under 18?

There are restrictions on the time when anyone under the age of 18 can be out driving. On Fridays and Saturdays, teens are allowed to drive until 11pm; and from Sunday through Thursday, it's 10pm.

There are exemptions: teens driving to or from religious functions, employment, or school activities are allowed to be out as long as they make no extra stops and head home immediately.

Many parents impose stricter curfews on their children during the school year and perhaps are more lenient during the summer months.

Curfew Laws in Illinois

The curfew laws are 11pm - 6am on weekdays (Sunday through Thursday) and midnight – 6am on weekends (Friday and Saturday) for anyone under the age of 17. For more information on driving laws, visit www.cyberdriveillinois.com

West Nile Virus remains a Concern in the Area

Please thoroughly inspect your property for items that may contain stagnant water. If it can hold water,

According to the Centers for Disease Control, every state has reported West Nile virus activity, with the exception of Alaska and Hawaii.

If infected with the virus, a person can develop a fever or mild headache. More severe infections are marked by a rapid onset of a high fever with head and body aches, disorientation, and tremors.

- Change your birdbath water weekly and eliminate containers that hold water, such as old pottery or tires. Stop the possibility of mosquitoes breeding on your property!
- Take personal protection measures to minimize mosquito bites including: using insect repellent, wearing loose fitting clothing and avoiding mosquito feeding times around dawn and dusk.

Sustainable Practices for Your Lawn

It's summer and most of us like to have a yard with a green full lawn. But did you know there are simple ways to incorporate green practices into your landscape routine.

Here are some environmentally friendly tips:

- Water your lawn responsibly.** Watering between 10:00 a.m. and 4:00 p.m. between May 15 and September 15 and on consecutive days is prohibited by Village Code. *New lawn installations are exempted from this requirement.*
- Irrigation Systems.** If you have an irrigation system, make sure it is WaterSense rated and consider installing a rain sensor to avoid watering after it has rained.
- Gas Powered Lawn Equipment.** Don't use gas powered equipment on ozone action days or use electric mowers and string trimmers. Set your mower to 3 inches high. Taller grass shades out weeds.



- Herbicides and Fertilizers.** Eliminate or minimize the use of fertilizers and herbicides. If you must use these products, read the directions to avoid these materials being washed off your lawn and into storm sewers which drain to streams, rivers, and lakes.



- Rain Gardens.** Consider reducing the amount of turf in your yard and installing a rain garden. There will be less lawn to mow and garden flowers attract pollinators like Monarch butterflies and bees.



Solicitors Going Door to Door

The law guarantees solicitors the right to solicit in the Village; however they must abide by the regulations. The Police Department screens all solicitor permit requests before a permit is issued.

Every year, especially during warm weather, the Northbrook Police Department receives calls from residents concerned about the number of solicitors going door to door.

Door to door solicitation permits fall into two categories:

- **Commercial:** Commercial permits are issued to solicitors that are selling goods and services door-to-door. This includes people hanging flyers on your doorknobs. Commercial solicitors should have a Village permit with their photo, the name of the company, and dates for which the permit is valid.

• Not for Profit or Charitable Groups:

This category includes religious and political groups that are asking for donations. By law, they do not need a permit to solicit, but they do need to prove to the Village that they are a charitable organization in good standing with the Attorney General's office. Those that contact the Police Department are issued a letter acknowledging their request to be in Northbrook and are advised as to the regulations set forth in our ordinance.

Permits are not required for all door-to-door solicitors

People who come to your door and do not ask you for any donations, such as political candidates or certain religious organizations, do not need any type of permit or acknowledgement from the Police Department.

Post a No Solicitors sticker on your door

"No Solicitors" signs/stickers can be obtained at local hardware stores, the Village Hall, and the Police Department or at home.

If you have a "No Solicitors" or similar notice on your property, a solicitor should not ring your doorbell or hang any type of flyer on your door handle, no matter under what category they fall.



Risk for Pets and Wildlife

Dogs, cats, and other domesticated animals, as well as wildlife, may be exposed to toxic rodenticide.

Sadly, these chemicals make the top-ten list of toxins responsible for pet poisonings, according to the American Society for the Prevention of Cruelty to Animals (ASPCA). The US EPA states that more than 100 pet deaths are reported each year from exposure to rodenticides.

Rodenticides are not only poisonous for rodents. Rodent baits can be lethal to any mammal or bird that ingests them or feeds on a poisoned rodent.

Controlling rodents with rodenticide baits puts pets at high risk of becoming ill or dying – either through direct ingestion (primary poisoning) or by eating poisoned rodents (secondary poisoning).

Safeguarding your home from mice and other rodents doesn't require the use of potentially hazardous poisons. Safe, effective, and affordable solutions can help you rodent-proof your home while ensuring the health of your pets. Visit www.saferodentcontrol.org for more information.

