# From the Northbrook Economic Development Committee

## Property Taxes in Northbrook

Over the past year, the Economic Development Committee (EDC) has partnered with our member taxing bodies, business groups and residents to demonstrate the tremendous value of being a Northbrook resident.

We are grateful to the Village of Northbrook for providing space within this Newsletter to promote and celebrate how our tax dollars are used to provide world-class public schools, park facilities, library services and other essential emergency and public services. Prior Newsletter articles have emphasized the importance of Northbrook having a diverse tax base. In this article, we are providing an overview of how property taxes are computed in Cook County, and how it varies for residential and commercial properties.

### How are my taxes determined?

After each taxing body (e.g. school/park district, municipality) determines how much is needed to provide services for the year, it submits a formal request to the Cook County Clerk. The County Clerk's office then reviews the requests to calculate the maximum permissible funding level and determines the total amount of money to be collected through property taxes. This amount is divided among all of the taxpayers, by creating a tax rate for each \$100 of *equalized assessed property value* (EAV). It is important to note that simply because your assessed valuation goes up by a certain percentage, does not mean your property tax bill will increase by that same percentage.

When it comes to commercial properties, Cook County applies a tax rate that is 2.5 times higher than is applied to residential properties. This different tax rate approach is *not* used in surrounding counties, where there is no difference between commercial and residential tax rates. This difference results in a disincentive for commercial construction in Cook County.

Finally, the Illinois Department of Revenue annually releases an "equalization factor" for Cook County to try to achieve uniform property assessment throughout the state. The 2018 Cook County equalization factor was 2.9109. The chart below illustrates how similarly valued residential and commercial properties (each with a hypothetical \$100,000 market value) would have significantly different EAVs.

Market Value vs. Taxable Value (EAV) Example				
Type	Market Value	Tax	Equalization Factor	EAV
Residential	\$100,000	10%	2.9109	\$29,109
Commercial	\$100,000	25%	2.9109	\$72,773

### How is the tax burden divided between homeowners and business owners within the Village?

Because of the differential tax rate used by Cook County, residential property owners pay proportionately less in property taxes than do non-residential property tax payers. The table below illustrates that point, as residential properties comprise approximately 85% of the property value in the Village, but pay about 69% of the total property taxes.

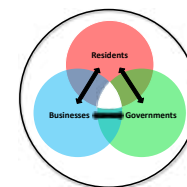

### How has the property in the Village increased in recent years?

The Village of Northbrook continues to see new economic and residential development on an annual basis. Statistics compiled by the Cook County Clerk show that the Village has experienced growth of \$445 million in EAV over the past five tax years. Given how taxes are distributed among all owners, the more new property value that is added within a community, the less each property taxpayer in the Village will pay. As new businesses and houses are built within Northbrook, these properties are added to the tax rolls to provide a new source of funding. This is why the EDC continues to advocate and encourage business, industrial, and residential growth within the Village of Northbrook.

Northbrook's diverse tax base eases the property tax burden on residents, compared to nearby communities. The next Village Newsletter will include another article by the EDC summarizing how a growing and diverse tax base combined with thoughtful land-use planning is a major benefit to the entire community.

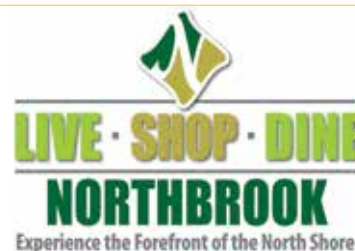

## Compost and Yard Waste Options

Residents wishing to compost can select a year-round subscription for a 35-gallon (\$122.40/year) or 95-gallon (\$142.80/year) container.

With the subscription, Advanced Disposal will collect yard waste and compost weekly from April - November and every other week from December - March. Subscribers can place overflow in 32-gallon plastic/metal

containers or Kraft-type bags (not exceeding 50 pounds) for no extra charge.

The compost program does not include raw or cooked meats, animal bones, or pet waste.

Residents not interested in the subscription service can dispose of compost and yard waste from April - November using 32-gallon plastic/metal containers or Kraft-type bags (not exceeding 50 pounds) and stickers. Stickers are available at Village Hall and local grocery and home/garden stores listed in article below.

## Here's How to Handle Your Fall Leaves

The beautiful fall leaves eventually end up on the ground, and then it's time to start raking.

**Collection reminders:** Brush must be tied in bundles using biodegradable cord, rope, or twine; and not exceed 50 pounds in weight; two feet in diameter; and four feet in length, with sticker attached. ## Have you ever wondered what to do with old clothing, shoes, or towels?

It is estimated that approximately 85% of clothing is thrown away, which means more than 14 million tons of clothing ends up in landfills each year.



There are a number of different ways that you can keep this material out of landfills. The Salvation Army, Goodwill, and other non-profits will take clothing and shoes

and either reuse them or resell them to promote their missions.

If you wish to recycle your clothing, the Village has partnered with Simple Recycling to offer curbside textile recycling to single family homes. Simple Recycling follows the same route and holiday schedule as Advanced Disposal. Information on what can be recycled,

# Plan and Practice Your Escape!

Northbrook's firefighters are dedicated to reducing the occurrence of home and business fires and related injuries through prevention, protection, and education.

