Anniversaries, Memories, and Changes

Today we are going to look back on some anniversaries that will be celebrated this year to illustrate changes that some of you may not be aware of. Do you ever hear people say "the town has changed, it isn't like I remember it"? We hear that all the time at the Historical Society. It is true; Northbrook has changed from what it was in your memories. Change is inevitable, even though it is the same place, in different decades, with different memories.

Milestone anniversaries to note this year and changes through the decades:

1901 – The Village of Shermerville was incorporated and in 1923 changed its name to Northbrook.

1911 – School District 28 purchased a 1 1/2 acre site on Kiest Avenue at Waukegan Road for the Shermerville School. That four-room brick school with old and new additions is now Crestwood Place.

1926 – The Cook County Forest Preserve bought some of the Werhane farm on Dundee Road for use as Somme Woods. A 1938 aerial map of the property shows fewer trees on the property west of Waukegan Road than are there today, even after the recent clearing. Also in 1926, an ordinance passed to eliminate all outhouses in the Village within six months.

1951 – The bond issue for a public library passed by 6 votes: 135 yes, 129 no. The library was at the corner of Church Street and Shermer Road before moving to its present location.

1956 – The bond to build the Cherry Lane underpass was approved by voters. This was a controversial proposal that passed by a small majority. Can you imagine life without the underpass?

1961 – Sunset Foods opened in Northbrook. Originally located in the space next to where Marcello's is now, the store expanded along the entire side of the center and into the site of the Three Bags Full Knitting Studio before moving across the street to their present location. Also in 1961, Meadowhill Pool opened.

1971 – The Fire Station on Dundee Road was built. It replaced the Fire Station in the Civic Building now home to the Northbrook Chamber of Commerce. Also in 1971, The Book Bin opened. It has changed owners several times and is not in its original location.

1976 – When Northbrook Court opened it was anchored by Neiman Marcus, Lord & Taylor, I Magnin, and Sears. Also in 1976, the Northfield Inn

reopened its doors at its new location on July 4th for the first time as the Northbrook History Museum.

1996 – On June 11, 1986, Ferris Bueller's Day Off opened in movie theaters, making our water tower famous. By the time the movie was released the water tower had already been repainted.

2011 – Historian's Corner began with a column in the Village newsletter ten times per year until 2020 when the format was changed and the newsletter published six yearly editions.

2021 – The Village celebrates its 120th birthday on November 18.

It hardly seems possible that 20 years ago this month the Village neared the halfway point of its Centennial celebration, and that it's been ten years since this column first appeared in the Village's newsletter. Time goes by too fast.

North Suburban Legal Aid Clinic

The North Suburban Legal Aid Clinic's mission is to provide accessible, quality pro-bono legal services in the areas of immigration, domestic violence, and housing to give those in need of access to justice the opportunity to live productive and secure lives.

Resources

For more than five years, the North Suburban Legal Aid Clinic (the "Clinic") has been a beacon of hope for those in need. The Clinic is proud to have been able to provide trusted, accessible, and free legal services without interruption through the pandemic and will continue to be available to individuals and families going forward.

- **Domestic Violence** - The Clinic represents survivors of domestic violence in civil order of protection and family law cases that involve domestic violence. Services offered include but are not limited to pro-bono legal representation in domestic violence and family law courts, safety planning, legal strategizing, and direct help for other social service needs of each client.
- **Housing** - The Clinic provides legal assistance and educational information related to evictions, landlord-tenant disputes, conditions/repairs, breaking a lease, rental assistance, illegal lockouts, security deposits, determination from subsidy, and reasonable accommodations.
- **Immigration** - The Clinic provides full-service immigration intakes to determine eligibility for forms of immigration relief, such as DACA, VAWA, U Visa, asylum, family-based immigration, or any other form of relief.

