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Countdown to Celebrations

Every New Year's Eve begins with a countdown to welcome the coming year. The Northbrook Historical Society is preparing for multiple countdowns as four important and historical events will be taking place in the next four years.

The first of these events will be the anniversary of our Village's name change from Shererville to Northbrook. Unlike today, when items changing the Village are on the board agenda, there was little public about the name change. A petition requesting the change was presented to the Village Board. The 129 men and women who signed the petition represented one half of the those who voted in the last election. The closest population count for Shererville at that time comes from the 1920 Census, which shows 129 households. For the first time women could take part in local elections, so 129 signers does not mean that only one member of each household signed the petition. The "Legal Public Acton" notice published in the Daily Herald newspaper called for a meeting at the Shererville School on January 8, 1923, to change the name of our town. There

was no public comment at the meeting, and the vote for the change passed with one no vote. The change officially took place on February 1, 1923.

The Northbrook Historical Society will celebrate its 48th Birthday on March 18, 2022. We have begun planning for our 50th Birthday countdown. Prior to incorporation, we began meeting and planning for the move of the Bartelme Inn from the corner of Waukegan and Shermer roads to the Village Green Park, which occurred in January 1975.

The last countdown is a double celebration in 2026, when Northbrook turns 125 and America turns 250 years old. A joint celebration took place on July 4, 1976, for the Village's 75th birthday and the country's bicentennial. That was also the day the Northbrook History Museum opened to the public for the first time. Village Centennial celebrations began in November 2000 and concluded on November 18, 2001, one hundred years to the day after residents went to the polls to incorporate the Village.

In addition to the celebrations, two unfamiliar words will be added to our

vocabulary. Northbrook's 125th Birthday is known as quasquicentennial and America's 250th is a semiquicentennial. For more information on the national semiquicentennial visit www.america250.org. Planning will be underway soon for Northbrook's celebrations.

Black History Month: Presented by RAIN (Racial Awareness in the North Shore)

Have you ever asked yourself why we celebrate Black History Month in February?

Dr. Carter G. Woodson, a Harvard graduate, writer, and historian was a co-founder of the Association for the Study of Afro-American Life and History in 1915. He introduced the first celebration of Black history as Black History Week in 1926.

Each year presidents issue a proclamation honoring Black History Month extolling the contributions of Black people in America. Let's look at two of the proclamations issued during significant years:

The first official national observance of Black History Month was in 1976 when President Gerald R. Ford issued a proclamation that began:

"In the Bicentennial year of our Independence, we can review with

admiration the impressive contributions of Black Americans to our national life and culture."

The proclamation went on to say:

"But, even more than this, we can seize the opportunity to honor the too-often neglected accomplishments of Black Americans in every area of endeavor throughout our history. I urge my fellow citizens to join me in tribute to Black History Month and the message of courage and perseverance it brings to all of us."

The year Martin Luther King, Jr.'s January birthday became a national holiday for the first time, President Ronald Reagan said in his Black History Month proclamation:

"The foremost purpose of Black History Month is to make all Americans aware of this struggle for freedom and equal opportunity. It is also a time to celebrate

the many achievements of blacks in every field, from science and the arts to politics and religion. It not only offers black Americans an occasion to explore their heritage, but it also offers all Americans an occasion and opportunity to gain a fuller perspective of the contributions of black Americans to our Nation. The American experience and character can never be fully grasped until the knowledge of black history assumes its rightful place in our schools and our scholarship."

The question we should be asking is why people of the African Diaspora still have ongoing struggles for equality in all aspects of our society including full recognition of their accomplishments, contributions, and their rightful place in American history. Black History is an integral part of America's History. It should be woven into the fabric of American history because it is American history.

Meet Chloe: Northbrook's Therapy K-9



In late September 2021, the Village of Northbrook welcomed a new four-legged friend to the family: Chloe, the Northbrook Police Department's first-ever therapy canine. Chloe, a four-year-old purebred golden retriever, was rescued from a shelter by the Brevard County Sheriff's Office Paws and Stripes College after they noticed her happy and friendly demeanor.

Eight weeks of training later, Northbrook Police Officers Teresa Drewes and Angie Baiocchi (Chloe's handler and secondary handler)

would travel to Florida to meet their new team member! Together, Chloe and her handlers are certified as a Law Enforcement Therapy Dog Team, and Chloe holds an additional Canine Good Citizen Certification.

After being formally adopted by the Village and making her way to Northbrook, Chloe got to work! "She's a very busy girl," said Officer Drewes, who takes Chloe on patrols in her very own K-9 squad car. Some of Chloe's duties include attending public events, assisting in community outreach, victim interviews, major incident decompression, and crisis intervention. But in Chloe's short time here, they have found that her true talent lies in healing and providing comfort and relief to first responders and individuals going through trauma.