**National Fire Protection Association (NFPA) statistics show that in 2017 U.S. fire departments responded to 357,000 home structure fires. These fires caused 2,630 fire deaths and 10,600 fire injuries. On average, seven people died in a fire in a home per day during 2012 to 2016.**

In a fire, seconds count. Using these small three steps can help you escape a fire quickly and safely.

That's why this year's Fire Prevention Week theme, "Look. Listen. Learn. Be aware. Fire can happen anywhere" is so important.

Situational awareness is a skill people need to use wherever they go. No matter where you are, look for available exits. If the alarm system sounds, take it seriously and exit the building immediately.

**Use these three steps to help quickly and safely escape a fire:**

- Listen for the sound of the smoke alarm. You may have as little as two minutes to escape safely from the time the alarm sounds.
- Stay low and crawl to an exit to avoid smoke inhalation.
- Learn 2 ways out of every room. Have a plan and practice it!

## Remember to Change Your Clocks & Replace Your Smoke Detector Batteries

When you change your clocks for daylight savings time on Sunday, November 3, remember to change your Smoke and CO detector batteries.

- Test the alarms monthly. A smoke or CO detector with a dead or missing battery is the same as having no alarm at all.
- Replace the entire detector every 10 years. Working smoke alarms cut the risk of dying in a home fire in half.
- A closed door may slow the spread of smoke, heat, and fire.
- Large homes may need extra smoke alarms.
- Smoke alarms detect and alert people to a fire in the early stages. The alert can mean the difference between life and death in a fire.
- Install smoke alarms in every sleeping room, outside each separate sleeping area, and on every level of the home, including the basement.
- Make sure everyone in the home understands the sound of the smoke alarm and knows how to respond.

## Did you know that in Illinois the month of October is known as OAKtober?

**Did you know that an oak supports more than 500 species of pollinators; butterflies and moths? And that the White Oak is the Illinois State Tree and the Bebb Oak is the Village's Heritage tree?**

Oaks represent strength and stature and create a sense of awe and wonder. These trees work for us by cleaning our air and water, reducing ambient air temperature, and usage of energy. They reduce flooding and support our native wildlife. Our oaks, and trees in general, improve our well-being and support a sense of community.

**OAKtober is the Perfect Month to Maintain Your Trees.**

Maintenance tip: After November 1, you can safely have your oaks and American elm trees trimmed without concern. The insects that vector fatal diseases, such as Oak Wilt and Dutch Elm Disease, become dormant after this time period and are less likely to be attracted to your oaks and elms.

Cooler temperatures and tree dormancy allow your arborist to assess the tree's architecture more readily so your trees will look and grow better next season.

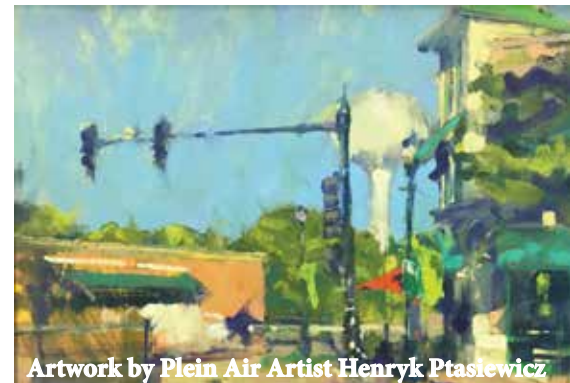

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# Historian's Corner

Reflections from Historical Society President Judy Hughes

The Traveling Building and Bar Reunited

**In 1973, the newly formed Northbrook Historical Society was offered a decrepit, aging gem of a building as a possible new home – just one caveat, the building needed to be moved from the corner of Waukegan and Shermer roads where it stood since 1894, or it would be torn down.**

Despite the many obstacles of moving and rehabbing the building, then known as Bartelme's Northfield Inn, the Society members enthusiastically said "yes, we will do this."

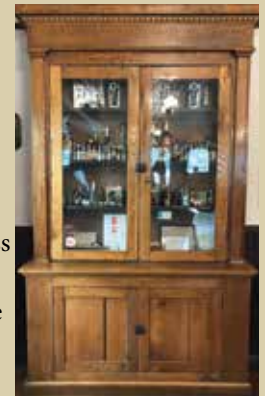
Whether the building was torn down or moved to become Museum property, it was coming off the tax rolls. The Museum is an example of redevelopment and how the community's equalized assessed value (EAV) tax value rose with that move. Redevelopment of the site at Waukegan and Shermer roads added a large three-unit condominium complex to the tax rolls whose EAV far exceeded the value of the old Inn.

After securing a place to move the building, and the money to rehab it, the day finally came for the "Big Move" to happen. It was very cold that January 17, 1975 when the building slowly rolled down the moraine and across Village Green Park to rest until the new foundation and lower level could be built the following spring.

Just as the building traveled, so did many of its contents. Over the years, people who purchased items at the Bartelme's *Going Out of Business Sale* in January 1974 have brought the items they purchased back to the Society and asked if we wanted to add them to our collection. Among the Bartelme artifacts are the first back bar, dishes, a couch, and business paperwork. Recently, a lovely carved bed was added to the collection.

### Here's the Amazing Part!

In May 2019, after 45 years, the largest and most traveled of the artifacts was donated to the Museum after a journey of approximately 2100 miles. The front bar, the second back bar, and a display hutch, complete with Northbrook business license decals on it, are now on display. Their return has dramatically changed the Museum. These items were used until the Inn closed.
