Our Sustainable Natural Resources

The natural features shaping our community are the glacial deposits that formed three Moraines, our clay-filled soil, the West and Middle Forks of the North Branch of the Chicago River and their tributaries, and a few remaining natural resources. They are all reminders of the land as it looked when the first settlers arrived. Now, highways, automobiles, subdivisions, and our beautiful tree canopy fill the Northbrook vista. Yet, you can take a step back in time and see them all by closing your eyes and visualizing a drive on Dundee Road from the western border of our Village to its eastern border.

Traveling eastward from Sanders Road, the road gently rises to the crest of the Park Ridge Moraine. Then, the road gradually falls to the valley of the river that gave our Village its name. Ahead, you see a rise to the ridge of the Deerfield Moraine at Waukegan Road. As you travel eastward, the road gently falls again to Lee Road and the valley of the Middle Fork of the North Branch of the Chicago River. The road slightly rises again toward the Blodgett Moraine near Skokie Boulevard.

In 1840, the first survey of what became Northbrook noted open prairies with few trees. The original natural resources you pass hint at what the area looked like when it opened for settlement.

To the north, on the first rise was a large grove of oak and hickory trees that stretched from Dundee Road to Commercial Avenue and from Sanders Road to just east of Our Lady of the Brook Church. We can say with certainty that this grove was used by indigenous people of the region. Recollections of the children whose father first tilled the land in the 1920s tell us that where the church now stands was strewn with buried arrowheads of many sizes and shapes. Vestiges of the majestic hickories, Bebb oaks, and other varieties of oaks that grew in the grove and other locations are still seen across town. One of these trees is at the entrance to the Charlemagne Subdivision. You can also see some of these majestic trees at other places in the Village, like in Village Green Park. The Bebb oak was named the "Official Northbrook Tree" on January 11, 2000, and the oldest tree in the Village is a Bebb oak located on Sunset Lane.

Between the Northbrook Post Office and the West Fork of the North Branch of the Chicago River is the recently cleared land being returned to its prairie beginnings. A pristine portion of this prairie has always remained. Can you imagine standing at the edge

of this land and looking to the north, south, and west and seeing only this open vast prairie landscape?

To the east of Waukegan Road are wooded areas that were sold off in small lots for the early settlers. They harvested the trees to build their homes, for cooking, and for fuel to keep them warm during the cold, long winter months. Most of the smaller trees you see in these areas today were not there when the land was first sold or when it was bought in the 1920s by the Cook County Forest Preserve.

One hundred and eighty years after the land was first surveyed, a portion of the ecological balance remains. The fact that some of these trees and prairies still exist is the definition of sustainability and should be celebrated.

The Raos & The Stashes

How to "Go Green" at Home

Aside from living in Northbrook, the Rao and Stash families have something big in common: they both "go green" for a better future. And now, they also share the title of Northbrook's Green Residents of 2020!

"We are honored to be recognized for our green home and everyday actions we take to protect the environment," said the Stashes. "'Going green' is one thing we do to care for our shared environment and communities today, for a better tomorrow."

This same sentiment is echoed in the Rao household, where Hari and Seshu reduce, reuse, and recycle everything they can. "It has become a routine," said the Raos, who practice sustainability to benefit the next generation and generations to come.

A defining feature of the Rao's and Stash's success with sustainability



Though it's not just the improvements in the home itself that make these residents "green," it's also the behaviors of the people who live there.

The Raos collect styrofoam, lightbulbs, plastic bags, batteries, electronics, scrap metal, and items left by others at the curb for safe recycling and disposal. They donate clothes, coats, and eyeglasses to be reused and to help someone in need. To prevent contamination in our landfills, the Raos also recycle their prescription medicines and the bottles, separately. They limit their use of paper at home by using cloth towels only and writing on scrap paper.

"I want to serve the Earth," said Seshu, who noted that she even washes and reuses Ziploc bags.

Outside of their environmentally friendly abode, the Stashes can be seen participating in Village clean up days, driving an electric car, and tending to their landscape of all-native plantings and organic garden, which they hydrate with water from their rain barrel and fertilize with their own compost. The Stash family leads (or shall we say 'LEEDs') by example, as they even planned tours of their spectacular home for students in Northbrook to learn about sustainability.

