The Census: A Northbrook Story of Growth

Hurray! The Federal government recently released preliminary data contained in the 2020 Census. Paired with the April 1, 2022 release of the 1950 Census, historians and genealogists are shouting for glee. The 2020 Census release includes demographic information about the Village, such as population. This data helps villages identify trends and plan for future needs.

Currently, complete census information is available from 1790 to the newly released 1950 Census. The one exception is the census of 1890 that burned in a fire. For privacy reasons, the personal information in the census is not available to the public for 72 years. That means the 2020 Census will not be publicly available until the year 2092.

With the 1950 data release, Northbrook researchers finally have a glimpse of our Village on the cusp of tremendous change. Even though the Village of 1,285 people had nearly doubled in size in the decade following 1940, Northbrook was still a small, semi-rural Village with a population of 3,334 in 1950. Because of the privacy release law, anyone 72 years or younger will not find themselves in this census.

By 1960, the borders of the Village had stretched to the west to welcome new residents into a community of 11,635. With that rapid growth came the "Ferris Bueller" water tower, Cherry Lane underpass, library, the two shopping centers on Cherry Lane and Church Street, new parks including the Village Green, multiple houses of worship, and schools including Glenbrook High School, which until 1962 served students in both Northbrook and Glenview.

Between 1960 and 1980 the population more than doubled from 11,635 to 30,778. The Village's growth finally slowed when there were no more cornfields available to accommodate new subdivisions, and the age demographics of the Village changed. In fact, the population growth between 1980 and 2020 is less than half the growth experienced in the two decades between 1940 and 1960.

Today, Northbrook is the bustling suburban community we are proud to call our home.

THE COOK COUNTY CLERK'S OFFICE IS THE CHIEF ELECTION AUTHORITY FOR MORE THAN 120 TOWNS AND VILLAGES IN SUBURBAN COOK COUNTY, INCLUDING NORTHBROOK. THE NEXT UPCOMING ELECTION IS THE JUNE 28, 2022 GUBERNATORIAL PRIMARY ELECTION.

Voter Registration

If you have recently moved, changed your name, or are a new voter, you'll need to register to vote. Voter registration is available at Village Hall and other locations with a certified registrar. The deadline for in-person registration and registration by mail is May 31. The deadline to register online is June 12. Voters may also register and vote at an Early Voting site by June 27 or on Election Day (June 28) at their assigned precinct.

Early Voting

Voting will be available at any of Cook County's early voting centers, including Northbrook Village Hall. Early Voting takes

place at Village Hall from June 13 through June 27.

Election Day

Election Day is June 28. On Election Day, voters must vote at their precinct's voting location.

Voting by Mail

Any registered Cook County voter may request a mail ballot from the Cook County Clerk's Office. The deadline to apply is five days before an election. Ballots must be postmarked by Election Day.

Q&A with Nancy Vaccaro, Northbrook's Director of Counseling Services



How did you get into the field?

Having participated in many volunteer opportunities with all age, ethnic, and socio-

economic groups in my life, I learned one important factor about myself...that I truly enjoy being helpful to others in need and knew that I wanted social work to be my life's work and passion!

What does working in the Counseling Services Unit entail?

We work with individuals and families referred by the Police and Fire Departments to offer support services, connect them to resources, and assist in an advocacy role for victims of crime. Our cases often involve those who have experienced domestic violence, child or elder abuse, sexual assault, geriatric

concerns, youth offenders, runaways, family disputes, missing persons, trauma and sudden death, and mental illness. We are on-call 24/7 for crisis intervention with first responders when needed within the Northbrook community. We also facilitate a Community Services Program - with deferred prosecution for youth and young adult offenders who have received local ordinance tickets.

The Counseling Services Unit and Northbrook Police staff have been working together for 40+ years as a multi-disciplinary team of professionals to service our community in the best way that we can. There is no fee or wait list!

What's your favorite thing about your job?

I love coming to work each and every day. I have the opportunity to give hope and building blocks of empowerment to those we work with.

