From Oral History to Verified History

Often times we hear a story for which we can find no verification. Sometimes the same story is told multiple times by different people. This is what we call oral history. It's our responsibility to verify the truth behind the story before passing it on as verified history. That task is not always easy. We do this by researching in newspapers and reaching out to ask others for help. Occasionally, we find a hidden gem tucked away in someone's file of negatives or photos from family picture albums. For us, it is always a joy to locate such an artifact and prove oral history.

Two examples of this came about during the past year. In February of 2021 we received a request asking if we had a photo of the F7U-3 Cutlass Navy Jet that was a piece of the playground equipment at Oaklane School in the late 1950s and early 1960s. Oral history said that the plane was there. Although we could find information about it, including its serial number, we found no photos. We reached out through Facebook and personal contacts to anyone we could think of who might have attended Oaklane at that time or who might remember there was an airplane at the playground. Nothing new was located. Then, we placed a notice in the Village Happenings section of the May-June 2021 Northbrook Voice newsletter requesting help finding a photo of the jet.

In November, an out-of-state former resident reached out to say he had read the Northbrook Voice newsletter and his father had taken photos of the plane in the early 1960s. One of the photos he sent us showed a close-up of him and his brother standing in front of the jet with a damaged nosecone. Others had partial views of the jet in the background behind them playing. Success - we now had proof that the plane was there, even if the photos did not show the entire structure.

Then, in January 2022, we received two additional photos from the same man who had located them among his father's slides. These latest photos show the jet the day it arrived at Oaklane School. The jet and Oaklane School are long gone, but the memories continue and are now a recorded part of history.

THE RIVER FROM MAIN STREET
SHERMerville, ILLINOIS, 1917

Shermerville postcards have often provided proof of early oral history. Such is the case for the second example about the West Fork of the North Branch of the Chicago River and early recollections of it before the river was changed to its current configuration in the 1920s. The stories say that at one time the river was deeper and wider. It is also said the river was deep enough for the children in town to swim in, and they could jump in it from the bridge on Shermer Road. The recent acquisition of a postcard dated 1917 once again proves at least part of the story while at the same time showing the large mature grove of Oak and Hickory trees on what is now the Village Green.

Northbrook's Climate Action Plan

Since making sustainability a top priority in early 2020, the Village dove into creating a Climate Action Plan (CAP) to reduce our carbon footprint - it's the first of its kind in our area! This community-based effort gained overwhelming support from over 700 members of the public. In August 2021, the Board adopted the CAP and has since shifted focus to implementing its objectives.

We Are Certified Green!

Northbrook has been awarded a SolSmart Gold designation for our efforts to make it faster, easier, and more affordable to go solar. Gold is the highest designation a community can receive, and we are proud to be recognized as a national leader in advancing solar energy!

After signing onto the Mayors Monarch Pledge, we carried out more milkweed giveaways, educational programming, and conservation initiatives than ever before. Northbrook is now just one of a few towns in the Leadership Circle for the National Wildlife Federation's pledge signatories.

The Village recently received incentives from ComEd to complete LED fixture and light conversions at four Village facilities. This will reduce the Village's kilowatt hour usage by an estimated 548,863 kilowatt hours per year, which is equivalent to over \$60,000 saved annually and 84 passenger vehicles being taken off the road!

Northbrook is a Tree City Community

Growing Northbrook's tree canopy is an infrastructure investment to improve air quality and stormwater absorption. We gave out 300 free native trees in 2021 and look forward to topping that number in 2022.

For our commitment to effective urban forest management, the Village has been named a Tree City USA community by the Arbor Day Foundation for the

26th consecutive year! We are also pleased to announce that the Village received a Tree City USA Growth Award for environmental improvement and a higher level of tree care.

Green Partnerships

To engage our valued partners in the business community, the Village is launching a Green Business Certification program. In its pilot stage currently, the program will provide validation to establishments that are making an effort to become more eco-friendly in big ways or small.

We also created an intergovernmental working group with the Library, Park District, and Schools and provide support for environmental programming.

Friends of the Somme Preserves



Forest Preserves of Cook County rounded up a group of motivated volunteers. Today, there is a global society for ecological restoration, and the work done in Northbrook is celebrated and seen as some of the most influential.