"Therapy dogs unlock something in someone that may have stayed locked away. People just melt when they see Chloe and her sweet face."

A very important part of Chloe's mission is helping with mental health and bridging the gap between law enforcement and people who need help but may be experiencing emotional shock. "People you didn't think you'd reach embrace her. She makes people smile and helps me better serve those in need," said Officer Drewes. "It's pure puppy magic."

This was particularly true when Chloe attended the Village's COVID-19 vaccination clinics for 5- to 11-year-olds, where she helped calm down upset children and provided relief to parents. Chloe left her mark on those she helped, and she did not leave empty-handed! After being vaccinated,

Northfield Township Food Pantry

50+ Years of Making a Difference in Our Community

Food insecurity may be a modern term for lack of adequate food supply, but the issue is one the Northfield Township has been addressing since the early 1970s. From its humble beginnings of distributing bags of food from a supply closet to a full client choice pantry operation today, Northfield Township Food Pantry's mission is the same as it was then; provide assistance to residents who are unable to secure enough food for themselves and their families.

Over the decades, the food pantry has evolved to a grocery store setting with carts, categorized aisles, industrial refrigeration, and a walk-in cooler. Today, they offer perishable items such as milk, butter, eggs, bakery items, fresh fruit and vegetables, and a variety of meat choices. Their non-perishable food items include a selection of



soups, vegetables, baking items, pasta, cereals, peanut butter, jam, rice, and other staples. Additionally, they provide grocery store gift cards enabling clients to obtain additional items to supplement what they receive from the pantry. Most recently they have expanded their pantry distributions to include paper products, infant diapers and formula, personal hygiene products, and household cleaning items.

It may surprise many to learn that the number of households served by the pantry spiked to over 700 after the economic crisis of 2008. As the economy improved service numbers leveled off around 600. In 2020, the COVID-19 pandemic brought another dramatic increase in the number of households seeking assistance. Within the first two months of

Credit card donations can be made online by visiting twp.northfield.il.us/pantry or by calling the Township office at 847-724-8300. Donations of goods can be dropped off Monday-Friday, 8:30am-4:30pm, or after hours by utilizing the bins located outside the Township office entrance (please only drop off non-perishable food items after normal operating hours). A list of most-needed items can be found on the pantry's website or on their Amazon Charity Wish List.

the pandemic shutdown, their numbers doubled. As of this writing over 1,090 households are currently registered to visit the pantry.

COVID-19 forced the pantry to temporarily suspend their client choice distribution model and implement a contactless distribution method. Their clients call from the pantry parking lot, place their order over the phone, and a cart of perishable and non-perishable foods is wheeled out to them.



Dedicated volunteers and staff have worked tirelessly throughout the pandemic to ensure that pantry services remain available to all residents who need them. They hope to return to full client choice in 2022 once it is safe to do so.



Northbrook's 5-Year Capital Improvement Plan

FYs 2023-2027

The Village of Northbrook's Capital Improvement Plan (CIP) is a long-range planning document designed to review the Village's anticipated capital needs for the next five fiscal years. The CIP is a roadmap used for forecasting that allows the Village to plan but maintain flexibility. The CIP is updated annually and is integral in the Village's financial planning cycle. Ultimately, the CIP's goal is to ensure that the Village's infrastructure can meet both the service demands of the public and operational needs of the organization. On these pages are summary highlights of the 2023-2027 CIP that show how the Village invests back into the community.

○ Infrastructure Fund

This next fiscal year, the Village plans to invest \$6,110,551 into infrastructure-related projects, such as the asphalt and concrete street programs and sidewalk and intersection improvements. Most notably, the Village earmarked \$2,932,421 for bicycle and pedestrian improvements and \$592,500 for downtown improvements.

○ Stormwater Fund

This next fiscal year, the Village plans to invest \$660,400 into stormwater management projects.



○ Water Fund

This next fiscal year, the Village plans to invest \$2,715,900 into water-related projects including improvements to the water distribution and water production systems and water meter replacements. \$2,319,900 of the fund amount is allocated for water main replacements.

○ Sanitary Sewer Fund

This next fiscal year, the Village plans to invest \$289,500 into sanitary sewer system maintenance.



○ General Fund

This next fiscal year, the Village plans to invest \$2,636,566 into the following projects: computer and mobile device replacements, facility improvements, information technology projects, police equipment and projects, public works equipment replacements, and vehicle replacements.

○ Senior Housing Fund

This next fiscal year, the Village plans to invest \$965,000 into facility improvements at Crestwood Place.

