In an ongoing effort to provide the community with information pertinent to local government operations, the Village has incorporated even more information on Northbrook's website. ### **☞ Going-ons in Northbrook**

The Village is pleased to welcome to Northbrook Nestle USA's recently acquired Pizza Division headquarters and product research and development facility. Nestle has begun a substantial renovation of its new home, which is the former Plunkett furniture building at Dundee Road and I-94. Nestle will retain 180+ highly skilled employees with a total annual payroll of \$18.5 million in the Chicago metropolitan area; these employees formerly worked in Kraft's pizza division located in Glenview.

At the end of August, Stericycle, a new business to Northbrook, held its ribbon cutting facility for its new 425-employee North American sales and customer service call center, which is located in a portion of the building at 4000 Commercial Avenue in the Sky Harbor Business Park. Stericycle provides medical waste disposal services, medical waste safety and training and other medical support services to medical facilities throughout the world.

You may have noticed the construction activity at the former Pro Pak site on the south side of Dundee Road, near Skokie Boulevard. Lauren's Cleaners plans to open a pick-up/drop-off facility at this location. In addition, a new hand carwash/detailing facility will also locate on the site.

### **☞ Northbrook Acquires New Road - Founders Drive**

On Tuesday, October 12, at 10am, there will be a ribbon cutting ceremony at the corner of Techny and Founders Drive to formally acknowledge acceptance of Founders Drive into the Village of Northbrook. Founders Drive, which extends between Techny Road to Willow Road, was constructed as part of the development of the Techny properties by the Society of the Divine Word in two different stages, 2001-2003 and 2007-2009. The roadway consists of four asphalt traffic lanes with a center median, street lighting, landscaping and a traffic signal at the Willow Festival retail development. All are welcome to attend the brief ceremony.

### **☞ Asphalt Plant Withdraws Proposal for Northbrook**

The Village was informed that Builders Asphalt, who had proposed the construction of an asphalt plant and recycling facility at 1830-1864 Old Willow Road, south of Willow Road, has withdrawn their interest in constructing a facility in Northbrook. There were numerous concerns over traffic, visibility, odors and the intensity of the site. In addition, the Village Board required that Builders Asphalt meet with the Village of Glenview to discuss the implications of this proposal, as the proposed site was immediately adjacent to Glenview's northern border. Residents and businesses in both communities expressed strong reservations about this plan and Builders Asphalt acknowledged those concerns. 🌸

## November 2 is Election Day: Are You Registered to Vote?

Registering to vote allows you to participate in the electoral process and gives you the power to make a difference in deciding who will serve in elected office. For the November 2 Gubernatorial Election, regular voter registration ends October 5. The Northbrook Village Hall will be open for voter registration Mon.-Fri., 8:30am to 4:30pm, from now until October 5. You must display two forms of identification, one with your current address. *Grace period registration and voting ends October 26.*

### Register in Person:

In person voter registration ends October 5. To register in person, visit one of Cook County Clerk's six locations, the Northbrook Village Hall (1225 Cedar Lane) or an Illinois Secretary of State Drivers license facility.

### Register via the Mail:

Download registration forms at [www.voterinfonet.com](http://www.voterinfonet.com) and register through the mail. First time voters who register by mail no longer have to vote in person the first time they vote. They can either vote in person or vote absentee by mail.

### Grace Period Registration and Voting October 5 - 26

The "grace period registration and voting" law extends the regular registration deadline by 21 days, allowing citizens to register to vote up to one week before an election. Grace Period registration and voting will be conducted October 5–26 at the Cook County Clerk's downtown office (69 W. Washington, Chicago) and at five suburban mini-centers. You must show two pieces of identification. Grace-period voters will either vote on touch screen voting equipment immediately after registering or by absentee paper ballot. ### Please! Only Post Political Signs on Private Property