Every day is different, and my job responsibilities are diversified so I have the opportunity to not only work clinically with case referrals and assist with crises

but also get to participate in community networking groups and events. Having the opportunity to combine the clinical mental health perspective while teaming up with law enforcement has been our key to success and is why the Northbrook Police has the leading edge of comprehensive services with the goal of protection and safety for our residents. I feel very proud to work for the Village of Northbrook.

What does "Northbrook Strong" mean to you?

To me, it means we work together as a community to offer assistance to those in need and are not offset by the roadblocks that appear. Northbrook cares about its residents as well as those providing support and services to the community. As a member of the police department, I have always felt the support of Northbrook. I love and embrace change... both in my personal and professional life. "Northbrook Strong" means we will help our community manage the changes needed when faced with adversity... small or large!

Gender Pronouns 101 by RAIN (Racial Awareness in the North Shore)

Have you ever been called by the wrong name? Repeatedly? How did you feel? Overlooked? Offended? Sad?

Now imagine you are called the wrong name every day, by coworkers, neighbors, family, and people with power over you.

Have you ever forgotten someone's name? How did you feel? Embarrassed? Frustrated? Worried about offending them?

A pronoun is a kind of name. It's a way we refer to a person.

Most of us have been taught to guess a person's pronouns based on their body, clothes, name, and behavior. But, for some people, their pronoun may be hard to guess, or you might guess wrong.

Getting a pronoun wrong is a lot like getting a name wrong - uncomfortable, alienating. But it's more than that because misgendering someone can tap into deep feelings of gender dysphoria and trauma. Research has shown that using a person's correct pronoun can reduce rates of depression or even suicide, particularly for youth.

Unfortunately, many people intentionally mispronoun trans, nonbinary, and gender-nonconforming people as a way to express disapproval or even hatred. So, if a person is misgendered, they wonder if it was accidental or intentional, and they have to wonder what other mistreatment might follow.

In English, we don't need to know a person's gender to speak to them - I, you, we - these are all ungendered. For most interactions, you don't need to know the

details about a person's gender, but you do need to know a person's gendered pronoun to speak about them - she, they, him, theirs, hers - these are all gendered pronouns.

To make it easier to know and use each person's correct pronoun, many people are including pronouns along with names in introductions, email signatures, and elsewhere. People whose pronouns are easily guessable are including their pronouns too, to normalize this practice. Sharing pronouns regularly makes it a habit, so that it feels easy and natural when you run into a person whose pronouns you're unsure of. And, sharing pronouns has become a small signal and act of allyship.

Hunger Resource Network

Have you ever experienced real hunger? We have all felt hungry, but have you ever waited days, weeks, or months without enough food? Have you ever watched a loved one go without adequate nourishment for an extended period of time?

Some 12% of American households are food insecure, and that impacts an estimated 6.5 million children. And, if you think that those people only live in poverty-stricken neighborhoods, you'll be surprised to hear that even in Northbrook, and communities like ours, it is estimated that 10% of our households are food insecure.

It is known that we have approximately 400 children in Northbrook school districts that are on free or reduced-fee government food programs.

Hunger Resource Network (HRN), is an all-volunteer, registered 501c3 non-profit organization based in Northbrook. HRN has been helping to eliminate hunger across Chicagoland since 2009.

Twice a year, HRN provides more than 126,000 pounds of quality protein, found in frozen chicken, to more than 100 Chicago-area organizations including food pantries, homeless shelters, soup kitchens, synagogues, and churches. That adds up to more than 4 million pounds of food...given away absolutely free to worthy organizations and provided to hungry families since the start of HRN.

As HRN has grown, they have also added new services, including programs to feed students in need at Northbrook schools. They have also reduced the number of hungry seniors in the community by providing transportation and assistance at the Northfield Township Food Pantry and even delivering food to their homes...all at no cost.

