

Yesterday is History - Today Becomes History Tomorrow

To fully value the history of a community, you should imagine it through the eyes of someone who lived at that time. Certainly, many of the items we use in our daily lives would seem like science fiction to the people who lived in the Village years ago.

In 1850, each landowner was required to physically work on the streets in their area of town as part of the tax they paid to the Township. Some of these dirt roads were paved in the early 1920s. Next time we joke about potholes, think back and imagine what it must have been like to share the road with horses and buggies, to drive a car for the first time on these smooth surfaces instead of bouncing along the dusty dirt roads. Today, our 130 centerline miles of pavement are maintained, plowed, and repaired by the Public Works Department.

White holiday lights illuminate the night sky in downtown Northbrook. Imagine what it was like when these same streets were illuminated only by gas lights, lit

every night by the lamplighter. Then, think about gazing in wonder when an electric streetlight replaced one of the gas lights after electricity came to town in 1909.

We take the ability to communicate and gather information for granted, but that was not so for decades of residents in the past. The first telephone wires were laid throughout town in 1902. If you had a phone in your house, you probably shared the line with one or more families. A switchboard operator connected your call. When the Village purchased their first computers in 1984, they were connected with wires to a mainframe that filled an entire room.

Now, we can get news, take photos, play games, or talk to family and friends across the globe over the phone or virtually as we walk outdoors - all this on a device that fits into our pocket. By stepping back and considering what was going on at the time, or by contrasting today with the past, you can better understand and appreciate how fortunate we are today.

Thinking back makes you appreciate what we have now because of what was new decades ago.

Converting the Power of the Sun into Savings

Since 2016, permits for roof mounted solar panels on single-family homes in Northbrook have increased from one permit to a total of 85 as of 2020.

"Getting a permit approved for a solar array is typically a simple process and accomplished very quickly, but not everyone has the funding or opportunity to install such a system," explained Jackie Clawson, Northbrook's Building Official. "Perhaps large trees shade your home, you rent your home or business, or you live in a multi-unit development."

The good news is that there is now a way to be a part of the solar community without installing panels on your property!

Community Solar is on the horizon.

A community solar project is a single site solar installation shared

by multiple subscribers. Community solar projects generate electricity, and that power is delivered into the electric grid of the utility. As a subscriber, participants will see a discount on their electricity bill.

While many residents and businesses value sustainability and "going green," saving money while doing so is a benefit.

"It's a win-win for the community and the environment," said Go Green

Northbrook Board President Sarah Sanford. "If you can't accommodate solar panels on your home or business, or the upfront costs of installing

solar panels are a concern, then participating in Community Solar is an alternate way to 'go green' and support a local solar project. It's also an easy way to share the benefits of renewable energy... from the sun!"

Residents and small businesses in Northbrook, along with other participating communities in the North Shore, can take advantage of the opportunity to help develop a shared renewable energy resource that reduces dependence on fossil fuels and supports clean carbon-free electricity. This is possible by becoming an mc2 Community Solar subscriber. Subscribers receive credits on their ComEd bill (saving up to 20%) and support the development of new renewable energy resources. Participating in Community Solar does not have upfront costs, will not lock you into a long-term contract, and will provide savings once the subscriber is enrolled.

Long-time Northbrook resident John Cruickshank (father of four-time speed skating Olympian David Cruikshank) signed up for the waitlist, noting, "We all need to gradually dispense with relying on oil. Over a period of time, we can all do more. It's important to make a contribution to make a difference by using alternate power sources, such as solar."

Make the Most of a Brand New Year

Not everything that happened in 2020 was bad.

The black aluminum front screen door, battered and completely wrong for our 110-year old farmhouse? The one I nevertheless walked through for 20 years? After looking around for a replacement and finding nothing suitable, I took what was for me a dramatic step: unscrewed the thing and just threw it away.

"There are no new beginnings," the poet Kae Tempest says. "Until everybody sees that the old ways need to end."

Welcome to 2021. It's a safe bet that this year will be better than the last—on a grand scale. But what about your life? What are you going to do to better yourself? A single digit changing on the calendar can be powerful inspiration.

"It's very motivating for a lot of people," said Marilyn Fettner, a Northbrook life coach. "It's a fresh start, especially this year. Midway through the year, people were saying, 'I just want 2020 to be over.' It's been such a difficult year. People want a clean slate, mentally, an opportunity to say, 'Okay, here are the things I've been wanting to do.'"

What do you want to do? Often, resolutions have to do with getting in shape. In January, Northbrook welcomes the Techny Prairie Activity Center, a 44,000 square foot exercise mecca.

Improving one area of life tends to improve others.

"This will be more than just a building," said Northbrook Park District Executive Director Molly Hamer.

"People will find friendships here. That's one of the things that happens when you go to a place on a regular basis, to work out or play or drop your kids off to basketball—friendships will be made."

You can improve your life without leaving home. Many Northbrook residents are, like me, sprucing up their places.

"Definitely," said Leo Murillo, manager at J.C. Licht, 1340 Meadow. "Now that people are staying at home, they want to fix the house up a little bit."

I found a classic wooden, made-in-Wisconsin storm door and spent almost two weeks staining it then administering three coats of marine spar varnish. Worth. Every. Second. Now I feel like some TV fix-it-up show flannel-clad master craftsman every time I walk in the house.

Don't assume that resolutions need be only about yourself: your house, your weight, your hopes. You can also resolve to help other people.

"Look at the environment around you," said Mary Hansen, Baha'i representative to the Northbrook

Clergy Association. "Ask, 'what would make this work better? How can I live a life that shows I do care about other people?'"

