Speaking of Finances

The chart on the right illustrates the flow of Financial Planning.

The Village uses an annual financial cycle designed to plan how funds will be spent during the year, manage and track revenues and expenditures while that plan is in place, and report on final outcomes once the fiscal year ends.

Village Treasurer's Report

The Annual Treasurer's Report for the fiscal year beginning May 1, 2016, and ending April 30, 2017, is on file and available for inspection and/or copying during normal business hours in the Office of the Village Clerk at the Village Hall and at the Northbrook Public Library reference desk.

Financial Planning

Capital Improvement Plan (CIP)

This five-year plan anticipates the Village's upcoming capital needs and their anticipated costs so that the Village may make strategic decisions. This plan informs the annual budget but does not approve any expenditures.

Annual Budget

The annual budget is the key financial policy document of the Village. It combines information from the CIP, operating Departments and other sources and plans for both the revenues the Village anticipates bringing in and its actual expenditures.

Comprehensive Annual Financial Report

This document (often called the CAFR or audit for short) reviews the fiscal activities and performance of an entire year and summarizes the standing of the Village.

Monthly & Quarterly Reporting

These documents summarize the Village's financial performance and allow for comparisons of current performance against budget estimates and past financial periods. These help the Village make "course corrections" if necessary.

Financial Reporting

Master Plan for Cyclists & Pedestrians

The Village has retained Alta Planning + Design and subconsultant Christopher B. Burke Engineering to prepare a Master Bicycle and Pedestrian Plan for Northbrook and we need your input.

While the Village is located near many high-quality trails, this plan will help Northbrook to develop a network of facilities that improve walking and bicycling in the Village.

As part of the planning process, consultants from Alta Planning + Design and Christopher B. Burke Engineering will be talking with residents, stakeholders and area employers to understand current challenges to walking and bicycling in Northbrook. The team will then prepare recommendations to build upon and enhance walking and bicycling networks.

Notes from Village President Sandy Frum



Every spring you hear me talk about our budget, but financial planning doesn't occur once a year — it's an ongoing process. And while it may seem like zoning is our number one priority, that isn't true. The Village of Northbrook is a multi-service business, with a \$100 million budget and 270 employees. Your Village Trustees actually act as a Board of Directors; I am the Chairman of the Board (but chosen by all the stockholders) and the Village Manager is the CEO. And as important, our business runs 24 hours a day, seven days a week. There is never a day off, nor are we ever closed.

Each year we look at the resources necessary to operate the Village

and maintain its capital assets. We have implemented a financial cycle designed to plan how funds will be spent during the year, manage and track revenues and expenditures, and report on final outcomes once the year ends. In October, the Board completed the first step in the process – reviewing priorities for the Village and its departments. This will help inform the basis of the next piece, the Capital Improvement Plan (CIP), which will be reviewed this month. This is a five-year plan, which lays out the Village's upcoming capital needs, and the anticipated costs so that the Board may make informed, strategic decisions. While it is used during the annual budget process, it does not empower any expenditures. Goals and the Capital Improvement Plan are just one side of the equation.

In December, we take a look at revenues. That's when we have to pass the annual levy, which sets the property tax rate. The Village of Northbrook is in an enviable position. Our largest source of revenue is sales tax, which provides approximately one third of our yearly income. And while internet sales have had an impact, our income from this source is holding steady. (So now you know why I am always encouraging you to shop and dine locally. Supporting our businesses means that we are supporting our community.) Property taxes make up the next largest source of revenue. The assessed value of Northbrook is split approximately 60% residential and 40% commercial. What the Village receives from this source is split the same way. Over the years, the Village Board has made the conscious decision to stay away from the property tax (you will note that on your tax bill the Village's portion is approximately 7%). Because of our other sources of revenue, mainly sales tax, we are able to do this.

In March and April, we review and approve the Annual Budget (our fiscal year begins May 1). This is the key financial policy document of the Village. It contains the revenues the Village anticipates receiving as well as the expenditures it plans to make.

But there's one more piece to this planning – our Monthly and Quarterly Reviews. No business, the Village of Northbrook included, runs perfectly smoothly. Unanticipated problems occur (more snow requiring more plowing, an unexpected downturn in the economy, a major business moving out of town). Adjustments have to be made. These reviews allow us to make corrections when needed.

So yes, I believe that Financial Planning is our number one responsibility. It's an ongoing process and one we take extremely seriously. Our residents and our businesses deserve nothing but our best.


Shopping and Dining in Northbrook this Holiday Season



The Snow Must Go On

When Winter Weather Heads Our Way, the Northbrook Public Works Department Will Be Ready!

The Village's snow removal operation begins with seven or more trucks spreading de-icing materials on main and secondary streets. As snow begins to accumulate, standby personnel are called in to plow the 557 lane miles of Village owned and maintained streets, municipal parking lots and designated sidewalks.



Help Our Public Works Crews: Keep Your Vehicles Off the Streets.

You can help Public Works crews clear our roadways as quickly as possible by keeping vehicles off the street during snow removal operations. The Village's number one concern is the safety of those using our streets.

Important Snow Plowing Fact...

