







Head over to Northbrook Court's northeast parking lot (near Neiman Marcus) on Sunday, November 7, from noon to 3pm.

Residents have the option to drive through and drop off pumpkins with a volunteer or to park and participate in a pumpkin "smash!" See how far you can toss your pumpkin to hit one of the targets inside the dumpster.

Any candles or decorations (plastic, metal, etc.) must be removed from your pumpkin - painted pumpkins are allowed.

Sustainability Displays: Park your car and get a closer look at how worms break down organic materials into compost! The Village's Sustainability Coordinator will be running this very special show-and-tell.

The Metropolitan Water Reclamation District will be passing out coloring books and free compost.



Northbrook Resident Advocates for Mental Health Awareness for Youth



When Northbrook resident Donna Sabin was growing up, mental health was not something commonly discussed. After recognizing and facing her own personal struggles, Donna realized that something needed to be done to end the stigma around mental illness, especially for children and young adults - this was her calling.

Donna grew up in Northbrook and returned with her husband eight years ago to raise their two kids.

Since then, she has become involved with Northbrook organization Community Action Together for Children's Health, or CATCH, and local organization Paws for Patrick, where she co-chairs their wish granting program. CATCH is dedicated to providing families with support and resources for the mental health and emotional wellness of their children. Paws for Patrick connects young people with emotional support animals to aide them as they live with mental illness.

Working with these two organizations has been a saving grace for Donna. The work gives her a larger purpose: changing and saving lives through support and awareness.

"Ending the stigma of mental illness is no easy task, but together we can make Northbrook a place where it is safe to ask for help."

In May, Donna helped "turn Northbrook green" with Paws for Patrick's green ribbon campaign. Her on-the-ground work provided hundreds of Northbrook residents with green ribbons to tie on their trees in support of mental health awareness.

Most recently, Donna spearheaded an initiative with CATCH to get Mental Health Coping Kits into the hands of graduating seniors at Glenbrook North. The kits are filled with items designed to relieve stress and provide support. With funding from the Village of Northbrook and the Glenbrook Foundation, they were able to expand their efforts and provide 2,100 kits for all classes at Glenbrook North!

"Asking for help may be the toughest thing our kids have to do," said Donna. So, she has made it her mission to show the children and young adults of today that it is **okay to not be okay**.

The Village of Northbrook commits to helping promote the core American value that no one should be targeted because of their race, color, ethnicity, ancestry, national origin, religion, age, sex, sexual orientation, gender identity or expression, marital and/or familial status, language, mental and/or physical impairment and/or disability, military status, economic class, immigration status, or any of the other characteristics that are often used to divide people.

Youth Services of Glenview/Northbrook

Youth Services has been a pillar in the Glenview and Northbrook communities for nearly 50 years. The agency has grown and evolved to meet the needs of the community and today serves as a pillar for hundreds of families in the local community - and beyond.

Focused on the mental health and social and emotional support needs of children and youth, the agency is a safe place for every family and stands by a promise to never turn any child away based on ability to pay, which makes their scholarship program one of the most generous and accessible in the northern suburbs. In addition to individual and group counseling, the agency also offers early intervention, prevention, education, support, gender and sexual identity support, health education, and crisis response.

In recent years, the agency's safety assessments partnership with GBN has been a critical piece of their crisis response program. Through this program, the agency is able to provide on-site safety assessments for students exhibiting at-risk behaviors or potential suicidal ideation.

The agency is grounded in an activity-based model to engage with children and their improved mental health. In addition to our generous sliding scale scholarship program and programming for under-served families and communities, Youth Services' highly skilled clinicians accept insurance from a variety of providers.

The last few years have seen a critical rise in the demand for support, which was only exacerbated by the COVID-19 pandemic. A serious spike in intake calls coupled with impacted fundraising has made the agency's resilience and the community's incredible support more important than ever!

Winter Weather Dos & Don'ts

Each winter, the Village's Public Works Department works around the clock to clear 539 plow lane miles of Village owned and maintained streets, municipal parking lots, and designated sidewalks. Here are some ways you can help operations run smoothly and safely!