Where to get help

If you suspect that your pet has ingested a rodenticide or other poisons, the Animal Control Poison Center recommends first calling your local veterinarian or the ASPCA Animal Poison Control Center hotline at 888-426-4435.

What is Distracted Driving?

Distracted driving is any activity that diverts attention from safe driving, including talking or texting on your phone, eating and drinking, talking to people in your vehicle, paying for something with a credit card, or fiddling with the entertainment or navigation system. Texting is the most alarming distraction. Sending or reading a text takes your eyes off the road for five seconds. At 55 mph, that's like driving the length of an entire football field with your eyes closed.

You cannot drive safely unless the task of driving has your full attention. Any non-driving activity you engage in is a potential distraction and increases your risk of crashing.

Spoofing, Phishing & Frauds

Residents should be mindful of any solicitation or call asking for credit card or banking information. If you get a call from someone claiming to be from the IRS or telling you that you are going to be arrested, or asking you to pay a bill with a gift card, it's a scam.

Sometimes callers use Spoofing. "Spoofing" occurs when a caller deliberately falsifies the information transmitted to your caller ID display to disguise their identity. Spoofing is often used to trick someone into giving away valuable personal information so it can be used in fraudulent activity or sold illegally. Never give out personal information such as account numbers, Social Security numbers, mother's maiden names, passwords, or other identifying information in response to unexpected calls or if you are at all suspicious of the caller.

If you get an inquiry from someone who says they represent a company or a government agency, including the Village of Northbrook, seeking personal information, hang up and call the phone number on your account statement, in the phone book, or on the agency's official website to verify the authenticity of the request.

Here's how to report fraud, identity theft, or an unfair business practice:

Visit www.ftc.gov/complaint, click on the FTC Complaint Assistant icon. The more information you can provide about the situation, the more useful your complaint will be.

If you feel you are a victim of fraud, call the Northbrook Police at 847-564-2060 to make a report.

Bicycle Helmets Required for Children 16 and Under

In 2018, the Village passed an ordinance requiring the use of bicycle helmets by children under the age of 16 when riding a bicycle in public areas of the Village.

The purpose of the bicycle helmet law is to reduce the number of severe and fatal head injuries to children involved in bicycle crashes. Bicycle helmets, when used properly, reduce head injuries and fatalities. Studies show that helmets reduced overall head injuries by about 60 percent and reduced fatalities by about 73 percent.



Northbrook's helmet law is a significant way to increase helmet use, but as with all laws, its effectiveness is related to implementation. The practical effect of bicycle helmet laws is to encourage parents to require their children to use helmets (and educate parents to serve as role models and wear a helmet despite the lack of a law requiring adults to wear helmets). Most local bicycle shops will help you correctly size and fit your helmets.

Did you know?

Most bicyclist deaths occur in urban areas and at non-intersection locations according to the National Highways Traffic Safety Administration. Visit www.cdc.gov/headsup/helmets/

Properly Fitted Helmets Offer the Best Protection

All bicyclists, regardless of age, can help protect themselves by wearing properly fitted bicycle helmets every time they ride. Bicycle helmets meeting the American National Standards Institute (ANSI) or the American Society For Testing And Materials (ASTM) or the Snell Memorial Foundation, Inc., should be worn at all times when riding a bicycle, being carried on a bicycle, or transported in a bicycle trailer, on a street, alley, highway, sidewalk, or public path within the Village of Northbrook.

Insist on your child wearing a bike helmet at all times. Remember the concrete in your driveway is as hard as the concrete on major roads! Lastly, be a good role model – wear your helmet too!



Historian's Corner

presented by the Northbrook Historical Society

Northbrook's Sky Harbor Business Park was once an airport!

Last month the article in this space was about the Northbrook Garden adjacent to Sky Harbor Airport – this month's column takes to the skies.

Despite the Great Depression, which began four months after Sky Harbor Airport opened in July 1930, the sound of airplane motors was a familiar one to Northbrookians when the era of barnstormers, acrobatic stunts, and airplane races came to town and took the country by storm.

On June 11, 1930, attention was turned skyward when John and Kenneth Hunter took off from Sky Harbor Airport in their Stinson SM-1 Detroiter airplane aptly named "The City of Chicago" in an attempt to set a flight endurance record. To set the record, John and Kenneth shared flying and repair duties while their brothers Albert and Walter did the mid-air refueling and their sister Irene cooked the meals lowered in buckets to the pilots from the refueling plane.

Staying aloft from June 11 to July 4, 1930, the Hunter brothers set an endurance record by flying continuously for 23 days, one hour and 41 minutes (553 hours and 41 minutes) in the skies over Northbrook.

The flight came to an abrupt end when a broken oil pressure gauge spewed oil all over the cockpit. Unfortunately, their record was broken in July 1935 by the Key Brothers whose plane is part of the National Air and Space Museum – Smithsonian Institution's collection.