There are 500 species of native plants and animals in Somme Preserves, and there are twice as many in the prairie grove as when they started restoration. "They all need each other - rare plants and rare animals. Rare birds and butterflies have come back since restoration, and so have rare people," said Stephen. And those rare people he spoke of are none other than the Friends of the Somme Preserves. This group of volunteers, some as young as nine-years-old, meet every week to care for the beautiful gem in Northbrook that is the Somme Preserves.

Ecological restoration was not yet recognized as a practice at that time, so Stephen appealed to the

"All these wonderful, generous, smart, fun people said 'I want to do this.'"

In summer they work on controlling invasives and picking early seeds; in fall they finish gathering seeds and prep for planting; in winter they start cutting brush; and in spring they plant the seeds. The Friends also help prepare for prescribed burns and manage many of the footpaths. In every season and in all conditions, these stewards are doing the work. "We used to think that nature was just going to take care of itself," said Stephen. "We're in charge, and we have to learn how to do a decent job."

What can you do at home to help? Stephen recommends minimizing insecticides and herbicides. "Let a little bit of wild nature grow in your yard." He also urges residents to get out into the Preserves and appreciate our remarkable, and rare, native wildlife. "It's a really great place to feel like you're part of something larger," said Stephen. Ramadan Mubrak from the Northbrook Mosque (ICC-GC)

Ramadan is the ninth month of the Islamic (lunar) calendar. Those who are able fast from the break of dawn (Fajr) to sunset (Maghrib). The fast traditionally ends with water and dates, prayer, and a shared meal. Many wake up pre-dawn to have breakfast (Suhoor) and hydrate. During the month of Ramadan, the first revelations of the Quran were revealed.

As an ancient practice, fasting is observed by many religions universally - such as the "Day of Atonement" in Judaism and "Lent" in Christianity. In Islam it's a time to subdue bad habits, break from worldly possessions, provide for the poor, read from the holy scripture, pray, and rediscover the faith that is in us. "O you who believe, Fasting is prescribed for you as it was prescribed for those before you, that you may become the pious." (Quran, 2:183-84)

There are exemptions from fasting for young children, the ill, sick or pregnant, during travel, and soldiers during battle. Those who are able will make up the days missed. Those who are unable could donate meals or money for meals. This is a beautiful mercy as Ramadan is not meant to be a hardship, but rather an enlightenment towards oneness with God, peace, and contentment. "Allah desires ease for you, and He does not desire for you difficulty" (Quran 2:185).

In addition to its spiritual and moral values, fasting also has social values. Ramadan is a signal for a communal movement toward equality throughout the Muslim world for all. The holy month of Ramadan goes beyond refraining from food and drink. It helps promote a sense of community and encourages self-control, kindness, and generosity.

Walk-In Clinic: Connect with a skilled specialist and be guided to the needed care during an initial visit. No phone calls. No need to make an appointment. Just walk in.



Camp Neeka: This accessible and inclusive summer day camp is for children ages 8-12. Directed by trained therapists, youth create friendships while building self-esteem and developing communication and coping skills to improve their everyday mental health.

Northbrook Recycling Guide

In a sample mix of Northbrook's household recycling waste, Waste Management found that 17% of materials collected were contaminated with items that cannot be recycled through this program.

Being a steward for the environment means you care about where the products you consume come from and where they end up. At the point of purchase, considering whether or not the packaging of something is reusable or recyclable may help inform responsible waste habits.

This useful guide contains information specific to Northbrook's recycling programs and common contaminants!

Can I Recycle This?

Pro Tip: Recycling is important, but did you know that there are other options to consider first before generating waste? **Refuse:** Say no to single-use products! **Reduce:** Simplify your life with conscious consumption. **Reuse:** Remember to bring reusable items like tote bags or water bottles when you need them. **Rot:** Opt for products and packaging that can biodegrade.

Is it clean and dry?

Rinse any food or liquid residue off the item. Buildup of such contaminants causes mold and mildew that are harmful to waste hauler employees who handle collections.

**Is it made of one
material or multiple?**

Separate any materials that cannot be recycled from the item. For example, rip off and throw away any tape or stickers. If the item has mixed materials that cannot be separated, like a paper cup with a waxy coating or a plastic pouch with bubble wrap attached, it is likely not recyclable and should be landfilled.

Is it a plastic bag?