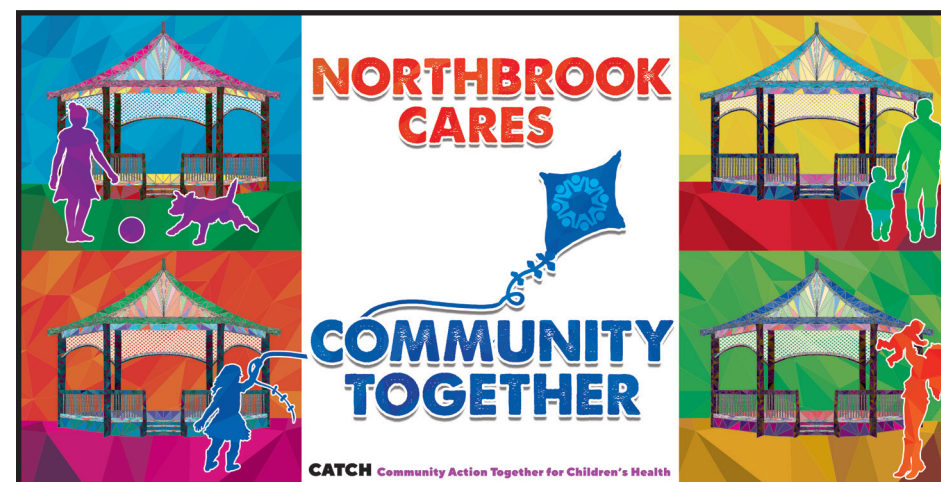
CATCH: Community Action Together for Children's Health

A Timeline of Northbrook's Climate Action Plan



1. What is a climate action plan?

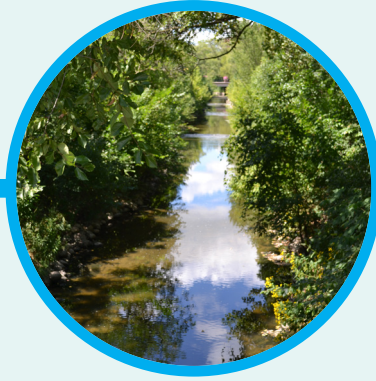
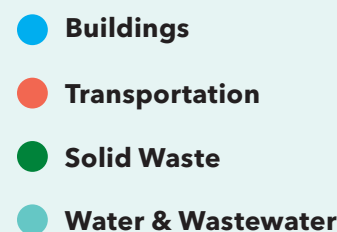
As we face unprecedented changes to our region's climate and environmental conditions, the Village of Northbrook is at the forefront of creating a plan that details commitments to enhancing efficiency and sustainability. The plan will serve as a customized roadmap for making informed decisions on how to achieve the largest and most cost-effective reductions in greenhouse gas emissions that align with Northbrook's goals for future community development.



2. Environmental Consulting

In Northbrook, this process started with the Board of Trustees directing the Department of Development and Planning Services to oversee the selection of an environmental consultant in early 2020. The Village ultimately hired paleBLUe dot LLC and began collaborating to make baseline assessments. These reports describe inventories of current community-wide emission rates, Northbrook's overall ecological footprint, and future projections identifying local vulnerabilities to climate change.

This chart shows Northbrook's total greenhouse gas emissions for 2018:



3. Resident Feedback

At the same time, the Village invited Northbrook residents to participate in the Community Input Listening Sessions and survey to gain insight on priorities for perceived issues of environmental quality. In total, Northbrook received one of the highest response rates the consultant had seen. Upon review, the same climate conditions that scientists project to be a problem in Northbrook are what residents seem to be most worried about, such as air quality, extreme heat, and flooding.



4. Community Participation

Currently, the Climate Action Planning Team (CAPT), made up of a diverse group of community stakeholders, is meeting in a virtual setting each month to determine specific actions. The team first came to a consensus that Northbrook's emissions reduction goal should support the Paris Agreement to cap temperature rise to 2 degrees Celsius. This involves a 25-55% reduction in greenhouse gas emissions below Northbrook's baseline 2018 levels by 2030 and 80% below 2018 levels by 2040. To achieve this, the team is honing in on feasible strategies in subcategories that encompass many aspects of sustainability.



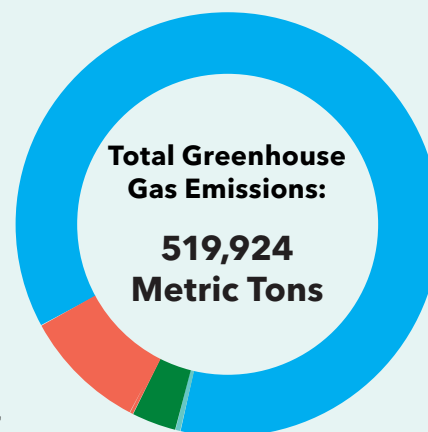
5. Improvements

The subcategories identified by the CAPT are transportation and land use; waste management; local food systems; buildings and energy; climate health and safety; water and wastewater; greenspace and tree canopy; and climate economy. Examples of possible actions the team may agree to include in the Climate Action Plan are improving bike and pedestrian safety, incentivizing building improvements, limiting plastic use, and increasing tree plantings in the Village.



6. The Future

The end-product will consist of an implementation schedule that identifies the required resources and funding mechanisms for each long-term goal. The Village is formalizing initiatives in the Climate Action Plan, but we will need each resident, business, and municipal entity in Northbrook to reinforce these goals with active participation in these climate programs.