The Village of Northbrook respects every citizen's right to show support for the political candidate of your choice. If you choose to post a sign concerning a political party or candidate, we ask that you make certain that the sign is located on your private property and not within the public right-of-way or otherwise on public property. Generally speaking, this means that political signs are prohibited in roadway medians and the "parkway area" (section between the curb and the sidewalk) of roads. Please also refrain from affixing signs to trees, utility poles or traffic control signs. *We appreciate your assistance.* ✨

## October 12 Public Hearing on Comprehensive Plan

The draft plan had been formulated by the Comprehensive Plan Advisory Committee (CPAC) and Village Staff after they spent a considerable amount of time discussing issues in the community and how best to maintain the Village's excellent quality of life. The CPAC unanimously recommended approval of the document in February, 2010. The Plan Commission then held a series of public hearings on the Comprehensive Plan between March and August, 2010. Some minor modifications were made to the Plan based on comments from the public. In August, the Plan Commission unanimously recommended approval of the Comprehensive Plan. The Board of Trustees must adopt the Plan before it can become effective.



The draft Comprehensive Plan is comprised of the following sections or "elements":

- ▶ Overall Community Goals
- ▶ Community Involvement & Governance
- ▶ Environmental Quality & Natural Resource Protection
- ▶ Neighborhoods, Housing & Community Diversity
- ▶ Community Character, Culture & Design
- ▶ Transportation Choices (including a new Future Transportation map)
- ▶ Public Services, Facilities & Infrastructure
- ▶ Economic Vitality
- ▶ Land Use & Annexation (including a new Future Land use map)
- ▶ Implementation

The Overall Community Goals Element outlines those "over arching" goals that form the basic foundation for the Plan and the many policies and programs established in the document. The next eight Elements of the Comprehensive Plan focus on a variety of general topics that the Village expects to address in the next ten to twenty years. The last Element of the Plan outlines how the Village should establish priorities for implementing the many policies, goals and strategies in the Comprehensive Plan.

On an annual basis, the Board of Trustees will establish a work program identifying the items in the Comprehensive Plan that should be addressed given the types of issues that have arisen and the resources available. Priorities for implementing the Plan are essential. It is neither possible nor desirable to try and undertake all of the recommendations in the Plan immediately after it is adopted. It is recommended that the entire Plan be evaluated once every five years to see if any major adjustments to the goals, strategies and priorities of the Plan or the Future Land Use Map and Transportation Plan are needed.

Members of the public are welcome to attend the Public Hearing on October 12 and provide comments. ## There's No Real "Trick" to Making Halloween a Treat!

The Northbrook Police Department suggests the following common sense tips to help make Halloween trick-or-treat activities fun and safe on Sunday, October 31, between 2 and 7pm:

- ◆ Remind your children to practice basic, everyday safety including not getting into cars with people they don't know, not talking to strangers, watching both ways before crossing streets and crossing only when the traffic lights allow.
- ◆ Costumes purchased at stores or made at home should be made of materials that are fire resistant and have eye holes large enough for good peripheral vision.
- ◆ Make sure children carry a flashlight, glow stick or have reflective materials on costumes to make them more visible at night, especially when crossing streets.
- ◆ Younger children should never be allowed to go out alone on Halloween. They should be accompanied by an adult or teenaged sibling.



- ◆ Make sure that older children are old enough and responsible enough to go out on their own. Know the routes older children will be taking, set a time for their return home and make sure they understand the importance of being home on time.
- ◆ Be sure to instruct children not to eat any treats until they are brought home to be inspected by an adult.
- ◆ Explain to children the difference between tricks and vandalism.

### Items Acceptable for Deposit

- Prescription medications, including controlled substances
- All over-the counter medications
- Medication samples
- Pet medications
- Vitamins and supplements
- Medicated ointments, lotions, creams and oils
- Liquid medication in leak-proof containers
- Homeopathic remedies

### Items Not Acceptable for Deposit

- Needles/sharps
- Syringes with needles
- Thermometers
- IV bags
- Bloody or infectious waste
- Personal care products
- Empty containers
- Hydrogen peroxide