Finally: figure out not only what you want, but why you want it.

"I work with people all the time on goals," said Lauren Schifferdecker, owner of Inspire Counseling Center in Northbrook. "One key is connecting your head and your heart. To lose 10 pounds, get a promotion, be better parents. That's what your head wants. But what your heart wants is something we overlook a lot. 'I want to lose 5 pounds, but what I really want is some attention. I want someone to notice me.' You can go straight to your heart's goal while you are going for your head's goal. If you can pair them together, it's a lot more fun, a lot more satisfying, when you are aware of what you really deeply want. Connecting your head and your heart is such a powerful thing."

2021 SPRING PARKWAY TREE PLANTING PROGRAM

The Village of Northbrook is pleased to offer again to residents an opportunity to participate in planting a tree on the parkway in front of their home.

The Village works with the Suburban Tree Consortium to purchase landscape sized trees in various species that will be a great addition to your property. Some of the benefits that you will receive when planting a tree are:

- Improved energy costs because trees provide shade and cool your home
- Improved air quality because trees filter air pollution
- Better sound quality around your home because trees buffer noise
- Increased property values by 12-20%
- Increased psychological benefits (trees make us feel better!)

The Village will provide and install the tree on your parkway after you discuss what tree you may want with the Village Forester. The cost share is \$175, which is a fraction of the retail price for a full planted landscape tree. The Parkway Tree Planting Program is an excellent value for Northbrook residents!

Winter Reminders



Snow Clearing Operations: Dos & Don'ts

Do -

1. Be mindful when shoveling or snow blowing your driveway. Safety is the number one priority, so stay aware of your surroundings and avoid stepping into the street during plowing operations.
2. Keep an eye on children. Remind them to stay away from the street and parkways during a snowstorm and plowing operations.
3. Be patient.

Don't -

1. Don't place trash and recycling bins in the street. Public Works cannot clear the road from curb to curb if there is an obstruction.
2. Don't park your vehicle on the street when plows are out.
 - When 2 or more inches of snow fall, it is illegal to park on Northbrook streets until plowing is complete. Offending vehicles may be ticketed and towed. The Village will use its Northbrook Notify system to alert residents via text and email when the parking ban is in effect and when it has cleared. Sign up at northbrook.il.us/northbrooknotify.
 - Having to drive around a car parked in the street is not only a hazard for the plow driver, but it can also create an unplowed curb line stretching up to 45', as the plow needs some distance to maneuver around the vehicle.
 - Since clearing from curb to curb is the goal, it is essential to have parked vehicles moved off the street until plowing operations are complete. A curb-to-curb clearance enables melting snow to find its way to the drains and inlets.

Prevent Frozen Pipes

When temperatures drop below freezing, unprotected pipes can freeze and burst. To prevent damage to your pipes, try these tips: insulate your pipes properly; periodically open your bathroom and kitchen cabinets to keep warm air circulating around the plumbing; keep your thermostat setting consistent, and leave heat on when you're away; seal off crawl spaces, cracks, and openings, especially around pipes; and let faucets drip during particularly cold weather.

Clear the Snow Around Fire Hydrants

In case of an emergency, every second counts! Work with neighbors to keep the fire hydrants on or near your property clear of snow. In addition to removing snow and debris covering the hydrant, try to clear a 3-foot area around the hydrant for easier access.


Keep Vents Clear

Clear outside furnace, stove, fireplace, and gas dryer vents of snow and other debris to prevent carbon monoxide poisoning. Have your furnace, heating system, and chimney serviced each year by a qualified professional to prevent fires.

Shovel a Snow Pocket

When clearing snow from your driveway, shovel snow in the direction of traffic and try to make a pocket on the opposite side of the driveway. By doing so, snow plowed by our trucks will be dumped into that pocket and less snow will end up in your driveway.



Living with Wildlife in Northbrook - Coyotes

Coyotes are part of the natural wildlife that surrounds our community. Generally, coyotes are non-aggressive and spend the vast majority of time in the forest preserves. Property Tax Levy

On December 8, 2020, the Village Board approved an ordinance establishing the Village's 2020 property tax levy. The approved levy is \$21,865,790, roughly a \$17,000 decrease from 2019.

What are property taxes?

A property tax is levied on all real property in Northbrook. Several entities including the Village, Park District, Library, and elementary and high school districts receive a portion of the property tax. Property taxes are payable in two installments, one in March and one in September. While the Cook County Assessor's Office determines a property assessment for taxing purposes, the Cook County Treasurer collects the property tax.

What is the Illinois Truth in Taxation law?

The Illinois Truth in Taxation law requires a taxing body to calculate its estimated levy increase at least 20 days prior to adoption. If the calculated increase is expected to exceed 105% of the previous year's levy, the taxing body is required to publish specific notices and conduct a public hearing prior to adoption of the levy Ordinance. This year, the Village's levy does not exceed 105% of last year's levy.

How will this affect my tax bill?

As a result of this 2020 property tax levy, the average home in Northbrook will see virtually no change to the Village's portion of their property tax bill.

How much of my property taxes go to the Village?

For a common 2019 property tax bill in Northbrook, 10% goes to the Village of Northbrook. Depending on the school district, 64% goes to the elementary and high schools. Cook County and the Northbrook Park District both receive about 6% while the Metropolitan Water Reclamation District receives 5% and the Northbrook Library receives 4%. The remaining 5% goes to Oakton Community College and other jurisdictions including the North West Mosquito Abatement District, Cook County Forest Preserve District, and Northfield Township.