Plastic bags CANNOT be recycled through Waste Management's recycling service because the material often causes jams and disables the hauler's machinery.

If it is a regular grocery bag, laundry bag, or Ziploc bag, bring to Village Hall's plastic bag collection. Local Northbrook business Aargus Plastics, Inc. reuses this plastic to make 100% recycled plastic bags (see page 12).

If it is a bubble wrap, cereal bag, or plastic mailer such as Amazon packaging, bring to storefronts such as Mariano's in Northbrook for recycling by Trex.



Community Solar & Electric Aggregation

The Village of Northbrook supports renewable energy through our participation in the North Shore Electric Aggregation Consortium (NSEAC). The NSEAC is a joint effort between the Cities of Highland Park and Lake Forest and the Villages of Deerfield, Lake Bluff, Skokie, and Northbrook to maximize purchasing power in creating the largest aggregation cooperative in Illinois! State law allows municipalities to aggregate electricity by utilizing alternative electric suppliers to compete with ComEd rates. Electricity is still delivered by ComEd, which remains responsible for customer service, billing, and outage response.

With the NSEAC, the Village is able to provide two separate electricity programs supporting our sustainability goals for community members that cannot install their own renewable energy system. These are **1. Community Solar** and **2. Electric Aggregation**. Supporting these types of projects helps reduce the dependence on fossil fuels and support clean energy generation.

1. Community solar projects generate electricity, and that power is delivered into the electric grid of the utility provider. Northbrook's program is tied to Rainy Solar, a 1.18 megawatt rooftop solar array in Elgin, newly constructed in 2018. Participants in Community Solar continue to receive monthly ComEd bills and pay ComEd for electricity supply service. Once enrolled in Community Solar, you start to receive solar credits on your ComEd statements. Through our program, you are guaranteed to save on your bill with 20% of solar credits earned. All Northbrook residents and small businesses are eligible. Visit northbrook.il.us/communitysolar.

2. When the Board approved a new Electric Aggregation program in August 2021, community members were contacted by mail whether or not their account was switching to the alternate supplier. The program switches accounts based on their historical annual electric usage: only units or households using 15,000 kWh or less are eligible to participate. Participants in Electric Aggregation continue to receive monthly ComEd bills and pay the same rate as a default ComEd account. The only difference is a new program administrator is listed under the "Supply" section of the ComEd bill. The savings generated from this program are granted directly to the Village and designated for funding sustainability projects. While individual participants would only see a few dollars of savings per year, this program is expected to generate \$279,000 for Village sustainability funding over the three-year contract period!

The Board of Trustees is responsible for deciding how to use these funds. Visit northbrook.il.us/publiccomments to submit your thoughts on project ideas or priorities.

Simple Recycling Program Changes

The Village contracts with Simple Recycling to provide free year-round curbside textile recycling to single-family homes. For 2022, they updated how to arrange pickups. Pickups are no longer determined by your curbside recycling day but instead must be scheduled in advance. Here are two options available for residents:

1. Go to simplicerecycling.com and enter your zip code. The system will provide available upcoming days to schedule the pickup. Once scheduled, you will receive a confirmation and a reminder email the day prior.
2. Call Simple Recycling to schedule a pickup at 1-866-835-5068.

What can I recycle through Simple Recycling?

- Textiles: clothing, bags, hats, toys, blankets, curtains, pillows
- Other: jewelry, shoes, tools, silverware, dishes, pots/pans

Plastic Bag Recycling

Plastic bag recycling is available in the bins behind Village Hall. Accepted items are clean and dry bags made of lightweight plastic, like grocery bags, dry cleaning bags, newspaper sleeves, and Ziploc bags. Cereal bags, bubble wrap, and plastic film will not be accepted. Excessive contamination from unaccepted items will result in discontinuation of the service. Thank you to local Northbrook business Aargus Plastics, Inc. for partnering with the Village on this program!

TerraCycle Program Changes

Due to a lack of volunteers, Go Green Northbrook's TerraCycle collection outside Village Hall and the train station is discontinued. However, residents can still drop off the following items at the Northbrook Public Library lobby: batteries, eyeglasses, phones, snack and candy wrappers, used pens, pencils, markers, glue sticks, toothbrushes, empty toothpaste tubes, and dental floss containers.