Do:

Be a good neighbor and shovel the sidewalk in front of your home.

While there is no municipal ordinance requiring that an individual shovel their sidewalk, we encourage residents to pitch in and help their neighbors, especially the elderly and those with disabilities. While shoveling or snow blowing, Public Works asks that you be mindful of your surroundings and proximity to the street when plowing is taking place. Similarly, keep an eye on children when plows are out.

Clear the fire hydrants near your property of snow and ice.

Help our first responders and protect yourself and your neighbors by shoveling a path from the street and three feet around the hydrant. In the event of an emergency, this can save lives.

Shovel a snow pocket at the end of your driveway.

You can help keep your driveway clear by shoveling snow downstream of roadway traffic. Make a pocket on the opposite side of your driveway so snow that is plowed from the street will be pushed into the pocket.

Don't:

Don't park your vehicle on the street when the plows are out.

When 2 or more inches of snow fall, it is illegal to park on Northbrook streets until plowing is complete. Offending vehicles may be ticketed and towed. The Village will use its Northbrook Notify system to alert residents when the parking ban is in effect and when it has cleared. Sign up for notifications at northbrook.il.us/northbrooknotify.

Don't put trash and recycling bins in the street.

When clearing your driveway, also clear out an area in the parkway for your bins. These containers are difficult to plow around and could be struck by plows or other vehicles.

Don't put snow in the street when clearing your driveway and sidewalk.

If you have a plowing service, please direct them to keep snow on your property instead of pushing it across the street. The Village's municipal code prohibits placing snow on the roadway, as this requires more time to clear and creates a dangerous hazard for motorists, cyclists, and pedestrians.

Northbrook Artists Studio Tour, 2021



Masks will be required for both artists and visitors regardless of vaccination status.




Leave the Leaves

While cleaning up your yard
this season, consider leaving
the leaves on the ground
of your yard. This allows for
butterflies, bees, and many
other animals to survive
winter. It helps maintain
nutrient-rich, productive soil
for your plants and trees and
serves as free mulch! Any
leaves on your deck, driveway,
patio, or walkway can be put
in garden beds or around
ornamental trees and shrubs.
As a reminder, do not rake
or blow your leaves into the
street! Leaves block storm
drains and contribute to
street flooding. This is also a
safety hazard for cyclists and
drivers as leaves create a slick
surface when ice forms.

How to Have a Sustainable Holiday Season

Pre-Treat with Anti-Icing Salt Brine

Road salt has adverse effects
on the environment when it
washes off roadways, seeps
into the ground, and enters
our waterways. The Village
utilizes a beet juice/salt brine
blend to pre-treat roads
before a snowstorm, which
reduces the amount of salt
used on roadways. To help
the environment, you can do
the same at home! Instead
of using salt to remove snow
or ice from your driveway or
sidewalk, consider making
your own salt brine (water
and rock salt) to pre-treat
these surfaces. Learn more at

During the week of Thanksgiving, Thursday and
Friday pickups will be delayed one day. Since

pickups will not be affected (collection will still occur
on Christmas Eve and New Year's Eve).

Holiday Recycling Opportunities

Starting in December, residents can recycle old
or broken holiday lights at the Fleet Maintenance
Garage (behind the Village Hall) weekdays from 7am
to 3pm through Monday, January 31.

Recycle your fresh holiday tree by Monday, January
31, by placing it at the curb on your recycling day.
Remove all lights, garland, and decorations. Make
sure your tree is easily accessible at the curb.

Beginning December 1, refuse and bulk item drop-
off will no longer be available at 2800 Shermer Road.

This program offers an affordable transportation option for senior residents of incorporated Northbrook 55 years or older and permanently disabled Village residents. Proof of residency in the Village of Northbrook is required to participate in the program.

Registered program participants are allowed up to 16 five dollar rides per month with American Taxi, 303 Taxi, RideX Taxi, and BriteLift. The program utilizes an electronic swipe card to offset the metered fare. Ride subsidies will not roll-over from month to month.