2022 SPRING PARKWAY TREE PLANTING PROGRAM

The Village of Northbrook is pleased to offer again to residents an opportunity to participate in planting a tree on the parkway in front of their home.

The Village works with the Suburban Tree Consortium to purchase landscape sized trees in various species that will be a great addition to your property. Some of the benefits that you will receive when planting a tree are:

- Improved energy costs because trees provide shade and cool your home
- Improved air quality because trees filter air pollution
- Better sound quality around your home because trees buffer noise
- Increased property values by 12-20%
- Increased psychological benefits (trees make us feel better!)

The Village will provide and install the tree on your parkway after you discuss what tree you may want with the Village Forester. The cost share is \$175, which is a fraction of the retail price for a full planted landscape tree. The Parkway Tree Planting Program is an excellent value for Northbrook residents!



Winter Reminders



Snow Clearing Operations

The Village's snow removal operations begin with seven or more trucks spreading de-icing materials on main and secondary streets. As snow begins to accumulate, standby personnel are called in to plow the 539 lane miles of Village owned and maintained streets, municipal parking lots, and designated sidewalks. After the snow stops, a complete plow-cycle can take at least 4-6 hours, depending on weather and traffic.

Snow Clearing Routes

Snow and ice control efforts give priority to higher traffic Village roadways, such as Walters Avenue, Cherry Lane, Pfingsten Road, Techny Road, and Shermer Road. Arterial roads, such as Lake Cook, Dundee, Willow, Sanders, Landwehr, and Waukegan are plowed by either the Illinois Department of Transportation or the Cook County Highway Department.

Snow Parking Ordinance

Remember to move your vehicle from the street when plows are out. Per Village ordinance, it is illegal to park on Northbrook streets when two or more inches of snow fall, until plowing is complete. Offending vehicles may be ticketed and towed. The Village will use its Northbrook Notify system to alert residents via text and email when the parking ban is in effect and when it has cleared. Sign up at northbrook.il.us/northbrooknotify.

Having to drive around a car parked in the street is not only a hazard for the plow driver, but it can also create an unplowed curb line stretching up to 45', as the plow needs some distance to maneuver around the vehicle. Since clearing from curb to curb is the goal, it is essential to have parked vehicles moved off the street until plowing operations are complete. A curb-to-curb clearance enables melting snow to find its way to the drains and inlets.

Prevent Frozen Pipes

When temperatures drop below freezing, unprotected pipes can freeze and burst. To prevent damage to your pipes, try these tips: insulate your pipes properly; periodically open your bathroom and kitchen cabinets to keep warm air circulating around the plumbing; keep your thermostat setting consistent, and leave heat on when you're away; seal off crawl spaces, cracks, and openings, especially around pipes; and let faucets drip during particularly cold weather.

Clear the Snow Around Fire Hydrants

In case of an emergency, every second counts! Work with neighbors to keep the fire hydrants on or near your property clear of snow. In addition to removing snow and debris covering the hydrant, clear a three-foot area around the hydrant for easier access.

Keep Vents Clear

Clear outside furnace, stove, fireplace, and gas dryer vents of snow and other debris to prevent carbon monoxide poisoning. Have your furnace, heating system, and chimney serviced each year by a qualified professional to prevent fires.

Shovel a Snow Pocket

When clearing snow from your driveway, shovel snow in the direction of traffic and try to make a pocket on the opposite side of the driveway. By doing so, snow plowed by our trucks will be dumped into that pocket and less snow will end up in your driveway.



Police Department staff researched automated license plate reader camera (ALPR) systems for the purpose of capturing license plate information from passing vehicles and comparing them to 'hot lists' created by local police departments or other public safety agencies. ALPRs are another tool to aid in the deterrence of crime and the efficient resolution of cases where vehicle identification is of utmost importance, specifically cases of residential and vehicle burglary, stolen automobiles, and missing persons. At this time, the Police Department seeks to install ALPR cameras at Northbrook Court, our regional shopping mall. Due to recent trends in the occurrence of thefts in area shopping centers, Police Department staff believes this equipment will serve as an appropriate tool to assist in both the prevention and resolution of these crimes.

How will the ALPRs be used?

Only law enforcement agencies will have access to the license plate information captured by the ALPRs. Law enforcement will use the information in relation to ongoing investigations.

The ALPRs do not contain facial recognition technology and will not be used to identify and stop a vehicle for expired Village stickers or expired license plate tags. The ALPRs may flag a vehicle as stolen or used in a crime; if there is a visible Village sticker or license plate tag (or absence of), it may be used to support vehicle identification.

The ALPRs will not be used to issue tickets/citations for moving violations or parking violations. Information not associated with a 'hot list' designation and/or ongoing criminal investigation is not retained after 30 days.