After the snow stops, a complete plow-cycle can take at least 4-6 hours, depending on weather and traffic.

Snow and ice control efforts give priority to higher traffic Village roadways, such as Walters Avenue, Cherry Lane, Pfingsten Road, Techny Road and Shermer Road.

Arterial roads such as Lake-Cook, Dundee, Willow, Sanders, Landwehr and Waukegan are plowed by either the Illinois Department of Transportation or the Cook County Highway Department.

Keep Plowed Snow out of Shoveled Driveways.

Residents can help keep their driveway clear by shoveling snow to the right side of their driveway (as viewed from the home, looking at the street). Please note: The Public Works Department does not clear private driveway entrances.

Move Your Vehicle After 2" of Snow.

When 2 or more inches of snow fall, it is illegal (by Village Ordinance) to park on Northbrook streets until plowing has been completed. If you park in the street, you may be ticketed and towed.

Make Sure Your Home is Winterized!

Cold weather brings the potential for frozen water service lines, water meters and residential fire sprinkler systems.

Winterize your home by doing the following:

- Check thoroughly to identify and seal all cold air drafts near water pipes, including basement windows, crawl space vents and the glass water meter viewing block.
- Install Underwriters Laboratories (UL) listed electric heater tape on pipes that are located on the inside of exterior walls, which may have only marginal insulation. North and west walls are typically most vulnerable.



- If you have an underground lawn sprinkling system, shut off the water supply and properly drain the system.
- Install fire retardant insulation around susceptible pipes.
- Residential fire sprinkler systems are vulnerable too! As a reminder, if you vacation during winter months, set the thermostat no lower than 55°F before leaving to prevent frozen pipes and sprinkler systems.



Holiday Refuse Collection Schedule and Cart Storage Reminders

During the week of Thanksgiving, pick-up for Thursday customers will be Friday and Friday customers will be Saturday.

The last chance for yard waste collection will be on your pick-up day during the week of Thanksgiving.

Christmas trees will be collected during the month of January on your regular pick-up date. One tree per residence will be collected at the curb. Trees should be free of all lights, garland, tinsel and decorations.

A reminder regarding refuse and recycling cart storage:

Please ensure that your garbage receptacles are regularly stored behind the front face of your house or within the garage on non-pickup days. Carts should not be stored in the front of your property. Also, after collection, carts need to be returned to the storage location within twelve hours after the collection service has been performed.

A Safe Place for Online Sales and Other Transactions

It is common for citizens to buy and sell property to people where the source of the transaction originated via the internet, newspaper or other means.

In instances where the buyer and seller are not known to each other, personal safety is an important factor in the transaction. To assist those who choose to engage in these types of transactions, the Northbrook Police Department offers the following safety tips.

- Never meet anyone at your home whether buying or selling. Always meet in a public place such as a restaurant or shopping center or anywhere where there is a high volume of pedestrian or vehicle traffic.
- Avoid meeting at night, but if you must, then choose a location that is well lit and has a high volume of pedestrian or vehicular traffic as the presence of other people provides an additional measure of safety.
- Consider bringing a family member or friend to observe and witness the transaction.

The Northbrook Police Department, 1401 Landwehr Road, is a safe place to complete transactions made on the Internet.

Members of the community are welcome to use the front parking lot of the station by the sign, which is under 24-hour video surveillance, but not live surveillance.

The use of the parking lot is available as a convenience, but cannot disrupt the daily business of the Police Department staff. Please note that Police Department personnel will not oversee or be involved in the transaction in any way.

Any disputes regarding the sale price, condition of the item or any other matters related to the transaction are considered a civil matter. If a dispute arises during the buying or selling of goods or services, remember to exercise your right to terminate the transaction.

Celebrations & Historical Days from Shermerville to Northbrook

As we close out 2017, the Northbrook Historical Society has much to celebrate.

Each and every day, the Historical Society gives thanks for the Park District's decision to allow the Museum (formerly known as Bartleme's Tavern, originally located at the corner of Waukegan and Shermer Roads) to be moved onto the Village Green. This 42-year-old partnership with the Park District allows us to maintain the Northbrook History Museum and Inn Shop, as well as hold Shermerfest, our annual fundraiser, in the Village Green. It is fitting that the first display in our newly reconfigured Museum is in honor of the 90th birthday of the Northbrook Park and our partnership.

One hundred and twenty-five years ago, a small frame, non-denominational house of worship was built in a quiet neighborhood backing up to the river that would give its name to our Village years later. The doors to this small house of worship opened to the community for the first time on December 24, 1892. In July of this year, the greatly altered building at 1812 Chapel Court reopened its doors as the Hope Union Heritage Center. Today it is the home of the Historical Society's offices, archives and library.

Northbrook's 116 Birthday!

On November 18, Northbrook will celebrate its 116th birthday. In 1901, residents went to the polls to vote ye or nay on whether to incorporate the Village of Shermerville and approved the incorporation by just three votes. It was a very small town with about 300 people living in an area of less than two square miles. Today, our village stretches out in all directions from its original Village limits and is home to thousands of people from many countries and religions living together in harmony.
