## Participate in the 2020 Census

**The U.S. Census is required by the Constitution and is conducted for an accurate and fair count of all persons living in the United States.**

The U.S. has counted its population every 10 years since 1790. In addition to historical data, information from the Census is used to determine how dollars in federal and state funding is allocated to state and local governments. It also helps determine the number of seats each state will have in the U.S. House of Representatives, and is used to draw congressional and state legislative districts.

In March, every household will receive information about the 2020 Census with instructions on how to respond to a short questionnaire—online, by mail, or by phone. Please submit your information by April 1, 2020. By law, responses are confidential and will only be used for census data.

Please note the Census Bureau will never ask for bank account or Social Security numbers, money, or donations. If you don't respond, you can expect the Census Bureau to send someone to follow-up in person.

## Are You Registered to Vote in the Primary?

If you change your name or move, even within the Village, you must register to vote from the address where you are living or you can be turned away at the polling place. The Village Hall is open for voter registration from 8:30am to 4:30pm, Monday-Friday. You must display two pieces of identification. Neither needs to be a photo ID, but one must include your current address. ## Help the Environment:

### Pre-treat with Anti-Icing Liquid Salt

Road salt has adverse effects on the environment when it washes off roadways, seeps into the ground, and enters our waterways. The Village of Northbrook utilizes a beet juice/salt brine blend to pre-treat roads before a snowstorm, which reduces the amount of salt used on roadways.

#### Did you know that you as a resident can do the same at your home?

Instead of using salt to remove snow or ice from your driveway or sidewalk, consider making your own salt brine to pre-treat these surfaces. Pretreating can help you reduce your salt usage by up to 30%.

Applying a brine solution (water and rock salt) to your driveway, sidewalk, and/or steps before a winter storm will help create an area with less ice and snow and reduce the amount of salt you'll use. ## Phone Calls from "IRS" Impostors

Never engage or share information with someone who calls saying they are from the IRS.

In this scam, the IRS impostor calls the victim pretending to represent the IRS and claims that taxes are owed to the IRS. The impostor often demands immediate payment and threatens that the police will make an arrest if payment is not made.

Hang up and call the IRS directly at 800-829-1040 to see if you owe taxes. If you believe you have been the target of an IRS scam, notify the Federal Trade Commission Consumer Fraud Section at 877-382-4357.

With the advice and consent of the Village Board, I am pleased to welcome Daniel H. Pepoon to fill the Northbrook Village Board's trustee vacancy. Dan will be a great addition. His background and knowledge in finance and engineering, combined with his years of public service on two of our Village Commissions and a Task Force, will be welcomed to round out our team.

In last month's newsletter, I mentioned that the Board and staff will focus on three

major priorities this year: affordable housing, sustainability, and communications. Our Communication Plan guides staff with a policy driven approach outlining how, when, and where to provide stakeholders with information. Having various strategies to disseminate information is essential, especially for emergency communications, which will be addressed below.

We hope you'll appreciate our commitment in the coming months and years as we enhance communications in our Village. But our communication is more than just feeding information, the Village needs your involvement. The success of our efforts benefits you; and it also depends on you.

## A New Name and Look for our Newsletter

One noticeable initiative is the redesign of the Village newsletter. Starting next month, postal customers will receive a bi-monthly "magazine" style newsletter with a new look and a new name: *Northbrook Voice*. As a sustainable community, with just six issues (rather than our previous ten), we will not only save on postage, but paper as well, as we reach our over 18,500 postal customers. 

# 2020 Parkway Tree Order Form

## The Village is offering the cost sharing Parkway Tree Planting Program to residents again this year.

New trees will be 2-inch diameter or about 8-feet tall. A property owner's cost share will be \$175 per tree ordered, regardless of variety or size. Multiple trees may be ordered, providing there is adequate room within the public parkway area. Sorry, no trees may be ordered for private property.

The trees will be scheduled for planting throughout May, as weather permits.

### Limitations

Trees must be planted:

- Equidistant from curb and sidewalks, typically at least 35-feet from other parkway trees
- At least 10-feet from a driveway or street light
- At least 45-feet from an intersection to ensure unobstructed sight lines
- At least 5-feet from manholes, fire hydrants and b-boxes

Note: Trees cannot be planted in the same spot as a recently removed parkway tree due to old root mass.

Ten species of trees are currently available on a first come, first serve basis. All trees have limited quantities. Trees may be viewed at [www.northbrook.il.us/ParkwayTree](http://www.northbrook.il.us/ParkwayTree)

*Orders must be submitted by Thursday, March 5, 2020.*

### Please note:

- The Village makes the final determination on planting location.
- Orders are processed on a first come, first serve basis.
- Trees may not be refused, moved or exchanged for any reason.



## Taking Your Role in Northbrook's History: The 2020 Census

### People often forget that history is not just about the past; it is about today, tomorrow, and the future.

Every ten years we all get to participate in an exercise that provides a glimpse of our town to historians and genealogists in the future: The U.S. Census. The actual information you provide about you and your family this year will not be publicly released until 2092.

The most recent census information available for historians and genealogists to look at is from the 1940 Census. That is because the census information, other than for general demographic details, is not released for 72 years. The 1950 Census will be released in April 2022 which means most people living today will not find their names in a federal census.

The U.S. Census from past decades is one of the most valuable tools we use for research. For genealogical purposes, it provides the names and approximate ages of the children living in each household starting in 1850, when for the first time every person in the household is listed. In 1850 and 1860, the Agricultural Census gathered information about the size of someone's land, whether it was owned or rented, where the land was located, what kind

of crops they grew, what kind of farm animals they owned, and even if they were wealthy enough to own a watch or a piano. With this information, we use maps and other sources to track streets, subdivisions, and houses through multiple ownerships. It was the census data that confirmed that this was a predominately German town prior to 1900. Each time the census is taken, the questions asked are slightly different. In 1930, one of the questions was whether the family owned a radio.

In the early years, the census taker rode his horse from house to house. When he arrived to ask a few questions, he may not have written your name as you spelled it. He recorded it as he heard it. For example, the Census listed the Dehne family (pictured), for which Dehne Road is named, with multiple spelling through the years. In the 2020 Census you will fill in your own name making it easier for future family genealogists and historians to research.



Your participation will help your community today and future historians and family genealogists form a clearer picture of their hometown in 2020.