Hunger Resource Network also provides educational information to the community to encourage and provide tips on healthy, sustainable eating. Information is also made available on how to contact and support the Northfield Township Food Pantry to ensure everyone knows that, at least in our community, food is available to anyone in need.

Since the pandemic began, the needs in our community have profoundly increased. "You don't have to go to a third world country to see real hunger. Hunger is here! It is in our communities and in our neighborhoods today--and it will continue to be here tomorrow, and even after the pandemic, unless we choose to make a difference," said Dan Jariabka, HRN founder and president.

And as the acting director of Northwest Compass explained after receiving a truck load of food for his organization, "on behalf of your neighbors in our community who depend on our program, thank you for showing compassion. Your gifts change lives."

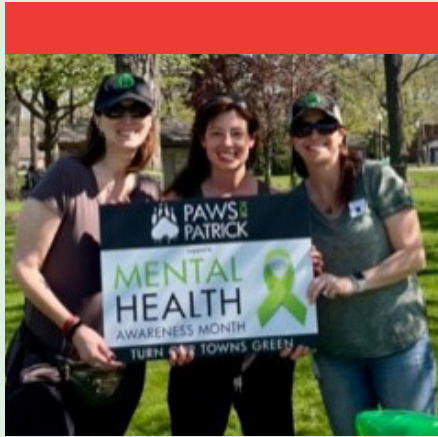

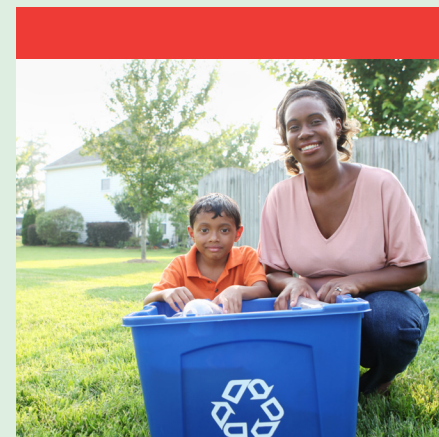


MEMORIAL DAY | MAY 30

Please take a moment to remember the men and women who died serving in the United States Armed Forces, the reason we observe Memorial Day each year.

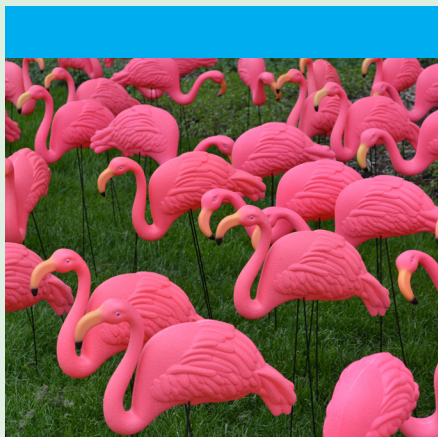


SPRING CLEAN UP DAY | JUNE 11

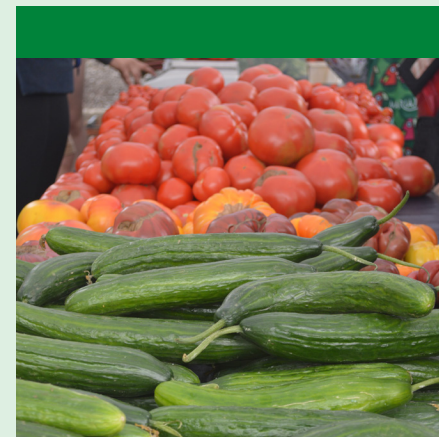

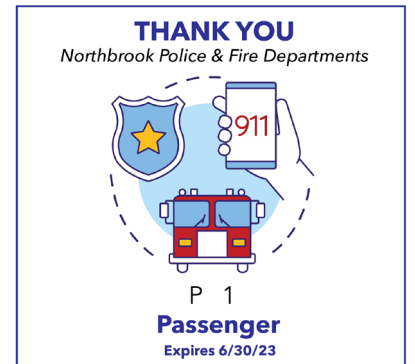

Northbrook Vehicle Stickers & Pet Tags

All motor vehicles owned by a Village resident or by a person or entity (including associations, clubs, societies, firms, partnerships, and bodies politic and corporate) having its principle place of business in the Village requires a Village vehicle sticker.