Partnerships

The Clinic partners with not-for-profit and private organizations, municipalities, places of worship, schools, businesses, and community leaders to raise awareness, provide educational opportunities, and create meaningful change in the lives of those in need. Presentations include but are not limited to Know Your Rights, DACA, How to Be an Ally, and updates to policy and law. Clinics and presentations will be virtual until further notice in an effort to safely serve individuals and families during the pandemic. Support Northbrook Restaurants & Win - Gift Card Giveaway

In October 2020, the State implemented new COVID-19 resurgence mitigations that temporarily halted indoor dining. Following this announcement, the Village began its first-ever gift card giveaway promotion in November 2020 to support local restaurants.

This giveaway, which ended in March of this year, encouraged diners in Northbrook (and outside Northbrook) to continue patronizing restaurants through takeout, delivery, drive-thru, and later on, in-person dining. After spending \$25 or more at a Northbrook restaurant, participants were asked to send in their receipts to be entered into a weekly drawing for a \$50 gift card from the Northbrook restaurant of their choice.

In total, the Village gave away 185 gift cards to Northbrook restaurants!

Although the giveaway has ended, the sense of community togetherness and support has not. Dining local strengthens Northbrook in more ways than one, and never underestimate the simple joy of a good meal!



FY 2021/2022 Annual Budget

The budget for fiscal year 2021/2022, which begins on May 1, 2021, was adopted by the Village Board of Trustees on April 13, 2021. The General Fund, which provides for the core public service operations of the Village including Police, Fire, Public Works, IT, Code Enforcement, Planning, and Economic Development, represents approximately half of the Village's total budget. This budget includes many of the Village Board's initiatives established in the past year.

Environmental Sustainability

The FY 2021/2022 budget includes funding and staffing to facilitate the initial work contemplated in the Climate Action Study and Plan. The budget includes hiring a full-time sustainability position, continued funding for the part-time GRC Sustainability Fellow program, and funding for initial initiatives of the Climate Action Planning Team. The Village Board has also expressed interest in additional parkway tree plantings throughout the Village. The adopted budget includes increased funding for the Village's 50/50 parkway tree program that provides for approximately 500 trees.

Downtown and Bike/Pedestrian Improvements

In FY 2019/2020, consultant studies were completed to improve pedestrian and bicycle access to the Northbrook Metra Station, pedestrian and vehicular safety issues on Cedar Lane, and streetscape in Downtown Northbrook. The FY 2021/2022 budget includes funds to begin implementing the streetscape recommendations and funding for the following bike/pedestrian improvements: Skokie Valley Trail construction, Shermer Road sidepath design, Kingston Bicycle Boulevard construction, Sutton Bicycle Boulevard construction, Sanders/Dundee improvement, and additional roadway and intersection markings.

Other

The adopted budget includes funding for Village-sponsored events, contingent on the State's COVID-19 mitigation restrictions. As endorsed by the Board, this budget also includes funds to start the process of conducting department organizational assessments. In mid-2020, the Village conducted a vulnerability and security audit at Village Hall and the Public Works Center. Based on the recommendations of this study, security and corresponding IT requirements have been included in the FY 2021/2022 budget.

Vehicle Stickers & Pet Tags

All motor vehicles registered to a Northbrook residential or business address are required to have a Village vehicle sticker. Also, pet tags are required for all cats and dogs six months and older. Renewal notices for vehicle stickers and pet tags are mailed at the end of May.

Sales begin June 1 with the Village's online payment system, by mail, or via our postage free dropboxes. Sales begin in-person at Village Hall on June 7. Stickers are \$30, \$15 for seniors, and will be mailed after June 1. Note that we will not be able to accommodate specific or low number requests.

Residents and businesses who donate \$20+ will receive a vehicle sticker featuring artwork from CATCH'S "Northbrook Cares, Community Together" initiative, promoting community connection.

Stickers and pet tags must be purchased and displayed by September 1. Visit northbrook.il.us/vehicle for more information.