Celebrate Earth & Arbor Day in your Garden

Earth Day • Thursday, April 22
Arbor Day • Friday, April 30

America celebrated Arbor Day for the first time in April of 1872 to recognize the value of trees, with an estimated one million planted on the original holiday. The first Earth Day occurred on April 22 in 1970 when 20 million Americans took to the streets in favor of environmental reform, which spurred the enactment of the Environmental Protection Agency. While climate change may feel like an abstract problem out of our control, Earth and Arbor Day serve as reminders that we can make informed decisions that have large benefits to our community's ecosystem health.

Native Plant Identification Guide

Although the Village will not be hosting its traditional Earth & Arbor Day Celebration this year, there are still things you can do in your own backyard!

Incorporate native plants into your outdoor spaces as a simple but meaningful gesture for the environment. Plants indigenous to this region are a source of food and shelter to a diverse array of animals. There are already many pollinator-friendly gardens in Northbrook, from Village Hall to Public Works to dozens of residential gardens. You may have noticed neighbors posting garden signs with the affirming message to "Make Northbrook a Monarch Waystation." These plaques are provided by the Village, free to residents who demonstrate a commitment to protecting the endangered Monarch butterfly through planting milkweed (the Monarch's exclusive host plant) and gardening without pesticides. As we continue to dedicate more space to native landscaping, Northbrook grows in functionality as a corridor for wildlife.

Use the guide to the right to learn more about which native plants may suit your outdoor space best! >>>

Native plants have benefits to our local climate beyond their provisions for wildlife. In Northbrook, we are privileged to live at the intersection of three vital ecosystem types: prairies, woodlands, and wetlands. Native prairie plants survive by growing deep roots that improve carbon storage and soil quality. Native wetland plants are adapted to frequent flooding. They improve water drainage and filtration of their surrounding environment resulting in less polluted water running off into streams and waterways during major rain events. Gardens that seek to maximize drainage using native plants and smart landscaping are called rain gardens. Blue flag iris and wild columbine, listed on the right, are examples of native wetland plants known to absorb water efficiently and are often utilized in rain gardens.

Tip: Residents that qualify for the Village's cost-sharing stormwater improvement program may have partial costs of rain garden installation offset. Learn more at northbrook.il.us/sustainability or contact the Public Works Department at 847-272-4711.

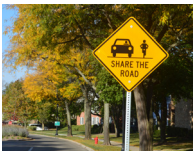

Voting Facts & Information



The Village often receives questions about meetings and events conducted by the Northbrook Caucus. The Northbrook Caucus is an independent political organization that recruits, vets, and fields slates of candidates for local public office in the Village. The Caucus is not a part of, or affiliated with, the Village of Northbrook and is not the only way to be nominated for a Village elected office. Information on how to run for local offices can be found on the Cook County Clerk's website at cookcountyclerkil.gov/elections

The Cook County Clerk's office is the chief election authority for more than 120 towns and villages in suburban Cook County, including Northbrook. Elections are not under the jurisdiction of the Village of Northbrook. The Clerk's Office is responsible for administering elections in the County, which entails voter registration, election judge recruitment and training, early voting, polling place identification, election security, and mapping and management. **The next election is the April 6, 2021, Consolidated General Election.**

Village, city, and township clerks and deputy registrars may register eligible suburban Cook County residents in person. Voter registration is available at Village Hall. The deadline for in-person registration and registration by mail is March 9. Cook County encourages voters to register online. The deadline to register online is March 21. Voters may also register and vote at an Early Voting site until the Monday before an election or on Election Day – only at their assigned precinct.

Early Voting

Northbrook Village Hall is an Early Voting site, as designated by the Cook County Clerk. Voting at Village Hall is staffed and run by the Cook County Clerk's Office. Early Voting is taking place at Village Hall from March 22 through April 5.

Voting by Mail

Any registered Cook County voter may request a mail ballot from the Cook County Clerk's Office. April 1 is the final day that voters can request a mail ballot, and ballots must be postmarked by Election Day. Village staff members are not authorized to accept ballots. Election Day

Election Day is April 6. On Election Day, voters must vote at their precinct's voting location. Some locations of the voting precincts for Election Day have changed – Northbrook Village Hall is not an Election Day polling place for this election.

Prescribed Burn Program to Begin in Spring

In late March or early April, the Village and Northbrook Park District will both conduct prescribed burns of native landscapes throughout the community, weather permitting. These low-intensity burns enhance soil quality, help germinate desirable native plants, eliminate invasive species, and support pollinator species dependent on native landscapes for food and shelter. All impacted residents will be notified by postcard prior to the burns beginning.

In April, the Village and Park District will begin releasing a series of programming materials on native landscapes, prescribed burns, and how you can help pollinator species. You can get updates on the 2021 burn schedule and access the upcoming programming at northbrook.il.us/burns. The joint prescribed burn program and programming materials are supported by generous grant funding from ComEd and Openlands.

Weekly Landscape Waste & Compost Pickup Resumes

From April 1-November 30, Advanced Disposal will resume weekly landscape waste and compost pickup. Stickers are \$2.08 each and can be purchased at Ace Hardware (1941 Cherry Lane), Jewel (2775 Pfingsten Road), Red's Garden Center (3460 Dundee Road), and Village Hall.