Current residents who have previously purchased Village vehicle stickers will automatically receive renewal applications in the mail towards the end of May.

Vehicle sticker and pet tag sales will begin **online and by mail on June 1**. In-person sales at Village Hall will begin on June 8. The deadline to purchase and display stickers and pet tags is September 1.



How to Purchase

Online

Visit the Village's online payment system at northbrook.il.us/stickers or scan this QR code with your smartphone. Through the online platform, you can purchase sticker and pet tag renewals, purchase for new vehicles and pets, or delete ones you no longer own. If you are renewing your sticker and/or tag, you will need your license plate number and vehicle ID and/or rabies certificate number and pet ID from the application(s) you received in the mail.



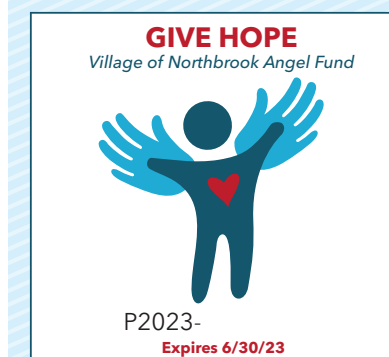
By Mail or Dropbox

Mail the completed application, rabies certificate (if purchasing a pet tag), and payment in the return envelope you received with your application to: Village of Northbrook, ATTN: Finance Department, 1225 Cedar Lane, Northbrook, IL 60062

Postage-free dropboxes are located behind Village Hall (1225 Cedar Lane), at the Northbrook Police Station (1401 Landwehr Road), and at Wood Oaks Junior High (1250 Sanders Road).

In Person

Starting June 8, purchases can be made at the Village Hall front counter during business hours, weekdays from 8:30am-4:30pm.



Special Vehicle Sticker: Support the Village of Northbrook Angel Fund

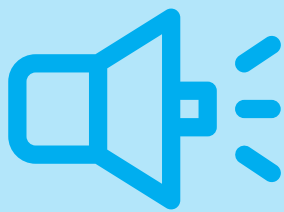

Attached Accessory Dwelling Units

At the March 8, 2022, meeting of the Board of Trustees, the Northbrook Zoning Code was amended to allow for Attached Accessory Dwelling Units (AADUs) to be built in residential zoning districts.

What is an AADU? An AADU is an independent dwelling unit containing a kitchen, bathroom, and areas for living and sleeping that is located on the same zoning lot as, and is attached to, a standard sized single-family home.

Is a special permit required to build an AADU? Yes. AADUs may only be constructed through a special permit application that includes the public review process.

Do AADUs have to comply with my neighborhood's space requirements? Yes. AADUs are required to comply with all bulk, space, setback, and yard requirements for the Single-Family Residential Zoning District where it is located.

Are there any size restrictions? Yes. AADUs may not exceed 600 square feet, or 25% of the total floor area of the principal structure it is attached to, whichever is less.

Is there a residency requirement to construct AADUs? The owner of the zoning lot on which the AADU is located must be the owner's principal place of residence at least six months out of the year.

I have an aging parent or a family member with a disability. Can I construct an AADU to keep them in my home? Yes. The occupant of the principal single-family home or the AADU must either be at least 55 years of age or have a disability as determined by the US Department of Housing and Urban Development. The owner of the zoning lot must file an annual affidavit with the Village attesting to their compliance with this requirement.

How many AADUs can I build on my lot? No more than one AADU may be constructed or maintained on any zoning lot.

Can AADUs be used as short-term rentals? No. AADUs may not be used for short-term rentals.

Will AADUs be able to use my neighborhood's overnight parking? All overnight parking for an AADU must be provided on the same zoning lot as the AADU and must be located on a driveway or hard surface.


